

THESE TWO NOTEABLE SEIZURES COMBINED ARE LIKELY TO HAVE A PROFOUND EFFECT ON THE LOCAL HEROIN MARKET AND ALMOST IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE HEROIN BASE SEIZURES THE WHOLBSALE DRUG PRICE OF NO. 3 HEROIN ROSE BY OVER 60%. THERE IS NO KNOWN MARKET FOR NO. 4 HEROIN IN HONG KONG AND IT IS BELIEVED THAT THESE DRUGS WERE INTENDED FOR RE-EXPORT, POSSIBLE TO NORTH AMERICA, AUSTRALIA AND EUROPE BY DIVERSE ROUTES. THE DISCOVERY OF THE ARMS AND AMMUNITION REFLECTS A GROWING DETERMINATION ON THE PART OF THE DRUG SMUGGLING SYNDICATES IN HONG EONG. IN BOTH CASES THE DRUGS WERE BROUGHT IN FROM THAILAND.

EUROPEAN SITUATION

INFORMATION TAKEN FROM DRUG SEIZURE REPORTS SINCE THE BEGINNING OF THIS YEAR HAS BEEN FED INTO THE COMPUTER NOW OFERATING AT THE GENERAL SECRETARIAT. AS A RESULT OF BASIC STATISTICS DRAWN FROM THE COMPUTER WE MAY NOW OBSERVE SOME SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN THE GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION OF COCAINE SEIZURES IN EUROPE.

OVER THE LAST TWO YEARS THE THREE COUNTRIES FEATURING MOST PROMINENTLY IN TERMS OF QUANTITY OF COCAINE SEIZED HAVE CHANGED FROM FRANCE ITALY AND SPAIN (IN THAT ORDER) TO GERMANY, BELGIUM AND FRANCE WITH SPAIN PORTUGAL AND THE NETHERLANDS CLOSE BEHIND. SEIZURES IN ITALY HAVE DECREASED NOTEABLY.

SO FAR THIS YEAR THE SG HAS RECORDED A TOTAL OF 54 COCAINE SEIZURES IN FRG ANOUNTING TO A TOTAL WEIGHT OF 125 KG 198 WHICH COMPARES DRAMATICALLY WITH ONLY 26 KG SEIZED IN 1982 AND 94 KG IN 1983. SEIZURES IN BELGIUM HAVE SOARED FROM A TOTAL REFORTED FIGURE OF 5 KG IN 1982, TO 28 KG IN 1983 UP TO 72 KG 006 IN THE FIRST SEVEN MONTHS OF THIS YEAR.

EUROPE IN GENERAL IS SUFFERING INCREASING AMOUNTS OF COCAINE IMPORTS AND TRAFFICKERS ARE MAKING INCREASING USE OF MORE ROUNDABOUT ROUTES TO AVOID DETECTION. IT IS ANTICIPATE. THAT IN THE NEAR FUTURE A MORE DETAILED PROFILE OF THE COCAINE SITUATION WILL BE PUELISHED AS COMPUTERISATION OF THE REPORTED INFORMATION BECOMES MORE ADVANCED.

Dick Sackett at NIDA read Dr. Rocha's letter to me. Following is a summary.

Dr. Rocha is a practicing psychistrist. He writes requesting information on inhalants and marijuana abuse by children and youth. In addition he requests information on the approaches being used in the United States to combat drug abuse by youth. Dear Jack,

We are beginning the preliminary work on the 1986 National Strategy and hope to have it completed in the Spring of 1986. As I mentioned earlier, we must have additional staff assistance in my office to coordinate the agency participation and and to develop and distribute the Strategy.

For such a critical requirement, we must have an experienced professional who understands the overall program and has a special talent for working with policy issues. Our best candidate is the intelligence analyst from DEA who assisted with the previous Strategies, Mrs. Sharyn Lumpkins. Sharyn was the ideal employee; dedicated to the national program of reducing drug abuse in the United States, loyal to her parent organization, and extremely knowledgeable about government operations and how to get things done properly and expeditiously. In short, Sharyn's performance has been truly outstanding and I hope to obtain a repeat performance during the preparation of the 1986 Strategy.

I gather from your conversation with Dick that you believe that DEA would sorely miss Sharyn. I certainly understand your concern but believe that the successful completion of an effective national strategy is the key to the whole program and we must have the best people to work on it. Therefore I hope that you will be able to assign Sharyn as the full-time Justice representative during the preparation and publication of the new Strategy. It would be most helpful if she could begin work by the end of June. Thank you for your consideration of this request.

1. Health Hazards

Cocaine is a dangerous drug and is one of the most powerfully addictive drugs known to man. Addictive in this case means that an individuals has lost voluntary control over the use of the drugs.

- o Cocaine exerts its addictive effect by acting directly on the reward or pleasure centers of the brain. This brain action produces an intense desire to experience the effects of cocaine again and accounts for the development of compulsive use beyond the control of the user.
- Increased doses of cocaine place the user at high risk for acute toxic reactions, including cocaine-induced seizures and convulsions, respiratory function disturbances, and heart attacks.
- The reported symptoms of cocaine use include weight loss, increased heart rate and blood pressure, depression, irritability, anxiety, paranoia, and hallucinations.
 Psychoses have been seen in heavy users. Depression and psychosis are more likely to occur with chronic heavy use.
- Cocaine overdose can result in seizures, coma, and death from respiratory or cardiac arrest.
- Animals given free access to cocaine in laboratory experiments will inject it to the point of death, selecting cocaine in preference to food and water.

2. Prevalence of Use

The most recent national surveys on drug abuse (1979-1982) found a "leveling off" of the rather dramatic increases observed between 1976 and 1979 in the number of persons who report having tried cocaine.

- An estimated 4 million persons have used cocaine in the past month, and an estimated 12 million have used it in the past year.
- The National Household Survey on Drug Abuse found no change in the annual number of persons age 25 and younger who used cocaine in the past year between the 1979 and 1982 surveys.

- Similarly, there has been no significant change in the proportion of high school seniors who report having used cocaine in the past year.
- o The number of persons who have used cocaine during the past year, aged 26 and older, has increased from 2.4 million in 1979 to 4.9 million in 1982. This increase reflects the large number of persons who were drug users in the late 1960s and early 1970s and who are now at least 26 years of age.

3. Risk Factors

Research indicates that heavy marijuana users are much more likely to use cocaine than are those who do not use marijuana. The heavier the marijuana use, the more likely is the progression to cocaine use, to the extent that heavy users are 75 percent more likely to use cocaine.

4. User Characteristics

Use of cocaine, both in the past year and past month, is concentrated in the 18 to 34 (young adult) years.

- Focusing on the "high-risk" 18 to 25 age group, cocaine use is more likely among males than females and more likely among whites than among persons of other races.
- Cocaine use also appears to be more concentrated among young adults in large metropolitan areas in the Northeast and the West.

5. Patterns of Use

- In every age group, the majority of those who have ever used cocaine say they have used marijuana on the same occasion.
- While most often sniffed, alternate methods of ingestion (i.e., smoking, a practice generally referred to as "freebasing," or injecting the drug, including injecting a combination of heroin and cocaine, known as "speedballing") are now frequently reported.
- Either smoking or injection of cocaine can lead to intensive use and drug-seeking behavior which may be destructive to personal competence and productivity. In

addition, there are increasing reports that even the snorting of cocaine leads to serious adverse consequences which not only may impair health but also can lead to familial and financial collapse.

6. Prevalence of Health Consequences

There have been dramatic increases in the reported frequency of persons requiring treatment for acute and chronic consequences of cocaine use.

- Clinicians have reported that the number of persons seeking treatment for cocaine has increased, and that, on average, there is a 3-5 year time lag between the onset of cocaine use and entry to drug abuse treatment.
- Admission data from a panel of hospital emergency rooms that have consistently reported for 5 years indicate a twofold increase in the number of cocaine-related admissions between 1980 and 1983, from 3,131 to 6,059.
- o Both the need for medical care in emergency rooms and drug abuse treatment is concentrated in the 26 to 34 age group.
- Similarly, near twofold increases in cocaine-related deaths from 169 to 312 between 1980 and 1983 were reported by medical examiners. Approximately 25 percent of these deaths involved use of cocaine in combination with heroin.

7. Supplies of Cocaine

Even though an increased amount of cocaine has been produced in South America, the drug enforcement activities of the United States and other governments have limited the impact of this production on the United States.

- o The United States and other governments seized 30 metric tons of cocaine in 1984.
- Nineteen cocaine processing laboratories have been destroyed in the United States in recent months.
- o The Columbian government is experimenting with herbicides to destroy coca bushes.
- Border interdiction and domestic supply reduction efforts were substantially strengthened, resulting in a sharp increase in the amount of cocaine seized and the number of domestic laboratories shut down.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

This is in response to your letter of March 13, 1985, to the Attorney General concerning drug paraphernalia. Representatives Gilman and Levine joined in signing your letter.

The Department has reviewed this issue, as indicated by former Assistant Attorney General McConnell in his letter of March 20, 1984, with a view toward determining whether federal drug paraphernalia legislation would be desirable. In this regard, the Department has long been and remains of the view that general federal jurisdiction over drug paraphernalia would represent an inappropriate use of limited federal law enforcement resources. The review last year, therefore, related to the specific question of whether a narrow federal drug paraphernalia statute, limited to interstate and foreign commerce in such items, would be worthwhile in terms of the overall drug enforcement effort. Our judgement is that even such a narrow federal undertaking would, at this time, represent an unjustifiable diversion of urgently needed resources away from the national drug enforcement effort.

As the Select Committee has noted in recent reports, we are at a critical juncture in our efforts to curb illegal drugs. Despite unprecedented successes in striking at and destroying large drug trafficking syndicates, the favorable growing conditions experienced in virtually every drug producing area of the world have resulted in increased availability of some types of drugs in the face of the most intensive drug enforcement effort ever mounted. We believe the proper response to this threat is to further intensify our efforts with respect to the entire range of drug control initiatives: expanded drug education and treatment programs, strengthened crop substitution and eradication efforts in

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drug producing nations, stepped up drug interdiction efforts and intensified domestic enforcement operations. Given these high priority areas of activity and a federal budgetary situation requiring extreme austerity measures, we do not believe this is an appropriate time to be taking on new enforcement initiatives.

With respect to State paraphernalia enforcement activities, we do not believe that the absence of federal enforcement is impeding State and local enforcement. In this regard, while approximately 38 States have enacted drug paraphernalia laws, there has been little or no enforcement in some of these States. While it may be said that the failure of many States to enforce drug paraphernalia laws is due to the availability of paraphernalia through the mails or other interstate shipment, we do not believe that such sources of supply substantially undermine State enforcement efforts. Moreover, to the extent that out-of-State suppliers are perceived as circumventing State and local enforcement efforts, the Supreme Court has upheld the ability of States to reach outside their borders to stop activities in other States which impact within the State seeking relief, <u>Strassheim</u> v. Daily, 221 U.S. 280 (1911).

In short, while we share the Committee's interest in the drug paraphernalia problem, we do not believe this is the time for the federal government to enter into an area of law enforcement which has traditionally been reserved for State and local jurisdiction.
