I. **PURPOSE**

To respond to the request of Senator Dan Evans (R-Washington) for a meeting to discuss the status of pending textile legislation.

BACKGROUND II.

Senator Dan Evans (R-Washington) has requested this meeting with you so that he can be apprised of your position on legislation limiting textile imports from other countries. Over 300 trade bills have been introduced and one involving textiles has been approved by the House of Representatives.

During Senate consideration of the Reconciliation Bill and the Micronesia Compact of Free Association legislation, textile proponents succeeded in adding textile amendments to both these bills. Majority Leader Bob Dole (R-Kansas) removed both bills from Senate consideration, thereby preventing final consideration of either of these important measures.

Senator Evans has led the opponents of the textile legislation. He has vowed to prevent the legislation from being enacted and, in effect, has been filibustering the textile amendments on both bills. The Senator requested this meeting with you, with the endorsement of the Majority Leader, so that he could determine whether you would veto the textile bill should it be attached to any legislation. Likewise, he would like a letter from you to this effect. A letter has been prepared for you to give Senator Evans.

Five of your Cabinet officials involved in international trade are on record as recommending that you veto the textile legislation. The votes already taken on the issue indicate veto strength.
