Dear Mr. Greene:

During the week of November 7 - 14, programs will be presented in cities across the country on the twelfth anniversary of U. N. Resolution 3379 which falsely equates Zionism with racism. These will be sponsored by a host of organizations guided by Project CASAZ (Combat Anti-Semitism and Anti-Zionism), founded by the International Association of Jewish Lawyers and Jurists. In particular, a forum will be held at the University of Maryland on "Racist Propaganda on the Campus: The Issue of Zionism." We have received requests from our committees and other groups in Boston, Denver, Houston, Los Angeles, New York, Orlando, and Chicago to furnish them with speakers so that they too can sponsor community events. We urge you to participate by addressing those assembled at one of these events to share your expertise and concern.

In the years since the adoption of the Resolution, the world is increasingly coming to believe that Zionists and Jews are racists. This insidious equation is now part of law books in France and a dictionary in Belgium. Jewish student groups were excluded from using college campus facilities in Great Britain because they were considered racist. Here in the United States, Kwame Toure (a.k.a. Stokely Carmichael) declared to the students of the University of Maryland that the best Zionist is a dead Zionist. The Resolution has been used in an attempt to delegitimize the State of Israel, mask a virulent new anti-semitism, undermine the leading role of the United States in world affairs and foment discord between Blacks and Jews.

Last year, at a single anniversary event, Ambassador Jeane J. Kirkpatrick, Ambassador Alan Keyes, Dr. Allan Gerson and Professor Yoram Dinstein spoke at George Washington University to over 400 people in an event broadcast by C-Span. This year our efforts must reach an even wider audience.

WHY PROJECT CASAZ IS NEEDED

Project CASAZ is dedicated to combatting the anti-Semitism and anti-Zionism inspired by United Nations Resolution 3379 which falsely equates Zionism with racism and to working for the formal repudiation of that Resolution. While recognizing the essential value of our goal, many people ask whether we are not merely publicizing an accusation that would otherwise be forgotten. While the Jewish community has remained silent, the world has increasingly become to believe that Jews are racists and that Israel is a racist nation.

Americans were lulled into a sense of false security because "everyone" here knew that the equation of Zionism with racism was a lie and because Americans as a whole no longer took the United Nations very seriously.

However, in the 1980's, reports from Israeli diplomats around the world and from various scholars who had studied the situation began to show that the impact of the Resolution, and the many other UN documents which cited it, was worse than had been anticipated. An effective and incessant wave of Soviet and Arab inspired propaganda, frequently disseminated by the UN itself, has led to the situation where European dictionaries and textbooks are starting to define Zionism as a form of racism, Jewish student groups have been barred from some British colleges on the grounds that they are inherently racist, The Protocols of the Elders of Zion are being distributed all over the world in many languages, and the OAU Charter on Human Rights calls for the overthrow of Zionism.

The vast and successful effort to villify Israelis as Nazis and to equate Zionism with apartheid is not simply a European or Third World phenomenon. The problem has grown particularly acute on American college campuses where numerous anti-Israel, anti-Semitic propagandists are lecturing to the brightest young minds in America that Zionism is as much racism as Nazism and apartheid.

To further dispel any illusion that the identification of Zionism as a form of racism is a secret which should not be exposed by us, in a recent, one-sided presentation on Israeli occupation of the West Bank, NBC anchorman Tom Brokaw stated Israeli policies were now being described by some as a form of apartheid and racism. In today's world a racist state is illegitimate, its citizens and supporters are fair game for terrorist attacks, and the accused find themselves on the slippery slope of the process which as been described by Professor Ehud Sprinzak as leading from delegitimation to dehumanization.

At a State Department Seminar in 1984, sponsored by the World Zionist Organization, the World Jewish Congress and B'nai B'rith International, Ambassador Jeanne J. Kirkpatrick reminded us that "we have seen in our times the tragic consequences of the refusal to face unpleasant truths. We have permitted lies to go unchallenged, which are then transformed into policies, and policies to go unchallenged which are transformed into murder." She continued:

"Lies which go unchallenged are mistaken finally for the truth. I think that the lie that Zionism is racism has spread far and damaged many. That lie will only be corrected, expunged, when it is pursued, not only with the purpose of demonstrating that as to the facts it is incorrect—and it is incorrect as to the facts—but to demonstrate that its consequences are deadly for all of us and for the institutions through which we would like to make peace and improve our society.

On November 11, 1984, the President of the State of Israel convened a seminar at his residence on "The Defamation of Zionism - The New Anti-Semitism". At its conclusion, the participants adopted the Jerusalem Statement which provides in part that "The participants:

"MAINTAIN that this resolution (3379) was meant to provide the justification for an all out assault against the Jewish state, in order to bring an end to Jewish independence, to serve the spreading and deepening of hatred against the Jewish people and its spiritual and cultural heritage, substituting the age-old anti-Semitism with the defamation of modern Zionism . . .

"EXPRESS their deep concern at the lack of public awareness of the nefarious implications of resolution 3379 and the designs of its originators . . .

"CALL UPON Jews where ever they live, people dedicated to democratic values and human rights, and governments of enlightened countries everywhere to resist this insidious campaign of defamation of Zionism and of the Jewish people and help expose its underlying designs:

- to eliminate the sovereign existence of Israel
- to incite hatred against the Jewish people
- to subvert the power of resistance of nations
upholding human liberty and national freedom.

It is fair to say that Project CASAZ was born at that seminar since among its participants were our International Chairwoman, Judge Hadassa Ben Itto and our Honorary Co-Chairman, Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan. Clearly anti-Zionism is a grave threat; combatting it will require the attention of all Jewish organizations and communities. Each group must do more than to take a stand or issue statement; we must meet the challenge implicit in the Jerusalem statement. We must educate the Jewish people and others about the dangers of the Resolution. We must encourage the United States and its allies to press for the repudiation of UN Resolution 3379. We must convince other countries to change their votes and support the peaceful and democratic into action.

COMBAT ANTI-ZIONISM WEEK DECLARED

The week of November 7 through November 14, 1987 will be dedicated to marking the 49th anniversary of Kristallnacht and the 12th anniversary of the passage of U. N. Resolution 3379, which falsely equates Zionism with racism. Kristallnacht foreshadowed the destruction of European Jewry. U. N. Resolution 3379 has given the appearance of legal sanction to anti-Semitism disguised as anti-Zionism. Plans are under way in the United States to call attention to these devastating chapters in Jewish history.

On the tenth anniversary of the passage of the Resolution, Ambassador Jeane J. Kirkpatrick asked a crowd of several thousand gathered in New York what they would tell their children and grandchildren when the world comes to believe that all Jews are racists? In response, the International Association of Jewish Lawyers and Jurists formed Project CASAZ (Combat Anti-Semitism and Anti-Zionism) to lead the fight to repudiate U. N. Resolution 3379. Through our work we will demonstrate to the world that those who would equate Zionism with racism are themselves the true racists. The Arab and Soviet bloc nations have used the resolution to mask their own anti-Semitism, to attempt to delegitimize the State of Israel, to justify acts of terrorism, to attack American interests and to foment discord between Blacks and Jews.

The Project is sponsoring programs across the nation to focus public attention on the dangerous effects of the Resolution. Other major Jewish organizations are joining in these activities. Events are now being planned for New York, Los Angeles, Washington, D. C., Denver, Boston, Chicago, Orlando and Houston.

Anti-Zionism is a particularly difficult problem on college campuses. At the State University of New York's Stony Brook campus, a political science professor asked his students to write theses on the theme that Zionism is as much racism as Nazism. In 1986, Kwame Toure (a.k.a. Stokely Carmichael) spoke at the University of Maryland and proclaimed that "the only good Zionist is a dead Zionist." At several colleges in Great Britain, Jewish student groups, were found to be racist organizations because they were Jewish and were therefore denied access to campus facilities. In Belgium, a recently published dictionary defines Zionism as a form of racism. In some French law schools, texts are being used which cite the Resolution. Project CASAZ is working to reverse this trend.

For this reason, Project CASAZ and an Ad Hoc Committee representing eight organizations in Washington, D. C. have selected the University of Maryland as the location for an event to be held on November 8.

Last year, at a similar event at George Washington University, Ambassador Kirkpatrick stated that the United States and its allies should call for the Resolution's repudiation at every session of the U. N. General Assembly. Over 400 people attended that event which was broadcast nationwide by C-Span.

In addition to the program at the University of Maryland, Project CASAZ is calling upon all other Jewish affiliated organizations to sponsor programs during Combat Anti-Zionism Week. In particular, our religious leadership will be asked to distribute information to their clergy so that presentations can be made at sabbath services, to synagouge group meetings, and in Hebrew school classes.

Awareness of the dangers of anti-Zionism is the first step to combatting these threats. Project CASAZ is forming committees to educate the public, monitor the media, and review literature to insure that anti-Semitic and anti-Zionist propoganda, disguised as fact, is not taught to students. As an organization of lawyers, we are preparing responses to the legal challenges posed by the U. N. Resolution and anti-Zionism.

Repeal of the Resolution can come only if the United States gives this issue a high priority. Through education and awareness, the Jewish community can prevent another Kristallnacht and protect the state of Israel.



Enclosed is a letter from Chris Gersten to Max which we thought may be of interest to you. The significance of the letter is that, for the first time ever a group of seven specialists traveled to the Soviet Union to treat refuseniks. The doctors treated 100 Soviet Jews in Moscow and 25 in Leningrad.

The doctors now have a list of about twenty special cases of refuseniks where a combination of medical ailments and serious stress and depression resulting from their political situation has aggravated treatment. The doctors want to submit the names through proper channels so that these special refuseniks can be granted permission to emigrate.

Attached is the list of doctors who traveled to the Soviet Union. I will be calling you soon in this regard.

AFT Board Expands; Advisory Council Forms

Shultz, Weinberger to Speak at 1988 AFT Annual Conference

Details are filling in fast for another star-studded AFT annual conference February 4, 5, and 6, 1988. Secretary of State George Shultz has agreed to speak at the AFT Congressional breakfast. Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger will speak at the NATO luncheon.

The 1988 conference, held again at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Crystal City, near the Washington National Airport, will follow a familiar format. The defense seminar on Thursday, February 4, will have as its theme "The Impact of Turkey's Developing Aircraft Industry."

The AFT trade and industrial exhibit will, as usual, be open from 11 to 4:30 on Thursday and Friday. Thursday evening there will be a reception in the exhibit hall in honor of the U.S. Ambassador to Turkey and the Turkish Ambassador to the U.S. and their wives.

Busy Program for AFT Delegation to Turkey

A two-week program in September took an AFT delegation led by President Ralph Ropp to Izmir, Ankara, and Istanbul. The fully booked breakfast-to-midnight agenda brought the AFT delegation into contact with senior Turkish Government officials, business leaders, and Turkish corporate members of AFT.

The rest of the delegation was comprised of Executive Vice President Daniel O. Newberry, Board Secretary and General Counsel Alan Winterhalter, AFT Foundation Trustees Wallace Schoettelkotte and Paul Butler.

The Ankara agenda was briefly interrupted for a quick sprint to Istanbul by President Ralph Ropp for an unscheduled 45-minute talk with Prime Minister Turgut Ozal on September 10.

The AFT delegation's other meetings brought them together with Ersin Faralyali, president of the Turkish section of the Turkish-U.S. Joint Business Council.

In Ankara (September 8-10) the delegation had a luncheon briefing at the residence of Maj. Gen. William Potts, chief of JUSMMAT, followed by a visit to the office of Vahit Erdem, president of the Defense Industry Support Fund.


Meetings were also held with Major General Ilhan Kilic, chief of planning, Turkish General Staff, and General Kemal Yazgan, deputy chief, TGS.

A gala dinner at the Buyuk Ankara Hotel brought out some 200 friends and well-wishers of AFT. The follow-morning was devoted to extensive discussions in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs presided over by Ambassador Nurver Nures. The Ministry had an array of programs, especially in the exchange-of-visits field that AFT might consider sponsoring or assisting with.

This line of discussion followed on talks held the day before with Namik Kemal Kilic, of the State Planning Organization. The delegation later met with Kemal Baytas, president of the Foundation for Promotion of Turkey. It was agreed that AFT and the Foundation would study a list of projects that might lend themselves to joint sponsorship.

Before proceeding into a round of calls on Turkish corporate members of AFT, the delegation visited the TUSAS aerospace industrial site at Murted outside Ankara and saw the first F-16 aircraft assembled in Turkey.

Before and during the AFT delegation visit, the idea was mooted of creating a companion organization referred to as "Turkish Friends of America." It became clear to the delegation that AFT's Turkish friends prefer to work through existing organizations. Similarly, it was decided that an AFT representative office in Turkey would not be necessary, at least for the time being.

Another gala dinner, at the Istanbul Sheraton Hotel, concluded the AFT delegation's visit.

AFT Helps to Block Armenian Resolution

The latest effort to have the U.S. Congress endorse commemoration of the so-called Armenian "genocide" was blocked in the House of Representatives by a procedural vote of 201 to 189 on August 7. Prior to that vote AFT officers, corporate members, and supporters were active bringing to the attention of House members the potential for damage to U.S.-Turkish relations if the resolution (H.J. 312) were passed.

Immediately prior to the plenary House vote, an AFT "delegation" was present in the visitors gallery when the House Rules Committee held a brief hearing on the resolution. At that hearing Rep. Marvin Leath (D.-Tex.) delivered an eloquent appraisal of damage that could ensue from adoption of the resolution.


The Rules Committee nevertheless voted the resolution out to the House floor. AFT President Ralph Ropp immediately despatched a telegraphic message to every member of the House reinforcing the urgency of defeating the resolution. During the preceding days and weeks, Col. Ropp had personally visited many members of the House.

Some AFT corporate members made significant contacts with House

leadership, and other AFT stalwarts around the country, alerted by AFT's national telephone network, drove the message home with individual Congressmen.

Following defeat of the resolution on August 7, Ambassador Sukru Elekdag expressed his gratitude to AFT members for their contributions to the outcome. The Ambassador called it a "truly great day for Turkish-American relations and those who have stayed with us through difficult times."

It was pointed out that, while the House vote was a procedural one, most members were treating it as a vote on substance. It is quite unusual for a rule to be defeated, because many members of the majority party automatically vote for rules as a matter of party discipline.

Congressman Jim Moody, who had taken an active part in the debate, stated afterward that "proponents of this resolution are unlikely to try bringing it up again for a very, very long time." A few weeks later, however, Rep. Joseph Kennedy III (D.-Mass.) an ardent advocate of the resolution, vowed to help find another way to bring the intent of the resolution into effect.

Please accept my personal invitation for you to appear on the national television program, "For Veterans Only." This program is a weekly television news magazine developed specifically for the benefit of our nation's veterans and their families. It is produced, cooperatively, by the Commonwealth of Kentucky, the U.S. Department of Labor and AMVETS.

Your recent announcement supporting the elevation of the Veterans Administration to a cabinet level department is an area we would like you to discuss on the program. Additionally, we would like to interview you on matters pertaining to our national defense, Prisoners of War/Missing in Action, and the administration's commitment to veterans entitlement programs.

"For Veterans Only" is telecast nationally every Tuesday evening at 11:00 p.m., E.S.T., on the Tempo Television Cable Network. It is also being made available to our U.S. Armed Forces around the world on the Armed Forces Radio and Television Services. Our program was created as a regional telecast in 1983, and recently expanded to a national audience in October 1987. Through the medium of television, we are attempting to provide positive approaches to complex problems facing today's veterans.

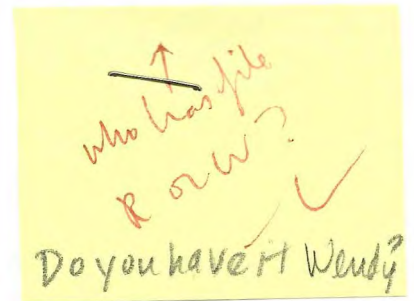

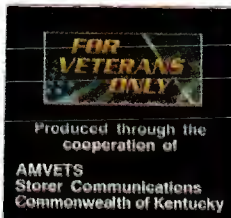

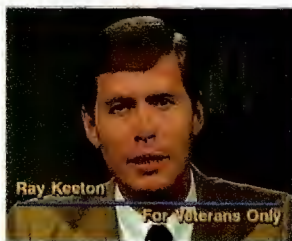
