

I. PURPOSE

This is an opportunity for you to meet with the nation's Governors to discuss a wide range of issues and answer questions.

II. BACKGROUND

The nation's governors will be in Washington for the annual NGA winter meeting, February 26-28, 1984. This is traditionally a high-attendance meeting. This meeting would provide an opportunity for you to continue to emphasize your Economic Recovery Program. (You met with the nation's governors in 1982 and 1983 during their winter conferences in Washington.)

In preparation of NGA, we are holding a series of workshops at the White House on Saturday, February 25, 1984. The following topics will be covered:

- 1) Budget Process Reform David Stockman
- 2) Crime Attorney General William French Smith
- 3) International Trade Ambassador Bill Brock
- 4) Health Care Jack Svahn

Following these workshops, the Vice President will host a working lunch with those governors participating.

In addition, a state dinner with all the Governors and their wives will be held Sunday, February 26, 1984.

This year's NGA meeting is likely to be more partisan than last year's. Governor James Thompson (R-IL), Chairman of NGA, and others believe that the conference is likely to be a continuation of last year's mid winter NGA meeting which was highlighted by an attack on the Administration's budget and the federal deficit. As in 1983, Governor Scott Matheson (D-UT) will lead the budget/deficit discussion and be the Administration's major critic. Governor Matheson will moderate an unusual preconference entitled "Special Governors' Work Session on the Federal Budget" scheduled for Saturday, February 25, 1984. Governor Matheson is also expected to propose an NGA resolution on the federal budget calling for:

- Reducing the projected deficit by approximately
 2% of the GNP by 1989.
- o Limiting defense growth to between 2 and 4%.
- o Tax increases so revenues increase by 5.5% of GNP by 1989.
- Spending cuts and revenue increases "which do not unfairly burden already hard-pressed and low and middle income Americans."

There are several other resolutions which will be considered by NGA. The more controversial resolutions deal with acid rain, energy emergency preparedness, employment security and infrastructure.

I. PURPOSE

To be briefed by Secretary Block on his recent agricultural trade mission to Berlin, Israel, Algeria and Morocco.

Dear Mr. President:

I have just returned from a market development trip to Berlin, Israel, Algeria and Morocco. Accompanying me were presidents of three of our largest grower and agribusiness organizations--U.S. Wheat Associates, American Soybean Association and U.S. Feed Grains Council--and members of the farm press and broadcasters.

The Berlin stop was essentially for trade policy reasons. The visits to the other countries were to demonstrate to their leaders and trade that the U.S. government and the private sector want to work together to increase agricul-tural trade and to assess ways to accomplish that in each country.

Berlin

Invited by the West German Minister of Agriculture, I gave the keynote speech at the Green Week Opening Ceremony. Green Week, a premier agricultural show, was an excellent forum for stressing to EC agricultural leaders the Administration's concern about the direction of EC policy. The EC was urged to join us in the GATT to forge better rules on the use of export subsidies and the need for more rational and market oriented production policies on their part. The international press carried our strong opposition to any EC proposals which would pass on to U.S. farmers the cost of reforming the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP). We must resist any EC restrictions on imports of U.S. corn gluten feed or the taxing of vegetable oils.

I came away convinced the EC is serious about CAP reform because of its high cost plus the pressure we and other agricultural exporters are exerting on EC export subsidy policies. There appears to be a building commitment among EC Agricultural Ministers for CAP reform.

Israel

The United States has a long history of successful agricultural technical cooperation with Israel which was reinforced by the visit. Both governments agreed to continue their cooperative research efforts. I also gave a strong endorsement to the proposed U.S.-Israeli free trade zone. Agricultural trade between our two countries is not likely to increase sharply in the future, but I emphasized that the free trade zone would serve as a good example toward our goal of freer trade.

The President

Algeria

Algeria demonstrated how agriculture can lead the way in opening doors with other countries. It is clear the Algerians are giving agricultural development top priority in their next five year development plan and are looking to the United States for help. I signed a bilateral agreement on agricultural trade and technical exchange, which is the first agreement of this nature between the United States and Algeria. Described as an historic step by Algerian officials and the press, it will provide the framework for increased trade and joint development efforts. We will be following up with the Algerians to develop detailed proposals, and I will encourage leaders in U.S. agribusiness to seek out investment opportunities in Algeria which would lead to agricultural development and more trade. The Algerians appear very receptive to private investment in agriculture, which is a significant change.

We also concluded a blended credit package for the sale of one million tons of U.S. wheat, which is a major breakthrough for us in the Algerian market. We will open an Agricultural Trade Office in Algiers on March 1.

Morocco

This visit provided a good opportunity to highlight the food assistance and agricultural market development efforts the United States has underway in Morocco. I signed a PL-480 Title I Agreement for \$25 million of wheat and we recently concluded a major blended credit package also for wheat.

During my visit with Prime Minister Karim Lamrani, he emphasized Morocco's commitment to agricultural development and expressed appreciation for the substantial help being provided by the United States. He also made a strong plea for more assistance, particularly PL-480, and indicated this would be high on his agenda when he visits Washington later this month. According to Embassy officials this strong plea for help is uncharacteristic of the Moroccans and is an indication of their difficult economic situation.

Conclusion

In our modern industrialized nation, we too often take agriculture for granted, but in developing countries expanding food production is a matter of the highest priority. Agriculture can mean the difference between starvation for many of their people or a stable government meeting the basic necessities of the citizens. Besides the obvious humanitarian aspect in sharing our food and agricultural technology, the U.S. gains a stronger relationship with these nations.

Mr. President, I am now more convinced than ever that American agriculture can be one of our most important tools in building worthwhile relationships in the developing world. We should take full advantage of this opportunity.





MEETING WITH CONGRESSMAN SILVIO CONTE (REPUBLICAN -MASSACHUSETTS) AND CARL YASTRZEMSKI

DATE: Monday, February 27, 1984 LOCATION: The Oval Office TIME: 4:30 p.m. (5 minutes) FROM: M. B. Oglesby, Jr.

I. PURPOSE

To accommodate the request of Congressman Silvio Conte (R-Massachusetts) to have the President meet Carl Yastrzemski, former left fielder for the Boston Red Sox, who retired from baseball on October 1 of last year after having played for 23 years.

II. BACKGROUND

Carl Yastrzemski requested through Congressman Silvio Conte (R-Massachusetts) an opportunity to present to the President a limited edition commemorative ring which he had crafted on his retirement to show his devotion and respect for the game of baseball. Mr. Yastrzemski only had 18 of the rings made to present to distinguished persons and personal friends.

Carl Yastrzemski is one of the most honored and respected players in the history of the game. In 1967, he won the Triple Crown, the most coveted award in baseball, and over the course of his career has received numerous other awards.

Silvio Conte represents the First District of Massachusetts (which includes Pittsfield), located in the western part of the State, and is currently serving his 13th term in Congress. Mr. Conte is the only Republican Congressman from the state, and serves as a member of the Republican Leadership by virtue of his position as Ranking Minority Member on the House Appropriations Committee.
