EDUCATION ISSUES: Heads-up

Detroit

- There is concern that district high school students are carrying beepers to class as part of drug trafficking among students. / School board member Joan Gacki is pushing a "beeper ban" because the pagers are disrupting classes.
- * Although the Detroit News is supporting stiff penalties for pushers of hard drugs, an editorial (9/12/86) says it "might make sense to decontrol some less harmful substances, such as marijuana."
- * With backing from top Wayne County criminal justice officials, the Detroit Public School System has alerted students and parents that random weapons searches -- sweeps -- will remain part of school policy. Although 106 guns were confiscated last year, the ACLU is filing a new lawsuit against such searches. The Detroit AFT supports the ACLU on this issue. Schools are promising to prosecute both young offenders and adults who let children take weapons to school. School safety has, in part, been responsible for a shortage of teachers in the Detroit Public School System.
- A discipline code approved by the Detroit Board of Education permits administrators to suspend high school students up to a semester for possessing drugs, chronic truancy and other serious misbehavior. Under the old policy, students in grades 9-12 could be suspended for only five days for serious infractions of the conduct code. The board was unanimous in approving the new code.

Statewide

Gov. James Blanchard is pressing the Republican State Senate to pass his state sponsored plan [BEST -- Baccalaureate Education System Trust] which would allow parents to contribute toward the tuition cost of young children to avoid higher tuition fees when the student enrolls in a state institution of higher education. BEST has been passed by the House but GOP Senate Majority Leader John Engler has requested more information before throwing his support toward the plan.

"ENERGYWISE

ECONOMIZE"

- For the first time in 10 years, the state will not have to borrow money for education. State Superintendent of Schools Philip E. Runkel has praised the Governor and the MI legislature for approving a \$1.973 billion state school aid bill. Public schools will receive \$545.96 million -- \$304 per pupil. Public education increases included special education, school transportation, compensatory education, and gifted and talented. Some \$700,000 has been earmarked for a pilot program to prevent school dropouts, and \$1 million for early childhood education.
- In discussing NCAA Propostion 48 -- the pass/play rule for college athletes, the <u>Detroit News</u> (8/27/86) calls the standards "embarrassingly minimal. University of Michigan's top basketball recruit as well as seven other M! public post secondary recruits will be affected. The editorial suggests that the new rule will force public elementary, junior and high schools "to expand their educational missions to include kids who can hit a curve ball or drill a baseline jump shot."
- * At the opening of this school year, four MI school districts were on strike: Port Huron, Cass City, Mt. Clemens and Harbor Beach.
- one of 18 Metro Detroit districts -- has been threatened by a strike because of an unprecedented school board proposal to test teachers for drug use. Lake Shore has experienced some drug abuse recently among teachers and other employees. About 200 teachers are employed by the district.
- A Republican candidate for the State Board of Education, Patricia Hartnagle, is being supported by Pat Robertson's Freedom Council. A Roman Catholic, Mrs. Hartnagle is one of four candidates nominated by the state GOP convention. She has received a qualified endorsement from GOP gubernatorial candidate William Lucas.

Mrs. Caffey will be a panelist for the U.S. Department of Education-funded "Business and Education -- A Time for Plain Talk" conference in Chicago, October 23-24. Co-sponsored by DePaul University and Illinois Bell, the conference will bring together top-level business and education leaders as well as textbook publishers from across the nation to discuss strategies for infusing "work ethic values" into the education curriculum at elementary, secondary and postsecondary levels. Funding is from a Secretary's "3 Cs" discretionary grant.
