I. PURPOSE

A brief ceremony where the President will confer the Presidential Medal of Freedom on Ambassador Paul H. Nitze, Albert Wohlstetter, and Roberta Wohlstetter.

II. BACKGROUND

The Presidential Medal of Freedom, the highest civilian honor given in the United States, is awarded to a person who has made especially meritorious contributions to (1) the security of national interests of the United States, (2) world peace, or (3) cultural or other significant public or private endeavors. The award was established in 1963, replacing the Medal of Freedom initiated by President Truman in 1945 to reward meritorious, war-connected acts or services.

Ambassador Paul H. Nitze is Special Adviser to the President and the Secretary of State on Arms Control Matters. He headed the U.S. delegation to the INF talks 1981-1983, and was a member of the SALT I delegation. His other government positions include Deputy Secretary of Defense, Secretary of the Navy, and Director of Policy Planning at the State Department.

Albert Wohlstetter is credited with such innovations as the dispersed basing of our SAC bomber force, Fail-Safe, and other measures which dramatically lowered the vulnerability of our deterrent. He has authored a major study of NATO doctrine in the early 60's and countless shorter works on US security strategy. In the 1970's, he mounted a major public defense of the Nixon ABM proposal. Albert Wohlstetter has been one of the most influential nuclear strategists of postwar era.



Roberta Wohlstetter is the author of Pearl Harbor: Warning and Decision, on intelligence failures and surprise attack, which won the National Book Award. She is respected for her writing on terrorism and nuclear non-proliferation problems, and for her teachings at the University of Chicago. She has for decades been involved in her husband's consulting work as well; together they served in a small group of outside experts advising President Kennedy during the Cuban Missile Crisis.



#### I. PURPOSE

To respond to the request of Senator Dan Evans (R-Washington) for a meeting to discuss the status of pending textile legislation.

#### II. BACKGROUND

Senator Dan Evans (R-Washington) has requested this meeting with you so that he can be apprised of your position on legislation limiting textile imports from other countries. Over 300 trade bills have been introduced and one involving textiles has been approved by the House of Representatives.

During Senate consideration of the Reconciliation Bill and the Micronesia Compact of Free Association legislation, textile proponents succeeded in adding textile amendments to both these bills. Majority Leader Bob Dole (R-Kansas) removed both bills from Senate consideration, thereby preventing final consideration of either of these important measures.

Senator Evans has led the opponents of the textile legislation. He has vowed to prevent the legislation from being enacted and, in effect, has been filibustering the textile amendments on both bills. The Senator requested this meeting with you, with the endorsement of the Majority Leader, so that he could determine whether you would veto the textile bill should it be attached to any legislation. Likewise, he would like a letter from you to this effect. A letter has been prepared for you to give Senator Evans.

Five of your Cabinet officials involved in international trade are on record as recommending that you veto the textile legislation. The votes already taken on the issue indicate veto strength.

TALKING POINTS

- Dan, I'm glad you could come down today to bring me up to speed on textile legislation.
- I understand that you have been leading an extended educational dialogue, of sorts, on a couple of bills that have the textile legislation attached to them.
- What's your assessment of the situation?  
  
(Senator Evans discusses the textile legislation.)
- Dan, as you know, I believe that textile bill is nothing but protectionism in its purest sense.
- I have said time and time again that I am opposed to that.
- I can assure you that I will veto any bill -- be it Reconciliation or any other bill we need -- if it contains protectionist legislation.
- I am going to give you a letter to that effect. I will also convey my concerns to the Senate Majority Leader.



(The President gives the letter to Senator Evans.)

-- Dan, thanks again for coming down today. I appreciate your leadership on this matter.
