Subject: Visit of Crown Prince & Princess of Japan -- Request for October 6 Social Call on President and Mrs. Reagan

President and Mrs. Reagan have agreed to host a dinner for Crown Prince Akihito and Princess Michiko at the White House on October 6. The Japanese have requested that the Crown Prince and Princess be invited to the White House for a brief social visit with President and Mrs. Reagan prior to the dinner. The Department endorses this request, which would be appropriate to reacquaint the two couples before dinner as well as to lend a desired aspect of officiality to their visit.

For practical purposes the Crown Prince should be considered Japan's sovereign representative when traveling overseas. The Emperor (age 85) has not traveled outside of Japan since his 1975 journeys to the U.S. and Western Europe. Instead the Crown Prince has traveled extensively and explicitly on the Emperor's behalf to reciprocate the state visits of numerous government leaders and sovereigns to Japan. Properly noting these circumstances, the President in November 1983 invited the Crown Prince, not the Emperor, to visit the U.S. to reciprocate the President's state visit to Japan.

In recognition of this delicate practical matter, the Department has termed the October 3 to 19 visit of the Crown Prince and Princess a "formal" visit as opposed to a "state" or "official" visit. A polite, low-key welcome to the U.S. by the President and Mrs. Reagan at a pre-dinner meeting for coffee or tea would be respectful of the Emperor and appropriate to recognize the formal character of the visit. It would be entirely satisfactory to the Japanese.

MITI MINISTER TAMURA began by expressing the GOJ's deep regret for the Toshiba 9-axis milling machine diversion to the Soviet Union. He stated the security of the entire free world had been damaged and that Japan intended to respond appropriately. Sanctions would be applied under the law, a full investigation would be conducted, and the government would ensure that such events will not take place in the future. The Japanese legal framework would be changed to strengthen criminal penalties (from the present three to five years imprisonment), to extend the statute of limitations (three to five years), and to empower the government to pose administrative sanctions (banning exports by a particular firm for three years). Tamura said that if there were any MITI responsibility, it was that MITI had not been able to see through the false export license application. MITI would therefore strengthen its entire approach to licensing and would increase its staff from 40 to 80. MITI will introduce new educational and training measures internally, intensify supervision and monitoring of its own system, and investigate any

other similar incidents in the past. (Presumably a reference to the four 5-axis machines that were also diverted.) Japan would also respond to the improved quietness of Soviet subs through intensified, cooperative R&D/ASW work with the U.S.

As for the Toshiba itself, Toshiba Machine will voluntarily not export to the Soviet Union even after the one year ban expires; will force the resignation of any and all employees involved in the diversions; and Toshiba Corporation as a whole will develop, on the basis of USG advice, a new COCOM control program and enforce it in the entire company. Finally, Tamura noted that popular awareness of national defense has diminished in Japan as a result of 40 peaceful years. Tamura said that GOJ will endeavor to impress people with a new awareness of national security, and that it is more important than the preoccupation with market share.

Frank Carlucci thanked Tamura for his remarks, and said that the President fully endorsed the goal of strengthening U.S./Japanese relationship. The President had great affection for the Prime Minister, and wanted to work out a solution to the present Carlucci said we do not seek revenge; we have common interests and should profit by this experience to strengthen our defenses. The cost has been very high in both human and economic terms. Japan's intention to strengthen participation in COCOM, both financial and with its personnel, is very welcome. also true for the new Japanese legislation, but Japan itself needs to determine how tough the penalties have to be to deter future violations. <u>Carlucci</u> said that pending Congressional legislation will be opposed by the Administration, but that to be effective on the Hill the Administration needed Japan's followup and visible progress on same. Carlucci noted that we had a co-mingling of emotions at the present time on the Hill on Toshiba and protectionist sentiment. Dean stressed the importance to timeliness in the Japanese measures. replied that any legal change such as this would invite political confrontation, but that the Japanese government will nevertheless propose the bill in this session of the Diet.

MITI Vice Minister Kuroda passed a note to Dean during the meeting which said, "We tried to respond to your non-paper as specific and concrete as possible (sic)". Kuroda also said that the team had been dismayed by Congressman Hunter's insistence that Japan pay compensation of \$30 billion (30 subs x \$1 billion), and said further, that Hunter favored a total ban of Toshiba products to the U.S.

Dear Mr. President:

In 1945, I was the Project Attorney at one of seven War Relocation Centers. There were in Washington a chief counsel to the Administrator, two assistant chief, and, as I recall, two other attorneys on the staff.

All of is atterneys were polled on the legality or correctness of the President's order for the removal of persons of Tapanese descent from the western states (West Gost). Of the twelve lawyers, I was the only one who, for food and sufficient, reason, defended the order.

I should tell you that, more than most of the staff, I socialized with the Japanese residents, sympathized with their plight and problems and helped them as I could even to obtaining a cash settlement of a claim which my predecessor, one of those later in Washington, had summarily dismissed.

I know of no one else in the War Relocation Authority, from the Administrator down, who agreed with the Supreme Court's decision as it later emanated.

Intimately acquainted with the hardships suffered and aware of the heroism of the 444 Bettalion, I have believed through the years and still do that, as a legal proposition, compensation should not be made to those who were thus affected or to their descendants, whatever politics and so-called practicality and expedience may indicate.

DRAFT JOINT STATEMENT BY PRESIDENT REAGAN AND PRIME MINISTER NAKASONE ON ECONOMIC ISSUES

President Reagan and Prime Minister Nakasone reaffirmed their commitment made at the 1986 Tokyo Summit to strengthen international economic policy coordination. They welcomed the progress that has been made toward this end, including the commitments and actions embodied in the Louvre Accord, and at the recent meeting of the G-7 in Washington. They agreed that reducing the large trade imbalance between the U.S. and Japan -- which they view as unsustainable -- is a key objective of their policy efforts.

In this regard, the President emphasized his determination to reduce the U.S. budget deficit. He also pledged to pursue vigorously policies designed to improve the competitiveness of American industry, and to resist firmly protectionist pressures. Prime Minister Nakasone outlined his plan to take extraordinary action to stimulate economic growth in Japan. This action includes the step already taken by the Bank of Japan to begin operations to lower short-term interest rates. The Ministry of Finance supports this action. Other short and medium-term policy actions to stimulate growth will include: support for the governing Liberal Democratic Party's proposals for near-term enactment of a comprehensive economic package, including unprecedented front-loading of public works expenditures and fiscal stimulus measures amounting to more than 5 trillion yen;

further measures to liberalize Japanese capital markets; and redoubled efforts to implement the recommendations for structural reform in the Maekawa Report.

The President and Prime Minister agreed that outstanding trade issues between the two countries need to be resolved expeditiously. In this connection, they referred to the specific discussion of trade policy matters in their respective departure statements.

The President and Prime Minister agreed that a further decline of the dollar could be counterproductive to their mutual efforts for stronger growth in their economies and for reduced imbalances. In that connection, they reaffirmed the commitment of their governments to continue to cooperate closely to foster stability of exchange rates.

I have received your letter dated April 23, 1987 concerning agricultural policy issues.

I share your concern over the problems that arise from the current grave situation involving agriculture. I also respect the endeavor you are exerting to reform U.S. agricultural policy. Your initiative now being taken to pursue the policy goal of reducing domestic agricultural support in the direction of a more market-oriented policy will certainly make a great contribution to resolving the worldwide problem of the oversupply of agricultural protects.

Japan, now reaching a substantially low level of food self-sufficiency, has been contributing to the stable development of world agricultural trade as the largest importer of agricultural products in the world. We are also embarking upon the improvement of our agricultural structure toward a more market-oriented policy. In fact, we have taken a policy initiative to restrain domestic price support and concrete actions to reduce the price support for some products are already under way.

Our agricultural budget has also been on the path of steady reduction over the past several years while major exporting countries have substantially expanded their agricultural budgets. Moreover, Japan has implemented a steady adjustment of production for a number of agricultural products in accordance with their supply and demand situation, which includes the initiation of a substantial scale of adjustment on rice production in this fiscal year.

I share your conviction on the pressing need for us, particularly those of the Summit member countries, to work together for finding a solution to the current international agricultural problem.

The forthcoming OECD Ministerial Meeting will undertake discussions on the issues of agricultural supports. The discussions should reflect the viewpoints of both exporting and importing countries, and give due consideration to various important roles to be played by agriculture such as stable food supply and preservation of environment. I trust that participating Ministers will deliver a clear signal for the policy direction we should take, both in short and long terms.

In Venice, I wish to discuss this matter with you and other colleagues, taking account of the above developments. I also agree with you in this connection on the essential role to be given to the process of agricultural negotiations in the Uruguay Round. I am fully convinced that it is highly important that in the Round we address the issues of increasing discipline on the use of all direct and indirect subsidies affecting agricultural trade and improving market access, inter alia, through the reduction of import barriers.

I look forward to seeing you soon.

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

Dear Mr. Brewer:

Thank you for your letter regarding certain exports to the Soviet Union by Toshiba Machine Corporation of Japan and Kongsberg, Vaapenfabrikk of Norway.

The Department of Commerce is deeply concerned about these exports of strategic equipment which were in violation of international export control agreements. However, the exports did not break U.S. law, since no U.S. products were involved.

The Japanese and Norwegian Governments have assured us that they will investigate and punish those responsible in accordance with the laws of their countries, and that they are determined to prevent any recurrence of the event. As you may have read in the press, both Governments have already announced the implementation of such preventive measures. Therefore, the Administration is opposes pending legislation that seeks retribution, in the form of payment for damages or sanctions barring the firms from the U.S. market.

Barring the firms from the U.S. market could be counterproductive

Barring the firms from the U.S. market could be counterproductive because some American firms would suffer as well from an import ban. A ban could hurt also our ability to obtain the full cooperation of the two governments in strengthening their export control measures. This case emphasizes the need for a renewed commitment from all of our trading partners, to thoroughly review export licenses and enforce export controls, and to work in cooperation with one another to prevent the Soviets from acquiring strategic technology.

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Dear President, Ronald Reagan:

As one of your constituents, I appeal to you to restore reason to Congress and to stop proposed legislation that threatens the livelihood of my company and our employees. I am Al Smile, President, of Smiles Communication Systems, Inc., located in Johnson City, Tennessee; and the proposed legislation would ban Toshiba products from the United States, products on which my company depends.

As an independent American business, we have invested our resources and our personal futures in providing products and services to our community, products and services which we believe our neighbors prefer. We market, service and depend heavily on Toshiba telecommunications equipment. If these products are denied us, as the proposed trade ban seems geared toward doing, our business will suffer mightily and needlessly.

All for what? So some Congressman can get TV coverage at a "product bashing" session in Washington, D.C.? That did not help us, your constituents. That did not help the United States. Instead, it had the aura of a "book burning."

Indeed, under our system of justice, Congress does not pick out individuals to punish; in this year of our Constitution's Bicentennial you would think the Senate would have known

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and for the future of our twenty-four people, as well as our own suppliers who will suffer because of a situation in which none of us were directly involved, or even knew about.

I will appreciate your consideration in this matter. I have also taken the liberty of enclosing a reprint of a recent ad which we prepared for Toshiba Medical Systems. It calls out the many hospitals and medical institutions which currently use and depend upon Toshiba Medical System's highly technological diagnostic imaging products. It should also give you a better idea of what they do.

I thank you for your time and hope that hearing from a source other than a Toshiba spokesperson or a lobbyist will give you a clearer picture of the situation. And also, how it affects a great many Americans other than those who work directly for Toshiba.


