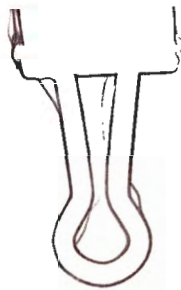

To congratulate Fuzzy Zoeller on winning the 1984 U.S. Open Golf Championship. The President will also be presented an Honorary Membership in the U.S. Golf Association (USGA) Associates Program by James R. Hand, President of the USGA, who will accompany Mr. Zoeller.

II. BACKGROUND

Fuzzy Zoeller, 32, of New Albany, Indiana, earlier this month won the 1984 U.S. Open Golf championship by 8 strokes in an 18-hole playoff with Greg Norman of Australia. Zoeller and Norman concluded the regulation tournament in a dramatic tie, resulting in a playoff the next day.

There was extensive media coverage of the final round and playoff, and much note was taken of the high degree of sportsmanship exhibited between the two players. Fuzzy Zoeller is known for his good humor and sportsmanship on the golf course, both of which qualities were exhibited during his play in the U.S. Open. Perhaps, most remembered, was his standing in the fairway and waving a white towel in mock surrender on the final day after Norman, playing in front of him, had sunk a difficult shot on the 18th hole which tied them.

Zoeller Wins Open by Eight Strokes

Comedy Act By Zoeller Is 1-Man Show

MAMARONECK, N.Y., June 18—"Well, dead-beat," Fuzzy Zoeller said to Greg Norman as they met in the clubhouse this morning, "ready to go?" "Feels like a Monday outing, doesn't it?" Norman replied.

That's rather the way he played, poor fellow. They are good friends and better sportsmen, but only Zoeller was prepared to win what became an anticlimactic finish to the U.S. Open. Nobody ever has arrived for a playoff quite so wired as Zoeller,

from the electric-shock pads patched to his both-ersome back that he removed moments before hitting the absolute minimum number of practice balls to playing Winged Foot in about the absolute minimum number of blows.

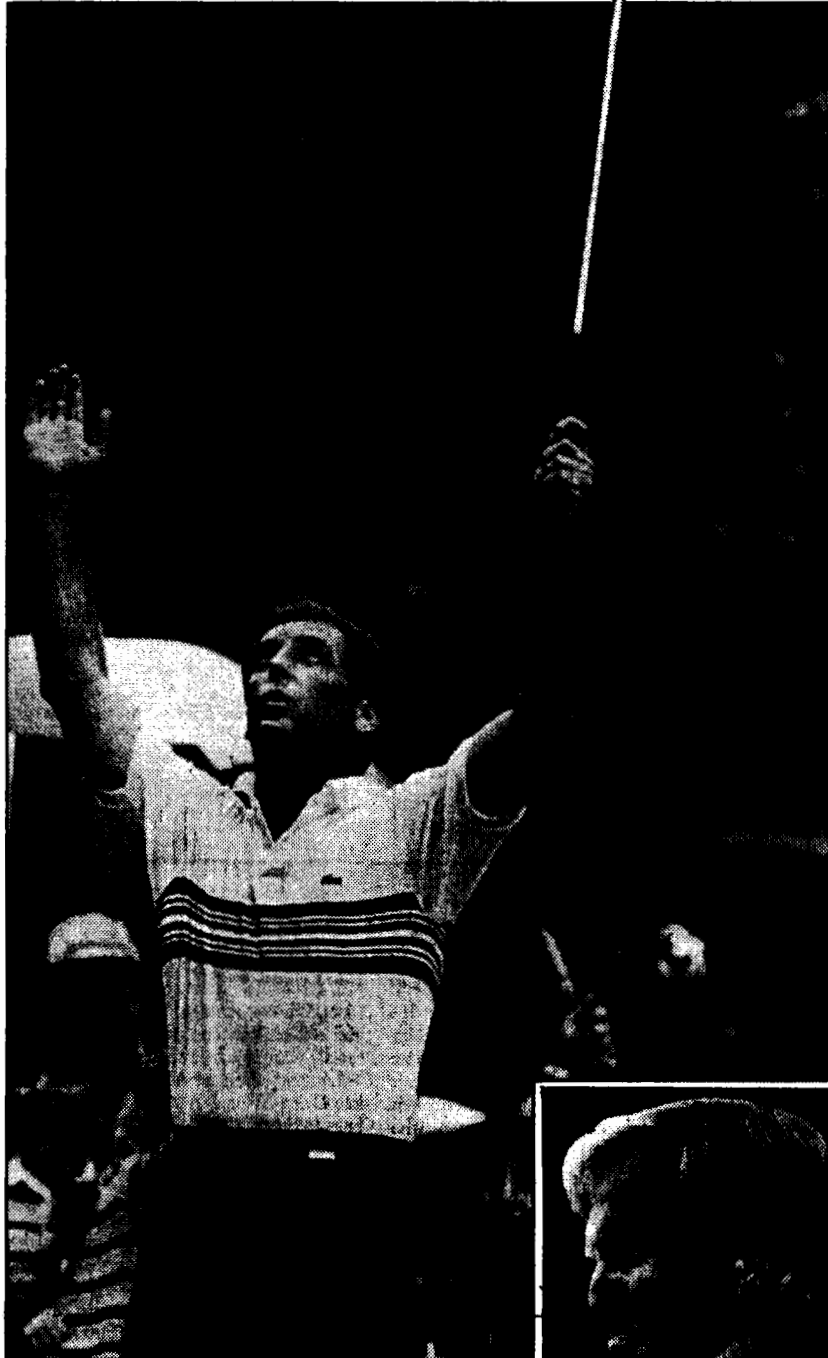
The fuzzy question Zoeller had asked his head cover got answered by the ninth tee. He talks to anybody and, it develops, any thing, for the instant he swung his locker open he inquired of the jolly-looking figure perched atop his driver: "Do ducks eat sharks?"

In one enormous swallow this once, and on a day as limp as the drama. Norman couldn't miss a putt in a wind tunnel down the stretch Sunday; he couldn't make one in the critical holes today had a friendly groundhog burrowed a path to the cup.

Because Zoeller's five-shot lead after eight holes made the rest of the match seem very much like an exhibition—and a one-man show at that—some insisted it should not have taken place at all. Came the argument, loud as Zoeller's Zealots and strong as a two-iron, that Open ties ought to end in Sunday sudden death instead of 18 holes the next day.

Nah.

Let the satellite tournaments, like the Masters, finish that way. Only bosses with golf-addicted underlings had that in mind Sunday. The anticlimax was as keen as any event in memory: two rounds on a manly course, equally charming and dull. Maybe the final-round fireworks were just a little extra day for casual fans suddenly enthralled to savor Zoeller and Norman hardly hurt golf. Zoeller is proof positive that the sport is not limited to skinny robots with all the personality of

MAMARONECK, N.Y., June 18—When Fuzzy Zoeller and Greg Norman left Winged Foot Sunday night, they were tied on the scoreboard but Zoeller was behind.

When you squander a four-shot lead in the final round of the U.S. Open, when you lose a three-shot margin on the last five holes, when the other fellow sinks a 40-foot gasp of a putt on the 72nd green to snatch the greatest prize in golf from your hand, you're not tied. In your mind, in every mind, you enter the next day's playoff as an emotionally battered underdog.

If the Smartest Fan here on Sunday had owned a crystal ball, gazed one day into the future and known that he could bet on Zoeller today and give seven shots, he might own the World Trade Center now.

If he'd said that Zoeller would win the 84th U.S. Open, which he did today, by the biggest landslide margin of any 18-hole playoff in major tournament history, he'd have gotten a Bronx cheer.

If he'd said that Zoeller would lead by three shots after sinking a 68-foot birdie putt at the second hole, by nine shots after 16 holes, and would finish with an eight-stroke victory, 67-75, he'd have been ruled eligible for relief: brain under repair.

After all, in 27 previous Open playoffs, dating back to 1895, no one had ever shot lower than 68. Zoeller, who waved the white flag of gracious surrender on Sunday, set an Open playoff scoring record today.

In fact, counting this round, the 32-year-old Zoeller is the only man ever to break par for any of the four Opens played at Winged Foot. He was seven-under-par for 90 holes, a feat that should grow with the years.

"I whipped this great course for five days," said Zoeller. "It got Hale (Irwin) yesterday . . . It got Greg today and it might have gotten me tomorrow. But I whipped it."

Few final acts in golf have been more improbable than this afternoon, which ended with the quipping, populist Zoeller walking up the 18th fairway to chants of "Fuzzy . . . Fuzzy."

"That walk was the warmest feeling and the coldest streak down my back of my life," said Zoeller, whose personality brings welcome heat to a cool game.

opened here, from Zoeller's birdie-birdie start to Norman's double bogey-bogey-bogey collapse at the second, third and fourth holes, would have been longshots, indeed, a day ago.

However, strange things happen in the night. The men who leave the course one evening are not necessarily the same men who return the next morning. The mind, given a chance to escape from the flow of events and regain its equilibrium, can restore its own health.

Certainly Zoeller's could. "I didn't sleep well at all. I was still awake at 3 a.m. smoking a cigarette and the fire alarm in my hotel room went off," he said. Sure, Zoeller had insomnia, but he also had ideas. "I thought about it and I figured that coming back on Monday was a break for me," said Zoeller, who won the 1979 Masters in a sudden death playoff and who, on Sunday night, said he wished that this Open had the same format.

"You never know what 12-14 hours will do for a guy . . . After the way Norman finished, he had the momentum. When you get the old putter answering, the way it was for him yesterday, you're hard to beat."

Also, Zoeller, who looked hangdog and fatigued during the final fourth-round holes, came to the first playoff tee nervous and determined to atone. "My guts were in a knot, there was a lump in my throat," said Zoeller who got an instant break when his first tee shot trickled into a clearing a yard past a tree that would have stymied him.

"Don't ask me for a hole-by-hole. I don't remember what I was doing out there . . . I was in a zone of my own."

Norman's night-to-day progression was just the opposite. He rode out the rough-hewn front gates of Winged Foot after the fourth round as a hero and a blossoming star. He returned around noon today as a flat and uninspired mortal. "My adrenaline wasn't pumped up . . . I felt too relaxed," said the mystified Norman. "I needed something special. It didn't happen."

This is called being "flat" and it happens in many sports many times. "Hey, I thought I got him with that putt at the 18th on Sunday," admitted Norman, who three-putted three of the first five holes. Norman, and especially his putter, had nowhere to go but down.

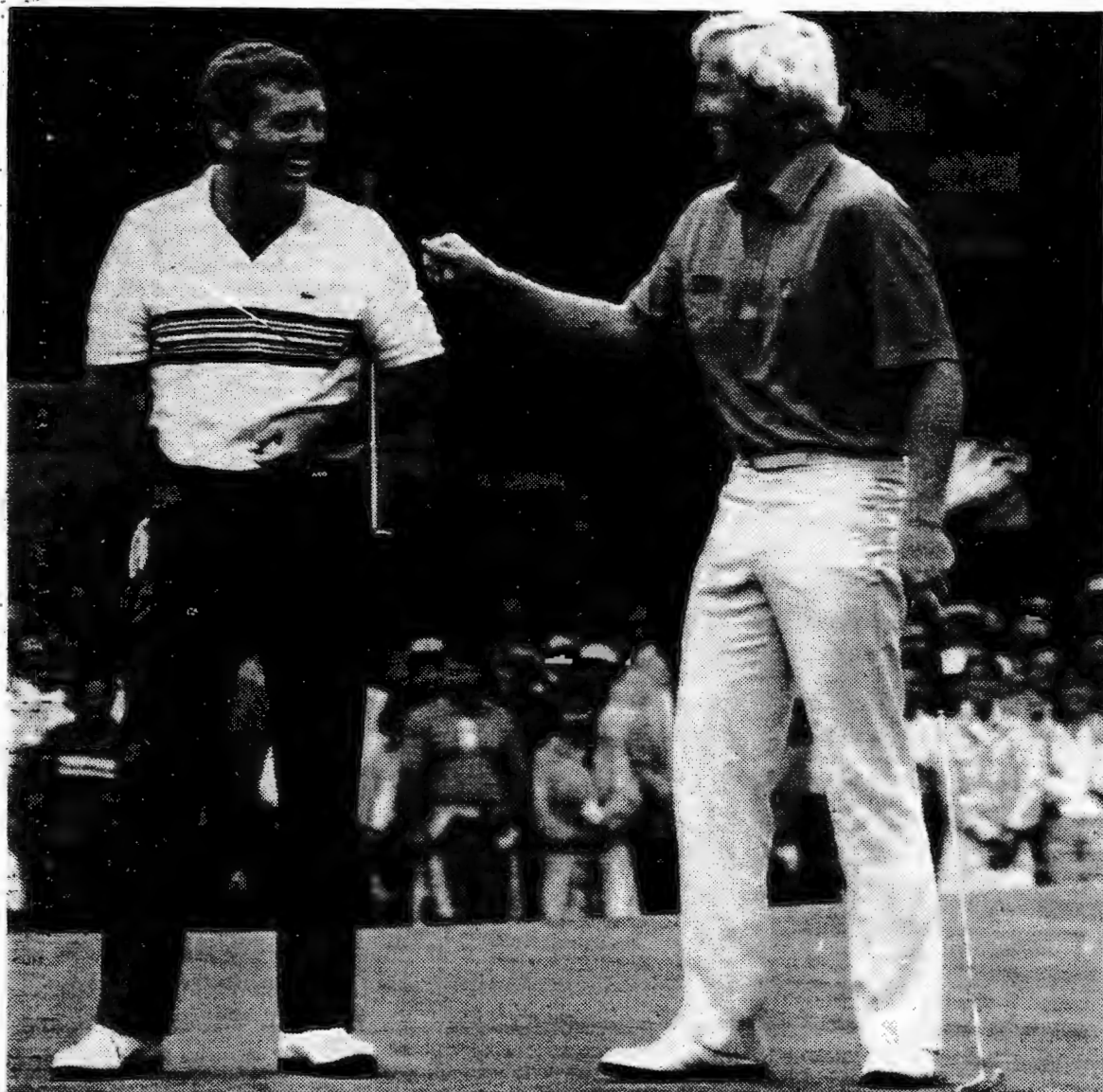

Shots From Norman

MAMARONECK, N.Y., June 18 — Frank Urban (Fuzzy) Zoeller sank a 68-foot birdie putt for a 3-shot lead on the second hole of Winged Foot's West course today and easily beat Australia's Greg Norman by a record 8 shots in an 18-hole playoff in the 84th United States Open.

Zoeller, the 32-year-old Indiana golfer who whistles while he works and talks with gallery members as he plays, shot a 3-under-par 67. Norman was 5 over par at 75. It was the 27th playoff since the United States Golf Association staged its first Open in 1895.

Norman forced the playoff Sunday when he sank a 40-foot putt for par on the 72d hole of the tournament that tied him with Zoeller at 4-under-par 276.

Lowest Score in a Playoff

Zoeller's 67 today was the lowest score ever shot in an 18-hole United States Open playoff. Zoeller also gained the largest margin of victory in the 23 previous 18-hole Open playoffs. The other four playoffs were over 36 holes. Only Bobby Jones, with a 23-shot victory over Al Espinosa in a 36-hole playoff at Winged Foot in 1929, ever won by a larger margin.

Zoeller, who won the 1979 Masters in a sudden-death playoff against Tom Watson and Ed Sneed, earned \$94,000 and the prestige of being the United States Open champion. Norman, the 29-year-old long hitter who is known as Shark, got \$47,000.

The victory puts Zoeller in the same company as such renowned golfers as Willie Anderson, Francis Ouimet, Jones, Walter Hagen, Lawson Little, Ben Hogan, and Jack Nicklaus, all of whom won Open playoffs.

Zoeller shot rounds of 71, 68, 69, and 70. Norman had 70, 68, 69, and 69. They were the only golfers under par after four rounds of this tournament. Zoeller's 68 in the second round was

the lowest 18-hole score ever shot in any of the four United States Opens held on the 6,930-yard West course at Winged Foot.

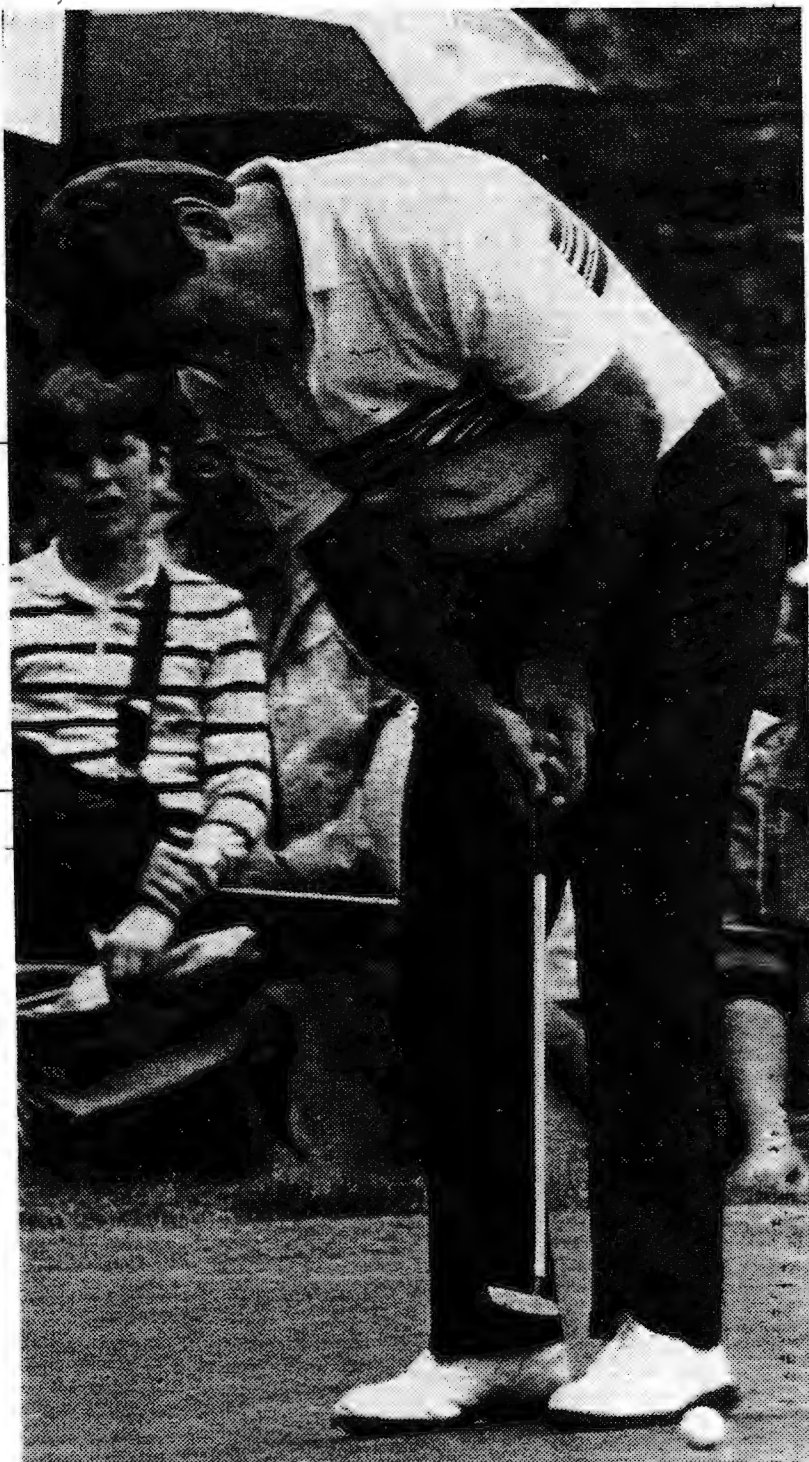
Zoeller has been bothered with back pain since suffering a serious in-

jury during a high school basketball game, but today he made the game look easy as he strolled from shot to shot, took little time over any stroke and almost casually dropped his putts.

In recent months he has been using a device resembling a battery belt. It has batteries attached to electrodes that connect to the skin surface of Zoeller's back. Regular impulses are supposed to relax the muscles and help avoid painful back spasms.

A steady rain began falling a few minutes before the playoff began and the two played two holes before the rain stopped. The course was already

soaked because of long periods of rain during the night.

Still, the two golfers started so well today that a close, dramatic competition seemed likely. Zoeller holed a 15-foot putt for a birdie 3 on the first hole. Then Norman matched it from 12 feet. The fans, cheering loudly, became so enthusiastic that many of them charged through the ropes and began to dart in all directions, before heading to the second hole.

Officials have had trouble controlling the crowd all through the Open. Whenever the crowd was held back, it would burst through somewhere else.

After the first hole, on the second green, Zoeller began to take control. Norman, driving first, hit his ball to the right into deep rough behind a large tree. Zoeller reached the middle of the fairway and hit his second shot beyond the pin, almost to the back of the green.

Norman, trying to hit a high shot over the big tree, clipped the leaves. He came down well short of the green, chipped on and was closer to the pin than Zoeller.

Zoeller addressed his lengthy putt

and tapped it to start it rolling down an incline. It dropped into the hole for a 68-foot birdie. The crowd cheered wildly. Most spectators were rooting for Zoeller and they began their first chant of "U.S.A., U.S.A."

Swing of Three Shots

Norman missed his first putt and then his second, finally holing out for a double-bogey 6. This sudden swing of three shots gave Zoeller an early lead that almost guaranteed a victory as long as he could keep playing a sound game of golf.

The two golfers both three-putted the third hole, at 216 yards the longest par 3 on the course.

Then Zoeller had his first chance to take advantage of Norman's long tee shots. Although Zoeller is longer than the average PGA Tour golfer, he is not as long as Norman. And No. 4, a 460-yard straight downhill par 4, is the type of hole where long hitters, as they say, let out the shaft.

Since the player farthest from the hole hits his second shot first, Zoeller had a chance to put his ball close and put pressure on Norman. That is just

what Zoeller did, putting his ball about 25 feet from the cup.

Trying to match it, Norman hit right and short of the green into a bunker. He came out 12 feet from the pin and two-putted for another bogey 5. After Zoeller made his par, he took a 4-shot lead to the fifth tee.

Norman got his second birdie of the round at the short par-4 sixth while Zoeller parred the hole, cutting Zoeller's lead to 3 shots.

Norman gave the stroke right back at this par-3 hole — at 161 yards the shortest on the course. Both golfers missed the green to the right, with Norman going into the deep grass and Zoeller going into a deep bunker. Zoeller blasted through the wet sand to put his ball 5 feet from the hole. Norman skulled his pitch shot and the ball skidded over to the left side of the green. He missed a 20-foot putt for par and Zoeller made his, giving him a 4-shot lead again.

Zoeller increased the margin to 5 shots at No. 8 with a par 4. Norman's approach shot went into the left bunker and he had to take a bogey 5.

They made the turn with Zoeller holding a 5-shot lead, with a 1-under par 34. Norman was 4 over at 39.

Praise for Zoeller, but Not Winged Foot

MAMARONECK, N.Y., June 19 — Fuzzy Zoeller's victory over Greg Norman in the 18-hole playoff Monday for the United States Open championship left many involved in the 14th tournament happy that golf had such a charismatic champion. Many expressed optimism that Zoeller could do for golf what Arnold Palmer did 20 years ago — create a special enthusiasm for the sport among fans.

But there was a residue of discord that caused one United States Golf Association official, who requested anonymity, to say of the Winged Foot course, "We won't be back here as long I have anything to say about it."

He was referring to the operation of the tournament outside of the competition itself. Many problems, such as traffic and crowd control, arose, as they always do during modern Opens,

Traffic Problem Cited

when 20,000 spectators are on a course built to handle fewer than 500 members.

Ed Schneider, chairman of the club's tournament committee, said of the U.S.G.A.: "We gave them the course they wanted. It was a great tournament. I think at the conclusion of any tournament everybody involved is so tired and so glad it has been successful and over with that they say, 'Never, never again.'"

"Talk is cheap. But as time goes on the course becomes the attraction. We'll see."

The Open has been held on the West Course at Winged Foot four times — in 1929, 1959, 1974 and 1984 — but this

year's championship had much bigger crowds than any of the previous three.

During the fourth round Sunday, Jim Hand, president of the U.S.G.A., was amazed at the crowd's noise and swarming through the ropes at times. Trying his best to direct some marshals to keep the crowds back when Zoeller and Hale Irwin were playing the second hole, Hand said, "This is an absolute zoo."

There were other problems, such as auto traffic in and out of the parking lots adjacent to the second and third holes. Curtis Strange, who finished third, had to step away from his tee shot at No. 2 Sunday and ask an offi-

cial to try to stop cars that were within 50 feet of the tee.

The most serious problem was traffic congestion for those arriving at the course. Some players had to leave automobiles, grab several clubs and walk as much as a mile to the course in order to warm up before each round.

Hubert Green, the 1977 champion, once was taken the last half-mile to the clubhouse by a policeman driving a golf cart. "I'm used to this at Open so usually I try to stay in a house close to an Open course," said Green. Tom Watson abandoned his car and walked to the course, but no golfer missed a tee time.

Concerning the crowds, Schneider said, "You had about 10,000 fans here Monday, and all 10,000 were following one match, unlike the rest of the tournament."

nant when the 20,000 each day were spread thin because some followed one match and some another. Also, Fuzzy creates a special enthusiasm that is great for golf."

Four years ago at Baltusrol in New Jersey, huge crowds swarmed over the 18th green when Jack Nicklaus sank his final putt to win his fourth Open title. At the time, people said that it would be impossible to return to Baltusrol because crowds were uncontrollable on such a confined golf course. Yet U.S.G.A. officials talk of holding the Open sometime in the next decade at Baltusrol.

"It has gotten so that the U.S.G.A. has particular problems handling an

Open on these great old courses," said Nicklaus. "They are tightly confining areas such as Winged Foot, Baltusrol, Merion and the other regular Open courses. But I don't want to see the Open leave the traditional old courses. That is sometimes the only chance we have to play on the great old courses each year — during an Open."

The 18 magnificent holes of Winged Foot's West Course stood up to the important test. Set up less severely than the course was in 1974, the course gave up only two subpar scores over 72 holes of regulation play — 4-under 276's by Zoeller and Norman. Zoeller was even under par after 90 holes — 7-under 343.
