

A bipartisan compromise amendment will be offered by Les Aspin (D-Wisconsin) in order to preempt the Bennett-Mavroules effort. While we have not endorsed the Aspin approach and its content is not fully developed, it most certainly would be less damaging than Bennett-Mavroules. It is anticipated that these votes on the MX missile program could occur as soon as Wednesday, May 16.

Congresswoman Lindy Boggs is a 6-term Democrat from Louisiana's Second District (Jefferson Parish). Congressman Tom Bevill is a 9-term Democrat from Alabama's Fourth District (northern section of the state). Both are members of the House Appropriations Committee, and both supported the MX on key House votes last year. They are presently reported to be undecided on the issue and under strong pressure from the House Democratic leadership and others to reverse their position.

Congressman Bevill attended the breakfast briefing with you on May 8th and raised questions about verification problems.

He supported the Peacekeeper Missile on key House votes last year, but is presently reported to be undecided.

Elliott Levitas is a fifth-term Democrat from Georgia's fourth district (north Atlanta). He is a Member of the House Government Operations Committee and the House Public Works and Transportation Committee. He supported the Peacekeeper Missile on key House votes last year, but is presently reported to be undecided.

Levitas attended the May 8 breakfast briefing with you and expressed concern about the Peacekeeper Missile program detracting resources from development of the single warhead missile.

Dan Glickman is a fourth-term Democrat from Kansas' fourth district (south-central part of the state including Wichita). He is a member of the House Agriculture Committee, the House Judiciary Committee and the House Science and Technology Committee. He supported the MX on one of three key House votes last year, and is presently

reported to be undecided, but leaning favorably toward Congressman Aspin's (D-Wis.) effort. Glickman has expressed concern about the Administration's credibility in seeking arms control agreements with the Soviets because of the hostile rhetoric toward the Soviets, most recently during the visit to the People's Republic of China.

Bill Hughes is a fifth-term Democrat from New Jersey's seventh district (southern part of the state including Ocean City). He is a member of the House Judiciary Committee, the House Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee, the House Select Committee on Aging and the House Select Committee on Narcotics Abuse and Control. He did not support the MX on key House votes last year, but is presently reported to be undecided.

The Fiscal Year 1985 Defense Authorization bill will be considered by the House the week of May 14, 1984. In its present form, the bill authorizes thirty Peacekeeper missiles - down ten from the Administration request. anticipated that an amendment will be offered by Congressmen Charles Bennett (D-Florida) and Nick Mavroules (D-Massachusetts) which will delete MX production funding for FY 1985 and prevent the deployment of the Peacekeeper missiles which were already authorized for FY 1984. A bipartisan compromise amendment will be offered by Les Aspin (D-Wisconsin) in order to preempt the Bennett-Mavroules effort. While we have not endorsed the Aspin approach and its content is not fully developed, it most certainly would be less damaging than Bennett-Mavroules. It is anticipated that these votes on the MX missile program could occur as soon as Wednesday, May 16.

Congressman Alan Mollohan is a freshman Democrat from West Virginia's First District (northwest section of the state). He is a member of the House Veterans' Affairs Committee and Interior Committee. He supported the MX on key House votes last year. He is presently reported to be leaning in favor of Congressman Aspin's effort, but is apparently running into opposition in his district.

Congressman Roy Rowland is a freshman Democrat from Georgia's 8th District (central part of the state). He is a member of the House Veterans' Affairs Committee and the Public Works and Transportation Committee. He supported the MX on key House votes last year, but is presently reported to be undecided, leaning yes.

Congressman Jim Olin is a freshman Democrat from Virginia's 6th District (western part of the state including Roanoke). He is a member of the House Small Business Committee. He supported the MX on two of three key House votes last year, and is presently reported to be undecided.

Congressman Mike Andrews is a freshman Democrat from Texas' 25th District (Houston). He supported the MX on key House votes last year, but is presently reported to be undecided.

Congressman Vandergriff is a freshman from Texas' 26th District (north central section). He is a member of the House Public Works and Transportation Committee, the Small Business Committee, and the Select Committee on Aging. He has been an active supporter of the Peacekeeper missile program, and has worked with his freshman colleagues to seek their support.

Rowland, Olin and Vandergriff attended the May 8th breakfast briefing with you.

The continued support of Congressmen Mollohan, Rowland, Olin, Andrews, and Vandergriff for the Peacekeeper missile program, and their opposition to the Bennett-Mavroules amendment, is important to securing continued funding for the program.

TALKING POINTS

- Once again this week we face a tough issue on funding for the Peacekeeper Missile program.
- I remain convinced that deployment of the Peacekeeper, as recommended by the Bipartisan Commission on Strategic Forces, is essential to our ability to assure a strong deterrent posture and to achieve ambitious arms control agreements that promote stability.
- Our arms control goal continues to be the conclusion of agreements that will enhance security and stability by reducing overall strategic force levels while permitting modernization of forces necessary for a credible deterrent.
- We are having difficulty with our arms control efforts because the Soviets are playing a waiting game. They walked out of the INF talks and failed to set a resumption date for the START talks.
- Halting production and deployment of the missile now, as the Bennett-Mavroules amendment would do, would only reward the Soviets for leaving START and INF. It would also undermine a key element in our strategic modernization program.

- The Soviets did not reciprocate during the 1970s when we showed unilateral restraint and we should not expect them to do so now, particularly if doubts are raised about U.S. resolve.
- In short, the Bennett-Mavroules amendment would be a step backwards in our efforts both to assure a strong deterrent posture and to achieve arms control agreements that promote stability.
- As President, I must be able to continue these efforts on behalf of the nation. Can I count on your help in defeating the Bennett-Mavroules amendment?
