In Bucharest, he will meet with President Ceausescu and other Romanian leaders to discuss our overall relations and the implications of Romania's November 1 education repayment decree. In his meetings, the Under Secretary will underscore the importance we attach to continuing a constructive bilateral relationship, will emphasize our continuing desire to help Romania overcome its economic difficulties, and will attempt to persuade Romanian officials that since implementation of the decree would necessarily mean the non-renewal of MFN, non-implementation would be their best course. He will mention also that the U.S. will not make any financial arrangements which would constitute payment for emigrants from Romania.

State concludes that the most favorable outcome would be Romanian non-implementation of the decree. Denial of Romania's MFN status would result in the loss of exports to the U.S. which could exceed \$200 million and (as Henry Nau has pointed out) would reduce Romanian export earnings and, subsequently, affect its ability to meet its debt obligations.

Subject: Proposed Strategy for Discussions with Romanian Foreign Minister Andrei

Foreign Minister Andrei has been invited by the Secretary to visit Washington this month and is expected to be here on April 18-19 (his exact itinerary is not yet firm). Our purpose in receiving Andrei will be to seek decisions from the Romanians which will enable us to avoid the necessity of terminating Romania's Most-Favored-Nation (MFN) tariff status on June 30. Unless the Romanians cease implementing their education repayment decree, termination of MFN is required by Section 402 (Jackson-Vanik Amendment) of the Trade Act of 1974. If it proves impossible to make significant progress on the decree issue, we will use Andrei's presence to lay the groundwork for as constructive a post-MFN relationship with Romania as possible. While we cannot predict how much flexibility, if any, there may be in the Romanian Government's position on the decree, there is evidence that President Ceausescu may be interested in finding a face-saving way out of the dilemma in which the decree and consequent anticipated loss of MFN with the U.S. places him.

We propose to encourage Andrei to persuade Ceausescu to withdraw the education repayment decree and to deal with what it perceives as its "brain drain" problem through existing and longstanding Romanian legislation which requires a period of national service by each high school or university graduate on completion of his or her education. Should the Romanians agree to this face-saving approach, the GOR's commitment to withdraw the decree and also to improve emigration procedures and practices (as required by the Congress and already a subject of negotiations between a U.S. delegation headed by Assistant Secretary Abrams and Romania's Ministry of Foreign Affairs) would be spelled out in a letter from President Ceausescu to the President. The President's response would give assurances of Administration support for continuing MFN for Romania for another year. We also would inform Andrei of the kinds of U.S. cooperation in the spheres of commerce and agriculture that might be possible in the context of a bilateral relationship which included MFN tariff status.

The Foreign Minister who will be visiting Washington May 16-18 at Secretary Shultz's invitation has requested a brief courtesy call on the President to present a letter from President Ceausescu. As the Romanian Government rescinded its application of the education repayment decree (effective May 1) for emigrants to the U.S., State maintains that the Foreign Minister's visit would be an opportune time to remove any present obstacles to an improved relationship. In the event that the President is unable to receive Andrei, State proposes that he meet with the Vice President.

Given the general deterioration of our bilateral relations in the last few months, I believe it would be inappropriate for the President to receive Andrei at this time. Rather, the Vice President should grant a courtesy call -- as a reciprocal gesture to the Romanian Government's withdrawal of the education tax. The Vice President's staff concurs and has informed me that his schedule on May 16 permits such a meeting.

At Tab I is a memorandum from John Poindexter to Don Gregg suggesting a meeting between the Vice President and Foreign Minister Andrei.

Foreign Minister Andrei, who will be visiting Washington May 16-18 at the Secretary's invitation, has requested a brief courtesy call on the President to present a letter from President Ceausescu (see attached cable). The Foreign Minister would not expect to discuss any substantive matters with the President. We strongly recommend that the appointment request be granted if at all possible. The Romanian Government has just decided to halt application of the education repayment decree, effective May 1, for emigrants to the United States. This is an important breakthrough and should pave the way to improved bilateral relations, including the retention of Romania's Most-Favored-Nation (MFN) tariff status, which had been in serious jeopardy because of the education repayment decree.

The visit of Foreign Minister Andrei to Washington provides a timely opportunity to clear away the remaining obstacles to an improved relationship that would be in the interest of both countries. A brief call on the President by Andrei, preferably on May 16, would be extremely helpful in showing continued U.S. support for Romania's relatively independent foreign policy and in ensuring that U.S. objectives for the visit would be met. However, if the President would be unable to receive Andrei, we recommend that he call briefly on the Vice President to deliver President Ceausescu's letter.

ON MAY 3, THE AMBASSADOR, ACCOMPANIED BY AN EMBASSY OFFICER, CALLED UPON DEPUTY FOREIGN MINISTER MARIA GROZA. NORTH AMERICAN AFFAIRS OFFICER-IN-CHARGE MIRCEA RACEANU SERVED AS INTERPRETER DURING THE MEETING.

GROZA OPENED THE MEETING BY REMINDING THE AMBASSADOR THAT FOREIGN MINISTER STEFAN ANDREI WOULD BE CARRYING A PERSONAL LETTER FROM PRESIDENT CEAUSESCU TO PRESIDENT REAGAN DURING ANDREI'S MAY 17 VISIT TO WASHINGTON. GROZA REQUESTED THAT PRESIDENT REAGAN RECEIVE ANDREI FOR A BRIEF PERSONAL VISIT TO ACCEPT THE CEAUSESCU LETTER. GROZA EMPHASIZED THAT THE MEETING BETWEEN ANDREI AND PRESIDENT REAGAN NEED ONLY BE A BRIEF COURTESY VISIT, AND THAT ANDREI WOULD NOT DISCUSS SUBSTANTIVE MATTERS WITH THE PRESIDENT. GROZA ADDED THAT CEAUSESCU REGULARLY RECEIVED BOTH OFFICIAL AND UNOFFICIAL AMERICAN VISITORS IN BUCHAREST, AND CEAUSESCU WOULD BE PLEASED IF PRESIDENT REAGAN COULD SPEND A FEW MINUTES WITH ANDREI DURING THE LATTER'S FORTHCOMING VISIT. GROZA SAID THE GOR WAS LOOKING FORWARD TO THE ANDREI VISIT TO WASHINGTON AND THAT THIS VISIT SHOULD MARK A "POSITIVE STEP" IN GOR/USG RELATIONS. GROZA ADDED THAT ANDREI WOULD WELCOME ANY USG SUGGESTIONS FOR HIS PROGRAM WHILE IN WASHINGTON. ANDREI EXPECTS TO MEET WITH EAGLEBURGER ON MAY 16, AND WOULD BE PLEASED TO MEET WITH APPROPRIATE OFFICIALS AT COMMERCE AND AT THE NSC. An appointment has been scheduled on February 13, for you to meet with Mircea Malitza, Romania's Ambassador to the U.S. This meeting will follow Romanian Foreign Minister Andrei's exchanges with accretary Shultz on February 10 and Gromyko's recent visit to harest (January 30 - February 1). Some of the issues that he likely to raise and talking points that you should use include:

express regret that due to the election campaign, President Reagan will not be able to receive Ceausescu in 1984 as the demands on his time will be unusually heavy.

The USSR issued a joint communique which reaffirmed Moscow's position -- if the NATO countries returned to the status quo ante the deployment of U.S. INF, the USSR would do the same. Apparently the Romanians urged that everything should be done to revive negotiations so that all INF would be removed from Europe. You should query Malitza on Romanian views on INF and the background of this joint communique. (See summary at Tab I.)

Gromyko Visit: Gromyko visited Bucharest recently at Ceausescu's invitation. Having refused to attend the December 9 meeting of bloc ideological secretaries on the grounds it was not the appropriate forum to discuss arms control, Romania requested bilateral talks with the USSR. This visit was an attempt to try to put Soviet-Romanian relations back on track more acceptable to Moscow. You should question him on the state of Soviet-Romanian relations and his perspectives on Andropov's death.

Human Rights: On February 27-29 a U.S.-Romanian Human Rights Roundtable will be held. Such talks between the U.S. and a Warsaw Pact member are unique. You should note that we are encouraged by this roundtable and look forward to the discussions.

In addition to the above issues, <u>U.S.-Soviet relations</u> and the Middle Rest will probably be raised.

Apparently, the Romanians urged that everything should be done to revive negotiations so that all INF would be removed from Europe. You should query Malitza on Romanian views on INF and the background of this joint communique. (See summary at Tab I.)

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- -- In a speech on <u>September 13</u> at Tirgu Mures, President Ceausescu stated, "We are firmly convinced that the peoples of Europe can and should do everything in order not to admit the installation of new rockets in Europe. We must do everything to arrive at a concrete understanding of this problem at the negotiations in Geneva between the Soviet Union and the U.S."
- -- On November 2, President Ceausescu sent a letter to several world leaders calling for negotiations on arms control. Specifically, in his letter to President Reagan, he suggested a phased approach to the negotiations with a halt in the deployment of U.S. missiles and the withdrawal and destruction of most Soviet missiles being agreed upon in the first phase, and the matter of British and French missiles being resolved in a later phase.
- -- Before the November 9 10 Warsaw Pact meeting in Sofia which declared support for the Soviet stance on INF, Ceausescu presented opposing views in a speech to the Romanian National Assembly.
- -- In <u>December</u>, Romania refused to attend the meeting of Eastern bloc ideological secretaries on the grounds that it was not the appropriate forum to discuss arms control.

- -- In January, President Ceausescu signed a joint letter with Greek Prime Minister Panpandreou which calls for (1) the resumption of dialogue and negotiations between the U.S. and the Soviet Union, and (2) a halt to the deployment of U.S. medium-range missiles and at the same time, the non-implementation of any nuclear countermeasures.







- A. Pleased to be here and to participate in the Roundtable
- B. This is an issue of which the White House, specifically the NSC is concerned with and hence, involved in. However, I might caution you about the role of the NSC and other agencies with regard to this issue. Specifically, the NSC is involved in absorbing and taking into consideration the views of the State Department based on conversations with Romanian officials, Jewish-American organizations, Romanian-Americans and Congressmen/Senators. However,
- C. Since 1975, the issue of MFN and emigration has been part of our bilateral relations. In accordance with the Trade Act of 1974 and the Jackson-Vanik Amendment, most favored nation status was extended to Romania and as a result, this extension correlates with the freedom of emigration -- that is, the right to emigrate. Hence, we are bound by two considerations -- legal (terms of this arrangement)

 B. and the substantive (promotion of free emigration)
- D. I might mention at this point, one of the fundamental differences that exists is with regard to the interpretation of the nature of emigration. We are cognizant of your interpretation (for example of CSCE's terms on emigration) -- that is, as being pertinent only to family reunification and humanitarian cases. However, as you know for us emigration encompasses a panoply of considerations -- not only family reunification and humanitarian reasons but basically the funamental right to emigrate or immigrate.
- E. I would also like to clarify at the outset that the Sumpreme Court decision the legislative veto for consideration of future extensions of maivers. Specifically, This decision has only affected internal U.S. procedures. It is our view that, although the legislative veto provisions of section 402 are invalid as a result of the Supreme Court's decision, the rest of that section remains operative. what does this mean? -- It means that in future extensions of waivers with regard to countries covered by the Amendment, the President will continue to be guided by the freedom of emigration critiera written into the law. The loss of the legislative veto does not alter the Administration's substantive and reporting responsibilities under the law, which we will continue to discharge as in the past. Thus, the President's authority to termine

F. During the years that MFN and emigration have been a component of our bilateral relations, there have been various evolutions. During this Administration alone, we have observed improvements in emigration in accordance iwht the objectives of the Trade Act of 1974. We have witnessed emigration from Romania to the U.S. and Germany as having increased. As reported in 1981, nearly 2,400 persons emigrated from Romania to the U.S Also even though there existed problems in the earlier half of 1983 (which I will address) it should be noted that there were improvements in the second half --specifically with regard to the issuance of exit documents and the wiating period. However,

However, during this Administration there have been some problems which we have sought resultions. -- specifically, the rate of Jewish emigration, but more importantly, the emigration and processes confronted by Romanian Jews desiring to emigrate. This as you know has been of immense concern to the Administration. In fact, as you know the President himself expressed that concern in his transmittal message to Congress in 1982. In which he expressed his concern about Romanian emigration procedures with regard to the processing of Jews and thus, the viability and credibility of the 1979 agreement -- that is to what extent was it being adhered-to- considered.

I might also add at this time, a few points about porcess, and the importance of various views on this issue. Before the President issued this message to congress — it was after having reviewed Roamani's adherence to the terms of having accepted MFN status, the views of Jewish-American organizations — these organizations ent in letters to the White House stating that after striving to ensure acceptance of the 1979 agreement made between romanina officials and jeiwsh american organizations, they still knew of cases of where people felt intimated by some of the procedures and felt harassed. - b. received insurances that no longer will you seek reimbursement for education costs as a precoundition. In this regard, I am pleased to note the fact that to date, you have adhered to these insurances and have notimplemented the tax.
- c. throught this exhchage of letters it was also agreed that no economic or procedural barriers to emgiration would be insittued.

Where does this leave us? As I have pointed out there have been areas in which we have been able to resolve our differences and areas in which there has been progress. How two issues I would like to raise:

- -- the matter of the 1979 agreement, many jewish-american organizations made some suggestions to alleviate the cumbersome process ---- thus, I would be interested in your comments on the present procedures what changes have been made after this understanding was reached and after your further discussions.
- -- Secondly, on the issue of backlog --- I mentioned at the outset that there are two issues here at hand -- legal/substantive (promtion of free eimgration); Toward this end, as you are aware we are faces with some problems.

During the period of June 13 - 19, 1984, there will occur in Rumania an official international convocation and ceremony marking the 40th anniversary of the deportation of Hungarian Jewry from Transylvania to the concentration camps by the Nazis, sponsored jointly by the Rumanian government and the Rumanian Jewish community. On behalf of the sponsors, Moses Rosen, Chief Rabbi of Rumania, has officially invited our Chairman, Elie Wiesel, to lead a U.S. delegation to this important ceremony.
