FROM: PAULA DOBRIANSKY ⁷⁷

SUBJECT: U.S. Presence at 40th Anniversary of Romanian Liberation

A high-level U.S. delegation to Romania's August 23 National Day (as suggested by Romanian Ambassador Datcu, to U.S. Ambassador Lodge in Bern -- Tab I), would not be appropriate. First, domestic repression in Romania has not been abated; second, the degree of independence manifested in Romania's foreign policies has diminished during the last three years. Moreover, the Romanians have already been informed by Embassy Bucharest that the President, Vice President, members of the Cabinet and other leading representatives of the Administration will probably be tied up at the Republican National Convention.

I believe that we should send a mid-level delegation (Under Secretary/Assistant Secretary or below). Our attendance would visibly manifest our support for Romania at a time when Bucharest is being subjected to strong Soviet criticism for its decision to attend the Olympic Games in Los Angeles. U.S. representation would also not entail any appreciable domestic or international costs.

As a formal reply does not need to be made to the Romanian officials until mid-July, State's position is that we should delay a decision on this matter until Romania's request for LANDSAT has been reviewed and a determination has been made. State contends that if the Romanians receive LANDSAT we should not send a delegation; however, if they do not acquire LANDSAT, or the issue is still pending by mid-July, then either a mid-level delegation and/or a prominent person outside the U.S. Government who has ties to Romania should be sent.

I will forward you another memorandum on this issue as soon as the LANDSAT matter has been clarified.

BUCHAREST, ROMANIA (AP) -- TRADITIONALLY THE MOST INDEPENDENT OF MOSCOW'S ALLIES, ROMANIA ON THURSDAY AFFIRMED THAT ITS FOREIGN POLICIES ARE DEFINED BY ITS CLOSE TIES TO THE SOVIET UNION.

IN AN ARTICLE IN SCINTEIA, THE COMMUNIST PARTY DAILY, THE GOVERNMENT ALSO APPEARED TO ENDORSE SOME SOVIET ECONOMIC GOALS THAT IT REPORTEDLY HAD RESISTED PREVIOUSLY.

THE ARTICLE WAS CARRIED BY THE STATE-RUN AGERPRES NEWS AGENCY SIX DAYS BEFORE A SCHEDULED MEETING IN MOSCOW OF THE 10-NATION COUNCIL FOR MUTUAL ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE. THE COMECON MEETING REPORTEDLY HAS BEEN POSTPONED SEVERAL TIMES, IN PART BECAUSE OF ROMANIAN RESISTANCE TO SOVIET EFFORTS TO CENTRALIZE THE ORGANIZATION.

THE ARTICLE ACKNOWLEDGED ECONOMIC COOPERATION "HAS A CERTAIN POLITICAL SIGNIFICANCE." ROMANIA RECEIVES MUCH OF ITS OIL AND OTHER ENERGY IMPORTS FROM THE SOVIET UNION.

PRESIDENT NICOLAE CEAUSESCU "HAS ALWAYS STRESSED THE PARTICULAR, PRIORITY IMPORTANCE ROMANIA ATTACHES ... TO THE ACTIVE MULTILATERAL COOPERATION WITH THE SOVIET UNION," IT SAID. "THIS ORIENTATION ... IS DEFINITIONAL FOR THE WHOLE FOREIGN POLICY PROMOTED BY SOCIALIST ROMANIA."

THE ARTICLE URGED "CLOSER COORDINATION OF THE PLANS OF THE NATIONAL ECONOMIES, THE EXPANSION OF SPECIALIZATION AND COOPERATION IN PRODUCTION" -- GOALS THE SOVIETS ARE LIKELY TO PURSUE AT THE COMECON MEETING.

THE COMMENTS WERE UNUSUAL FOR ROMANIA, WHICH LIKES TO DEMONSTRATE ITS INDEPENDENCE FROM MOSCOW IN PUBLIC STATEMENTS AND HAS GONE ON RECORD WITH FOREIGN POLICY POSITIONS DEVIATING FROM THOSE OF THE REST OF THE SOVIET BLOC NATIONS.

ROMANIA ROUTINELY URGES BOTH SUPERPOWERS TO CUT NUCLEAR ARSENALS AND IS THE ONLY WARSAW PACT COUNTRY TO DECLARE ITS TERRITORY OFF LIMITS TO TROOPS OF ITS PACT ALLIES.

Professor Manea Mănescu was born on August 9, 1916, in the town of Brăila. At an early age, he took part in the democratic movement, actively participating, during the Second World War, in the national struggle of resistance for the liberation of Romania from the Nazi dictatorship. Having finished university economic studies, at the Bucharest Academy of High Commercial and Industrial Studies, Professor Manea Mănescu carried out a vast didactic theoretical and practical economic activity.

Professor Manea Mănescu began his economic activity in the oil industry. Between 1948 and 1966, he held economic positions

of high responsibility: in the leadership of State Planning Committee; General Director of the Central Statistical Board; Finance Minister; as well as in other economic institutions carrying out a constant activity in the fields of economy, planning and finances for the social-economic development of Romania; at the same time, he has continued his activity as a university professor in the economic higher education and for scientific research in the field of social-economic life.

Professor Manea Mănescu participated in the elaboration of seven five-year plans of Romania for the years 1951 to 1985 as well as in the elaboration of the prospectives for horizon 1990 and 2000.

Between 1967 and 1972, Professor Manea Mănescu held the position of President of the Economic Council of Romania and from 1969 to 1972 he was Vice-President of the State Council of the Socialist Republic of Romania.

In 1982, he was elected again Vice-President of the State Council.

Between 1972 and 1974, he held the position of Vice-President of the Council of Ministers and President of the State Planning Committee. In 1973, he was elected Vice-President of the Supreme Council for Social and Economic Development of Romania.

In 1982, he was elected again Vice-President of the Supreme Council for Social and Economic Development.

In 1974, Professor Manea Mănescu was elected by the Grand National Assembly as the Prime Minister of the Government. After the elections to Grand National Assembly in 1975, Professor Manea Mănescu was re-elected as Prime Minister of the Government of the Socialist Republic of Romania, position which he held until 1979.

In 1982, Professor Manea Mănescu was appointed as President of the National Council for Unitary Management of the Land Fund.

In the positions he held, Professor Manea Mănescu held numerous meetings, talks and negotiations with Heads of Government and other Governmental officials concluding understandings and agreements on economic, technical, scientific and cultural co-operation.

He has been member of the Grand National Assembly since 1961. During 1961-1969, he was President of the Economic and Financial Committee of the Parliament.

For his long didactic and scientific activity, Professor Manea Mănescu was elected member of the Romanian Academy and member of the Academy of Social and Political Sciences of the Socialist Republic of Romania. He has also been a member of a number of foreign academies and scientific institutions; he has published a series of studies and carried

out research in the fields of economy, sociology and economic cybernetics.

For his long activity on national and international plane, Professor Manea Mănescu has been decorated with high Romanian and foreign orders.

In 1975-80, Mr. Niskanen was the Director of Economics of the Ford Motor Company. He was a Professor at the Graduate School of Public Policy at the University of California, Berkeley, from 1972-75. He was Assistant Director for Evaluation of the Office of Management and Budget from 1970-72, and Director of Special Studies of the Office of the Secretary of Defense in the early 1960s.
