in response to your request for updated information on the Aid for Adoption of Children Program (AAC), we have prepared the attached tables on age, health condition and ethnic group for calendar year 1971 as well as the period January through April of 1972.

For 1971, we processed 4266 ADOP 42(R) forms indicating relinquishment adoption placements. Of this total, 346 (8.1 percent) adopting families were receiving or scheduled to receive Aid for Adoption of Children. Three thousand, eight hundred and fifty-four (90.3 percent) were non-AAC and 67 (1.6 percent) were unknown in regard to AAC. The average amount of AAC needed per month, for placements in which the amount is known, was \$88. (NOTE: Relinquishment adoptions summary form AD 56C shows an additional 130 placements for which characteristics data are not available.)

During the period January through April 1972, we received completed ADOP 42(R) documents indicating 749 relinquishment placements. There were 74 (9.9 percent) AAC placements, 649 (86.6 percent) non-AAC placements, and 26 (3.5 percent) placements with AAC status unknown. The average known monthly amount of AAC was \$92.

FOR INCEDIATE RELEASE

Robert B. Carleson, State Director of Social Welfare, announced today that the number of out-of-state and out-of-country welfare recipients has declined by more than half during the last six months.

"In July," Carleson said, "we initiated a pilot project to track down California welfare recipients with mailing addresses out-of-state for prosable despitable

"There were 6,200 of these recipients," Carleson noted.

"We sent the lists to all other states and asked them to verify that these recipients were not duplicated on their welfare rolls."

"Concurrently, we issued a regulation limiting the maximum out-of-state duration to 60 days, unless exceptional circumstances were involved."

"The information received from other states," said Carleson, "indicated many instances of probable duplication - both because of administrative errors and possible fraul by recipients."

"In either case," Carleson noted, "identification of the situation made corrective actions possible."

"Other states, including Texas, Oklahoma, Missouri and Florida, have also taken up the project. They furnished us lists of their welfare recipients in California and we have checked these cases for them."

"The net result because of the regulation change and our surveillance is that (1/2) (1/2) today there are 2,900 out-of-state recipients instead of 6,200, and 60 out-of-country recipients instead of 200."

"Also," Carleson noted, "California is on the verge of implementing a statewide computer system that will permanently eliminate many types of edministrative errors and recipient fraud."

"When a person applies for welfare in any county in the state, the welfare department will only need to inquire over a line to the central index center in Sacramento to find out is that person is already on welfare in the same, or any other county."

"The same system will correctly compute the grant amount, thus eliminating the extensive overpayments that exist today."

"These administrative improvements," Carleson noted, "are not a part of welfare reform legislation as such, but demonstrate that significant program improvements can often be obtained by administrative innovations alone."
