I. PURPOSE

To welcome the Trilateral Commission members from Europe, North America and Japan to their 11th Annual Meeting, being held in Washington, April 1-3.

II. BACKGROUND

The Trilateral Commission draws together top private sector leaders from North America, Japan and Western Europe. 180 leaders (most with spouses) are taking part in the meeting, including on the U.S. side Commission Chairman David Rockefeller, Alan Greenspan, Al Haig, Henry Kissinger, Harold Brown and Zbig Brzezinski. Five key subjects are being dealt with this year: Central America; space; the international debt crisis; making democracy work; and "living with the U.S."

The Commission was formed in 1973 by David Rockefeller. One of the unique founding principles was to bring Japan closer together with North America and Europe. Because of this, Japanese leaders attach considerable importance to the Commission.

As you are aware, the Trilateral Commission is viewed with skepticism by many conservatives. Several of President Carter's cabinet, as well as the President himself, were members of the Commission prior to taking office. The Commission also includes numerous former government leaders from the other countries, as well as from earlier American administrations.

Although low profile and primarily social, the reception offers you the opportunity to reach out to a gathering representing significant power bases on all three continents. Your proposed remarks (Tab A) are carefully balanced to deal with both conservatives and more middle of the road trilaterists.
