HEADLINE: INAUGURATION OF GOVERNOR BOOTH

At an early hour yesterday morning a stranger might have seen that some event out of the usual order was to take place in the city, not alone from the numerous stragglers about the streets italics en militaire, end italics but the general air of the people, as if in anticipation of something to come. There was an influx of people from the country to swell the already large number that had found quarters among us. There was more than the usual amount of music from bands. There were more dressy ladies, and men done up in holiday attire, than are generally to be seen on ordinary occasions. It was evident, without the knowledge imparted by the press, that a gala day was in store for the multitude. The city was full. At 10:00 A.M., according to the programme of the morning, the military began to concentrate at the Pavilion, corner of M and Sixth Streets, and in process of time the whole were placed in line along M Street. All being in order, the march commenced in the following order: General Howell and staff; Twelfth Infantry Band; Sacramento Hussars; San Francisco Hussars, on foot; Blythe's Band; MacMahon Grenadiers; Emmet Guard; Vallejo Band; Vallejo Rifles; San Francisco Band; National Guard, San Francisco; City Guard of Sacramento; Sarsfield Grenadier Guard, of Sacramento; Frisbie Guard, of Vallejo; University Cadets, of Oakland; and Sacramento Zouaves. The line of march from the Pavilion was along Sixth Street to J, up J to Tenth, thence along Tenth to the Capitol. The military, most of the companies wearing high bear-skin caps and handsome uniforms, presented a very fine appearance. It was altogether, the most showy display ever yet made at an inauguration of a Governor in the State, and elicited much commendation. Arriving at the Capitol the troops were formed in line to receive Governor Haight. A salute of thirteen guns was fired in the Capitol grounds by the Sacramento artillery company, who had put themselves in position for the purpose in advance. Governor Haight emerged from the Capitol, and with General Allen and staff, was received by the military and escorted in a carriage down O Street to Eighth, along Eighth to J, down J to Front and to the residence of Governor Booth, where, after the usual military formalities, both Governors entered a carriage and the following was the order of the march:

First, the cavalry; second, one battalion of infantry; third, carriages containing Governor Haight, Governor Booth, Lieutenant-Governor Romualdo

Pacheco, Chief Justice Rhodes of the Supreme Court, A. C. Niles, Supreme

Judge-elect; Governor Bradley of Nevada, Governor Woods of Utah, ex-Governor

J. F. Chellis, Robert Watt, James J. Green, A. F. Coronel, F. Baehr,

J. W. Bost, Robert Gardner, Jo Hamilton, J. L. Love, J. L. Nichols,

Frury Melone, General Cazneau and staff, General Cobb and staff, General

Hewston and staff, and others; fourth, battalion of infantry; fifth, battalion

of infantry; sixth, colored infantry; seventh, Sacramento Light Artillery.

The route of the procession was Front to L, L to Second, Second to J, J to Tenth, and along Tenth Street to the Capitol.

The time consumed brought the procession to the Capitol grounds at fifteen minutes to 2:00 P.M. A hasty stand had been prepared in front of the Capitol and looking to the west. Several wagon-loads of chairs had been brought and distributed upon the platform about the stand, affording sitting for a large number of ladies and gentlemen. The balconies, the windows, and every available spot about the building were occupied, and masses of men were congregated upon the ground on the sidewalks, and in the streets. At a quarter to 2:00 the two Governors made their appearance upon the platform, accompanied by Lieutenant-Governor Pacheco, the joint committee of the two Houses, and all the gentlemen in carriages in the train. Mounting the stand, the oath of office was administered first to Governor Booth and then to Lieutenant-Governor Pacheco, by the Chief Justice of the State, when a salute was fired by the artillery, and Governor Booth proceeded to deliver his inaugural address, which will be found elsewhere. As usual, Governor Booth was distinctly heard and listened to with close attention. The inaugural has the right ring and will be read and admired not alone within the borders of the State whose chief executive he is.

After the inaugural ceremonies were finished, Governor Haight was the recipient of a marching salute, and Governor Booth was escorted in procession to his residence, accompanied by many prominent citizens.

The military afterwards marched through the streets, the various bands playing favorite airs, and closing a day than which there was never one that passed off so excellently well in every respect.

REAGAN FIRST GOVERNOR TO TAKE OATH IN CAPITOL ROTUNDA

Ronald Reagan will be the first governor of California to take the oath of office in the Rotunda of the State Capitol.

The precedent-setting ceremony will be performed directly beneath the 125-foot high ceiling of the Capitol dome, several feet in front of an imposing statue carved out of white Carrara marble. The statue, by American sculptor Larkin Goldsmith Meade, faces westward and depicts Spain's Queen Isabella lifting a precious pearl girdle before Christopher Columbus, in mute promise to finance the explorer's expedition, even if she must risk her jewels to do so.

The oath will be taken on a 400 year-old mission Bible brought to California by Padre Junipero Serra.

Use of the statuary as a backdrop for the occasion and the Bible will be consistent with the theme of Inaugural Week: "Fiesta California." The theme will reflect the romantic heritage left from California's early Spanish era.

Since the present Capitol was formally opened for use by the state government in 1869, most of California's governors (17) have taken the oath in the building's Assembly chamber before joint sessions of the legislature. Although construction of the Capitol was not completed until 1874, it was sufficiently ready for service by the governor and legislature by late 1869.

Three swearings-in were administered on the west steps of the Capitol, including that of Newton Booth who, December 8, 1871, was the first governor to take the oath of office there.

On January 6, 1931, Governor James Rolph, Jr., was sworn in on the Capitol's front steps before a bank of microphones which broadcast the ceremony over a statewide radio hookup.

Governor Edmund G. Brown was the most recent governor to take the oath on the front steps of the Capitol, January 7, 1963.

More unusually situated oath-taking ceremonies by governors since the opening of the State Capitol included:

-- Romualdo Pacheco (Lieutenant Governor), in the governor's office, February 27, 1875. He succeeded Governor Newton Booth, who resigned in office to become a U. S. Senator.

- -- Robert W. Waterman (Lieutenant Governor), in the parlor of the Occidental Hotel, San Francisco, September 13, 1887. Waterman succeeded Governor Bartlett who died in office.
- -- James N. Gillett, in the old Clunie Opera House, Sacramento, January 9, 1907.
- -- Frank F. Merriam (Lieutenant Governor), Los Angeles, June 3, 1934, an hour after being informed of the death of Governor James Rolph, Jr.
- -- Goodwin J. Knight (Lieutenant Governor), in assembly hall of State Office Building, Los Angeles, October 5, 1953. Knight assumed the governorship when Governor Earl Warren resigned the office to become Chief Justice of the U. S. Supreme Court.

SWEARING-IN PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

SACRAMENTO -- The 12:01 A. M. Capitol Rotunda swearing-in ceremony

January 2 will include choral music, an invocation, the oaths of office for

Governor-elect Ronald Reagan and Lieutenant Governor-elect Robert Finch, and

brief remarks by Reagan, Finch, State Supreme Court Justice Marshall F. McComb

and U. S. Senator George Murphy.

Justice McComb will swear in Reagan.

Senator Murphy will administer the oath to Finch.

The event will be viewed by more persons than any swearing-in ceremony in history, except for that of the President of the United States, by live television. It will be carried by 18 television stations in California.

Nine live television cameras (split between three separate originating feeds) will be set up for the occasion in the Capitol Rotunda.

The ceremony will last between 15 and 20 minutes, according to Inaugural Director Sandy Quinn.

The swearing-in will be performed on a raised platform in front of the historic statue of Christopher Columbus and Queen Isabella in the center of the Rotunda.

Seven persons will occupy the platform (left to right): Finch,
Mrs. Finch, Murphy, State Senate Chaplain-designate Reverend Wilbur Choy,
McComb, Mrs. Reagan and Reagan.

Choral music will be provided by the University of Southern California Chamber Singers under the direction of Dr. Charles C. Hirt. They will sing opening and closing selections, and a brief choral response following the invocation.

The platform party will enter the Rotunda from the north wing of the Capitol moments before the ceremony begins.

The program will start with the choral group singing America the Beautiful.

Reverend Choy will then offer the invocation.

Next Senator Murphy will offer a few brief remarks, after which he will swear in Finch. Finch will then speak briefly.

This will be followed by the remarks of Justice McComb. He will then administer the oath of office to Reagan who, in turn, will greet the people of California with a few brief remarks.

The ceremony will conclude with the singing of America (My Country Tis of Thee) by the choir.

Attendance at the ceremony will be restricted to family and friends of the

The "Fiesta California" theme to be interwoven through several key

Inaugural Week activities in Sacramento will reflect the romantic legacy left
to California from its early Spanish era.

The colorful heritage will find its expression in the music, decor and tenor of such events as the swearing-in ceremony, Governor's Reception and Inaugural Ball.

-- The oath of office will be taken on a 400 year-old Bible which was brought to California by Padre Junipero Serra, founder of the missions. The ceremony will be performed immediately in front of a white marble statue which depicts Queen Isabella lifting a precious pearl girdle before Christopher Columbus, in mute promise to finance the explorer's expedition, even if she must risk her jewels to do so.

-- The Governor's Reception and Inaugural Ball will both reflect the "Fiesta California" theme through overall decor and some Mariachi-type music.

THE LEGACY IN BRIEF

For nearly three centuries following her discovery by Juan Rodriguez

Cabrillo in 1542, California led a relatively tranquil existence under the aegis

of the Spanish crown and later, when New Spain revolted from the mother country,

the rule of Mexico. During this early period, the comparatively small number of

military men, explorers, missionaries and rancheros who inhabited what was

then known as "Alta (Upper) California" were able to amass a legacy for

generations yet to come, a heritage whose enormous impact is far out of

proportion to the relative handful of persons who left it.

Place names derived from the Spanish idiom -- such as Sacramento, San Francisco, Los Angeles and San Diego -- have literally survived by the hundreds. Highways such as El Camino Real follow old trails. Our vocabulary is enriched by scores of words carried over from Spanish. Numerous celebrations, fiestas, rodeos, and the like, harken back to those romantic days. Many modern trends in architecture and furniture, particularly in California, perpetuate the general style features of the Hispano-Mexican period in the state.

Other important aspects of this heritage have been history, folklore and appeal to the imagination. The historical record is rich in non-documentary materials, many of which are located in California's chain of missions. In addition to the vast amount of literature, diaries, journals, personal histories and descriptions available on early California, archives in Spain and Mexico still contain unpublished treasures. Novels, plays, motion pictures and television programs have interpreted the legends, spirit and charm associated with the dons of the era.

The coast of California was first sighted by Cabrillo just 50 years after Columbus discovered the New World.

After exploring the entire coastline by ship -- in search of a water-way which would pierce the continent and somehow provide a route eastward to the "spice islands" -- a member of Cabrillo's crew wrote: "There are mountains which reach the sky, and the sea beats upon them. When sailing along near the land, it seems as if the mountains would fall upon the ships."

However impressed the men were with the awesome sights along the coast, they were disappointed because they had failed to find the waterway they sought. The word they carried back with them was that the land was forbidding and bore no evidence of wealth.

Other daring men, including Drake, Cermenho and Vizcaino, sailed the western ocean and explored the mountainous coast, but it was not until 1769 that a missionary priest from the Mediterranean island of Mallorca, Padre Junipero Serra, helped found Spain's first permanent settlement in Alta California, at San Diego. The next year Monterey was dedicated to the royal crown, and there the red and yellow banner of Spain fluttered over a few brush-covered, mud-daubed huts where 20 Spanish and Indians held Alta California.

Jointly, church and army ruled the province where, ever so slowly, settlements increased in number. When New Spain revolted from the mother country in 1821 and became Mexico, a mere sprinkling of tiny settlements and missions along 500 miles of coast was essentially all that constituted Mexican Alta California.

This pastoral era witnessed the rise of "ranchos" where "rancheros" raised cattle across their sprawling land grants. Scant attention was paid to boundary limits. Land itself was not a premium and had no particular value apart from improvements on it and the use made of it.

Cattle roamed over a thousand hills. Horses became so numerous that they were hunted down to save grazing land for the cattle. Hides and tallow could be bartered to English and Yankee traders for items of a more sophisticated nature. Life was relaxed and casual. The rancheros prospered.

Pastoral California reached its romantic high point in the way of life practiced on the ranchos. Strange amusements reflect the spirit of the times. Grizzly-bear hunting, with lasso and mustang was a royal sport. Wild horse hunting and bull and bear fights were also popular. Rodeos were gala occasions. "Vaqueros", or cowboys, had no fences to ride which enabled them to escape the kind of drudgery associated with cowboys in the American West.

Rancheros were attired in resplendent apparel. A common costume might be gold or silver-embroidered deerskin shoes; velvet or satin breeches, slashed at the knee, gold-braided and silver-buttoned; velvet or silk vest, with wide sash of red satin; dark cloth jacket embroidered in gold and silver; wide, flat-topped sombrero with cord of silver or gold.

Women dressed in more sedate clothing and worked harder at their traditional tasks. Many of them rode and hunted, but picnics were their favorite diversions. Dances highlighted the celebration of every event -- weddings, births, political changes and religious festivals. Such fiestas were opened by the elders, but the younger people later joined in such dances as the contradanza, jarrabe and fandango.

These romantic people were renowned for their hospitality, especially when meals, lodging and provision of riding animals were involved. Rancheros would not think of accepting remuneration from wayfarers to whom they offered their hospitality. In fact, some rancheros even placed a supply of money in their guest rooms which visitors could take if needed.

By 1830, much of California's population could call itself native-born. Those "Californios", which they called themselves, were becoming unhappy with the distant control exercised by Mexico over Alta California. Political feuds with officials from Mexico and between branches of the intricately ramified families of California covered the province with a net of intrigue. It was becoming apparent that Mexico, torn by revolutions and in economic whaos, could not control the distant province.

In 1844, a revolt against Governor Manuel Micheltorena left Pio Pico of Los Angeles as head of Alta California. The removal of the center of government from Monterey only served to justify the differences between the northern and southern sections of the province.

In 1846, about 600 persons crossed the plains to California. By the end of the year some 2,000 of the 10,000 persons in Alta California were foreigners, immigrants from non-Mexican areas, principally the United States.

In the uneasy atmosphere of intrigue and dissatisfaction, it became all the more clear that it would be only a matter of time before the province would fall under U. S. control. America was determined to have the area for itself.

When he received word in the harbor of Mazatlan that a state of war existed with Mexico, U. S. Commodore Sloat set sail immediately for Monterey, arriving July 2, 1846. But, the town was deserted. General Jose Castro and

his army had left Monterey for the south to wrest command of the province from Pie Pico. When Sloat demanded the surrender of California, there was no official present with whom he could deal. Finally, on July 7, 1846, Sloat landed a force of men, marched them to the Monterey Customs House, had the U. S. Flag raised, and proclaimed that California was annexed to the United States.

Although the south revolted, and there were several sharp battles, the "Californios" were no match for the American soldiers, and on January 10, 1847, their surrender was accepted. Even in defeat, the southern uprising demonstrated the gallantry, dash and valor of the "Californios."

With victory complete, statehood was assured. California was admitted to the Union just three and one-half years later, September 9, 1850.

The Capitol Rotunda -- where Ronald Reagan will be sworn in as Governor of California -- is the most striking feature of the interior of the historic building.

It is 53.5 feet in diameter and lies directly beneath the skylight of the Capitol's domed ceiling which towers 125 feet above the floor.

The ceiling is a separate inner dome of brick, some 120 feet below the cupola of the outer dome, placed high enough to convey the effect of loftiness without making the observer on the floor below feel as if he were looking up a broad chimney. The great weight of the outer dome and colonnade is supported by the rotunda walls and foundations, and by masonry arches turned over the halls and vestibules of the upper floors.

The thick walls surrounding the rotunda interior are set in extremely hard mortar. In each of the four wall sections are three panels. These 12 panels, with the panels above the four rotunda archways, form 16 sections which continue upward as decorative unites and terminate at the skylight, also divided into 16 segments.

Four groups of mural paintings decorate the walls. These were commissioned by the Legislature in 1913. The artist, Arthur Mathews, has portrayed some of the events and phases of California history. Mathews belonged to a group of artists who painted the brilliant California landscape in subdued tones, and these murals seem rather dark, though they are brightened by patches of red.

The first mural group (southeast sector) portrays the discovery of California. Indians standing on an ocean shore are alarmed at the sight of two little high-decked vessels in which Sir Francis Drake and his men approach. The central panel is idealistic, showing the bearing of life and spiritual hope to the Indians. In the third panel, a handful of Spanish pioneers -- the Anza expedition, led by Moraga -- stands on the shore of the Golden Gate.

The second group (southwest sector) covers the Spanish-Mexican period. In the first panel cattle graze over a rolling, tree-dotted landscape of pleasant hacienda days. The central panel shows a mission (a composite of some of the better-known missions) where Indians are working under the supervision of the padres. In the third panel the people of Monterey, clustered by the Customs House, await the arrival of Commodore Sloat.

The third group (northwest sector) portrays the development of California.

The first panel shows the discovery of gold at Coloma. The second panel has

an idealistic treatment of a band of emigrants carrying the Bear Flag and the Stars and Stripes; a blanketed Indian behind a rock watches them pass. The third panel, also idealistic, has a river steamer in the foreground; a green third panel, also idealistic, has a river steamer in the foreground; a green dome -- possibly that of the Capitol -- emerges from a cloud of smoke; in the background stands a group of tall modern buildings.

The fourth group (northeast sector), completely idealistic, might almost be conceived as a version of a traditional "happy ending." The first panel shows girls dancing amid sprays of blossoming boughs. The central and third panels are continuous in theme. In the foreground a youth is sculpturing a heroic figure; in the distance rises an ideal city of Greco-Roman architecture.

The most noticeable decorative feature of the rotunda is a group of statuary in white Carrara marble occupying the center of the floor. Larking Goldsmith Meade (1835-1910), an American sculptor noted for heroic statuary, carved this group in Florence, Italy, between 1868 and 1874. (In 1878 Meade assisted in the completion of the Washington Monument in the National capital. His work ornaments many public buildings in the United States.) Darius Ogden Mills, pioneer Sacramento banker, paid \$30,000 to the original owner of the group and presented it to the State. It was installed in its present location and ceremoniously accepted for California on December 22, 1883, by Governor George Stoneman.

The figures depicted are Columbus and Isabella; the latter's fingers lift a fabulous pearl girdle in mute promise to finance the explorer's expedition even if she must risk her jewels to do so. The figures -- which are scrubbed thoroughly with soap and water once a year -- are mounted on a base of polished gray granite enclosed by a low unpolished granite railing.

Above the rotunda, a circular balcony with an exquisite walnut balustrade seems to be gracefully suspended in space. Supported by the vaulted ceiling of the rotunda, this balcony is profusely ornamented. The rotunda walls are painted green and ornamented with panels, pilasters with capitals, dentil courses and broad decorative bands. Other artistic devices tend to draw the observer's eye to the top of the inner dome and the circular skylight.

Above the third floor levels, two tiers of panels are separated by a row of 16 frosted-glass windows admitting light from the colonnade and clerestory on the outside. The rotunda walls are the most ornate aspect of the Capitol interior. The rotunda balcony is a mosaic of geometric design in red, tan, black and white.

Two flag displays attract the visitor's attention at this level. Twelve display cases set in the panels of the rotunda walls contain national and regimental colors borne by Californians on the battlefield, as well as the American Flag from the Battleship California.

Around the walnut railing of the balcony are displayed ten flags which have at one time or another flown over this State. These include the Spanish Empire Flag (September 28, 1542 to 1785); the Flag of England (June 17-June 23, 1579) planted by Sir Francis Drake; the Spanish National Ensign (1785-1822), which replaced as a national flag Spain's royal standard, or empire flag; the Flag of Russia (September 10, 1812 to December 12, 1841); Buenos Aires Flag (November 20 to December 15 or 16, 1818), raised by the pirate Hippolyte Bouchard when he captured the City of Monterey in November, 1818; the Mexican Flag (April 11, 1822, to July 7, 1846); the Fremont Flag (1842-1846), a special flag given to John Charles Fremont, then a Captain in the Topographical Engineers of the U. S. Army, for use on his exploring expeditions in the West; the Bear Flag (June 14 to July 9, 1846); the Stars and Stripes (July 7, 1846-), which was raised over Monterey when Commodore Sloat landed there at the outbreak of the Mexican War; and finally, the present flag of the United States.

WITH SWEARING-IN

OATH OF OFFICE BIBLE FOUR CENTURIES OLD

SACRAMENTO -- Governor-elect Ronald Reagan and Lieutenant Governor-elect Robert Finch will take the oath of office on a 400 year-old Bible brought to California by Padre Junipero Serra.

The Bible -- published in Lyon, France, in 1568 -- will be removed from the archives of the Carmel Mission for the occasion. The mission was the second to be founded by the famed Spanish missionary in California, in 1770. Serra made the mission his administrative headquarters until his death August 28, 1784.

According to Harry Downie, curator at the Carmel Mission for the past

35 years, Serra "undoubtedly carried the Bible with him into California from

Baja California where he had been president of the established mission system."

The famed missionary "probably used the Bible many times while in Carmel.

It is, to my knowledge, the oldest Mission Bible in California," Downie said.

Its selection for the swearing-in ceremony is consistent with the "Fiesta California" theme of the Inaugural which will emphasize California's early Spanish heritage.

The historic book has a tan sheepskin cover, is eight inches long, six inches wide and three inches thick.

"The Bible," Downie said, "was undoubtedly brought to Mexico from Spain during the early colonial period by Jesuit missionaries. They founded the first mission in Baja California in 1697. When the Jesuits were expelled from Spain and its possessions by King Charles III in 1767, Serra, a Franciscan, was elected president of the Baja California missions.

Two years later, the Viceroy of Mexico (New Spain) sent an expedition northward from Baja California which resulted in the founding of San Diego. The expedition was led by Gaspar de Portola and Serra. Serra's belongings included a number of books. "Although it would be impossible to document, I believe it entirely safe to assume that the Bible (to be used for the swearing-in ceremony) was among these belongings," Downie said.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR GOVERNOR'S INAUGURAL PROCESSION ANNOUNCED

SACRAMENTO -- Sixteen automobiles, two marching bands, two color guards and a motorcycle escort will form Governor Ronald Reagan's Official Inaugural Procession as it winds through downtown Sacramento to the Capitol January 5.

Moments later -- shortly after 11:00 A.M. -- the Governor will deliver his Inaugural address to the people of California from the west steps of the century-old building.

The procession will depart from the Memorial Auditorium at 10:40 A.M., immediately following the Governor's Prayer Breakfast. Twenty minutes later the motorcade will enter the basement parking area of the Capitol. Then he and his party will be whisked up by elevator to the main floor for their entrance onto a platform built over the Capitol steps. Here the Governor will deliver his address.

The route of the procession will be as follows: from the Memorial Auditorium south on 15th to K, west on K to 7th, south on 7th to the Capitol Mall and east on the Mall to the Capitol. (On reaching the corner of 10th Street and the Mall, the motorcade will move south on 10th to N, and east on N to the entrance of the Capitol basement parking area.)

Two chevrons of solo motorcycles -- seven in each chevron -- will lead the procession, followed by a car carrying the State Adjutant General and Deputy State Adjutants General for the California Army and Air National Guard.

Next a color guard comprised of members of the state Army and Air

National Guard will bear the United States Flag and the Flag of the State

of California. These banners -- traditional gifts from the National Guard

Association -- will be unveiled for the first time in the procession, held

during the Inaugural Ceremony, and retired to the Governor's office where they

will remain through his term of office.

After the color guard will come the 561st Air Force Band, California

National Guard, under the direction of Band Master Don Schary. The Band also
marched in President Eisenhower's Inaugural Parade in 1957 and has performed
at the California State Fair over the past 17 years.

The next nine cars will carry participating members of the Governor's platform party, new Constitutional Officers, and the clergy which will participate in the Inaugural Ceremony.

The Sacramento State College Marching Band, directed by Ronald Holloway, will follow, just ahead of the car carrying Lieutenant Governor Robert Finch.

A State Police standard bearer carrying the official flag of the Governor -- also to become a permanent part of his office -- will precede Mr. Reagan's car.

Two open convertibles carrying members of the press will immediately follow the Governor's car.

The procession will be brought up in the rear by two State Police cars.

Except for the two press cars, all automobiles in the procession will be closed due to the winter weather.

Meanwhile, the first of the two marching bands in the Inaugural.

Procession -- the 561st Air Force Band. California National Guard -- will

position itself in the Capitol Circle, near the State Library. The other group -
The Sacramento State College Band -- will split at 10th Street and the Mall,

one half marching to each side of the Capitol steps.

At approximately 11:05, platform guests will exit from the Capitol Rotunda through the large doors of the West Portico onto a large platform built over the front steps of the building. Those to be marshalled onto the platform will include members of the State Legislature, participating clergy, new

Constitutional Officers and their spouses, Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Robert Finch and Governor and Mrs. Reagan.

When all are seated, the ceremony will continue with the invocation (by either James Francis Cardinal McIntyre, archbishop of the diocese of Los Angeles, or by Bishop Alden Bell of the Dioces of Sacramento.)

Next, Finch will convene a joint session of the State Legislature, after which he will introduce the State Constitutional Officers (in this order):

Secretary of State Frank M. Jordan, Controller Houston I. Flournoy, Treasurer

Mrs. Ivy Baker Priest Stevens, Attorney General Thomas C. Lynch and State

Superintendent of Public Instruction Max Rafferty.

Following the introductions, Finch will offer a brief remarks from the rostrum.

Then, the Reverend Don Moomaw, pastor of Governor Reagan's home church in Los Angeles -- the Bel Air Presbyterian Church (16221 Mulholland Drive) will offer a prayer.

The combined Inaugural Band-and-Choir will follow the prayer with a stirring presentation of the Battle Hymn of the Republic, led by John Scott Trotter.

Next, Treasurer Ivy Baker Priest Stevens will introduce Governor Reagan who will then deliver a 20-minute Inaugural address.

The benediction will be pronounced by Rabbi Edgar F. Magnin of the Wilshire Boulevard Temple in Los Angeles. It will be said in both English and Hebrew.

Then, State Adjutant General Roderic L. Hill and his two deputy adjutants general, Brigadier General B. J. Kitt and Brigadier General George W. Edmonds will approach the rostrum and present the colors.

General Hill will salute the Governor. General Kitt of the Army
Division will hold the U. S. Flag, a gift from General Dwight D. Eisenhower.

General Edmonds of the Air division will hold a three-by-five foot California
Bear Flag which was carried through several battles in Vietnam by Sargeant
Robert Howell of Lakeport, California. Howell presented the flag to Reagan on
July 29. Reagan promised than that if elected the flag would fly at his
inauguration.

As the flags are raised the Inaugural Band-and-Chior will offer the National Anthem.

This will be followed by the playing of Ruffles and Flourishes by the 561st Air Force Band at the Capitol Circle.

A 19-gun salute from four cannons located nearby on the Capitol Mall

will then boom out as the Air Force Band plays the Stars and Stripes Forever.

The color guard will retire and Lt. Governor Finch will adjourn the Legislature.

. As the platform party retires and the crowd dispersed, Sacramento musician Thomas Thompson will play songs of California on a 74-bell Carillon.

WITH CAPITOL STEPS INAUGURAL CEREMONY

Ronald Reagan's Inaugural address will be only the fourth such speech to be delivered by a Governor of California from the steps of the present State Capitol in Sacramento.

The first Inaugural address from the Capitol steps was made by Governor

Newton Booth on the afternoon of December 1871 two years after the Capitol

was formally opened for use by the state government.

Booth's speech, from a platform built over the steps, was the high point in a full day of Inaugural pageantry in the capital city, "the most showy display ever yet made at an inauguration of a governor of the state," the Sacramento Daily Union reported the next day. At 19:00 A.M. a host of colorfully attired bands and military marching units with bear-skin caps and handsome uniforms began nearly an entire day of parading and serenading through the streets of Sacramento.

Shortly before 2:00 P.M. Booth and outgoing Governor Henry Haight climbed out of a carriage which had headed a procession of carriages bearing a group of officials and dignitaries from the governor's residence to the Capitol building and a multitude of others looked on from the grounds and streets adjacent to the C pitol's west steps, the ceremony began.

After Booth, and the then Lieutenant Governor Romualdo Pacheco, were sworn in on the stand by State Supreme Court Chief Justice Rhodes, Booth delivered his inaugural address.

"The military afterwards marched through the streets, the various bands playing favorite airs, and closing a day than which there was never one that passed off so excellently well in every respect," the Sacramento Daily Union concluded in its report.

Four years later Governor William Irwin read his inaugural address from the Capitol steps, but it was not until January 5, 1931, that the same setting was chosen for an inaugural speech. In that year, Governor James Rolph, Jr. read his inaugural speech to both a Capitol Park crowd estimated at 5,000 and persons around the state who were tuned to a radio broadcast of the event. Governor Edmund G. Brown delivered his inaugural address from the Capitol steps January 7, 1963.

Since the Capitol was opened, most of the state's governors (17) have chosen the Assembly Chamber as the place to deliver their inaugural address.

put in cold storage here today, ready for use as part of the

The sculptures are being fashioned out of 350-pound blocks of gold-colored ice by James Z. Hansen, manager of the Mather Air Force Base Officers' Club. Hansen, who makes roughly a dozen ice carvings a month as a hobby, has become an expert at it over the past 15 years.

Two of the sculptures will highlight the decor of the Governor's Reception. The other eight will be placed about the circular centerpiece in the Rotunda of the State Fair Counties Building the night of the Ball, Each carving will be two feet high and 42 inches long.

Hansen fashions his figures in ice with carving tools such as "ice chippers, curved saws and rasps."

"I make the carvings in a 'freezing box' at the National Ice and Cold Storage Company, 2338 Ninth Avenue here. The temperature inside is about zero degrees farenheit," he explained.

The ice figures are kept inside until needed. Once taken from cold storage they keep their shape for about eight hours, he said.

According to Hansen, it takes about three hours to fashion each carving.

Hanging from each seal will be a six-foot drop of white satin, covered by a hanging spray of official Inaugural flowers: Blue Bird of Paradise and gold-colored Chrysanthemums.

All the lanterns will contain amber lights. They will replace all existing light fixtures in the building.
- -- A floral ceiling disc will fill the dome ceiling above the Rotunda of the building. The dome will be in bright amber tones.
- -- Outside lighting of the tracery windows in the dome to emphasize their striking multi-colors from the inside.
