If. as has often cent weeks, Ronald Reagan has lost it, has entered the twilight of his presidency, has lost power and popularity, you couldn't tell from the crowd last night at Bud Paolino's Restaurant and Bar.

In a saloon in the Democratic neighborhood of Highlandtown, the kind of people who twice helped vote Mr. Reagan into office listened in a (more or less) respectful hush as the president took his case on the Irancontra affair to the people, and they weighed in at the end with overwhelming approval.



#### HONESTY

Honesty is feared but less than shame. Shame comes from the act done or left undone, never from the admission. Why then, be penalized twice when once is bad enough?

The liar maneuvers and quite often wins a battle. The honest man always wins the war--the war against his divided self. Self respect is the constant companion of the honest man. Self respect and liars are strangers, though they may appear to be old friends.

Lying is to Honesty as leaping the hurdles is to hiking on a mountain trail. There can be poetry in lying but Honesty is always a prayer--often a prayer for forgiveness.

Liars often say they admire Honesty in others and quite often even come half-way to believing their own lies. An honest man quite often walks alone; and, providing he be humble, serenity is his constant companion.

The liar is afraid: he denies his failures and blames others. Honest men learn from their mistakes; knowing that mistakes are not failures unless there is no learning from them. And learning can come after they say, at least to themselves: "It didn't work--why? Tell me more: your views? your ideas? what you would have done and why?" Honest men are wiser than liars but frequently do not seem as bright.

What is truth? Do honest men tell the whole truth - not always. Truth is like a room sized diamond; it is many faceted. Quite often you and I see only one side of the

truth--from our side of the room--the side our past experiences reveals to us as truth.

The honest man shares his vision of the truth and is quick to believe that what he sees may be incomplete; he searches for more. The liar seeks to find and tell only as much of the truth as will help him today— leaping the hurdles; or he may tell the truth in such a way as to deceive. However, the truth eventually outpaces the lie. The honest man is like the hiker, a more comfortable companion for the mountain trail.

But one of the enemies of the honest man is pride. Pride which says: "I don't need a liar." An honest man should be grateful that he has learned the value of telling the truth--not proud of the telling of disparaging of others. The honest man can learn from those who fear the truth--the search is just more troublesome.

Honesty does not necessarily mean that I must tell everything I know; sometimes I can't, sometimes I shouldn't. But the less balancing of the whole and the part, the easier it is to climb that rocky trail. It is much better to change the subject or to say honestly that I am not free to share.

For sins too can be private--that's why there are confessionals and psychiatrists. Must I tell you all that shames me or you or others? No, not always. If I want to tell you so that you can share the guilt--is that love? If I wish to share the truth, so that you and I can help each other grow and learn--that is something else.

The speaking of the truth is often hurtful. But if it is the hurt that is more important—not the speaking of the truth—is that love?

With hurt, anger, sorrow, or shame--the honest man does his best, knowing that humans sometimes fail. The liar simply schemes.

Openness and honesty-fortunate is the man who has learned their value. I cannot learn until I decide to try. I have found that others value me more— though they may not value my ideas; but do they have to? I can only see the truth with my eyes—what they see could well be the other side of the diamond. Keeping all of this in mind, when I share my side of the truth, makes it easier for you to share your side of the truth—and thus you and I learn even more of the whole truth.

And the whole truth is a reflection of God. In searching for truth I am searching for God.

#### HUMILITY

Humility and humiliation are not father and son. The humble man is only too well aware of life's mischievousness--of life's balances; acceptance with grace becomes him.

Nor does he grovel, but stands tall, foursquare, in truth and in error; in victory and in defeat-- and he encourages others to do the same.

He succeeds—in all Humility; he makes mistakes in all Humility. And in the doing of both, he learns and understands—and changes.

Not full of pretense nor worry about rank or place.

Not puffed up like the cobra--only to collapse into himself when the music ends.

His prime concern is with consequential things: the manner of life's living and death's dying; the long climb not the short sprint; the finite beginning of his infinity not the seeming infinity of the finite.

True honor and courage are the humble man's companions—and humor. To care about his place with others but not too much. To care about his place with God and with himself—that is the true caring—the long climb caring. For newspaper headlines, and even obituaries, concern themselves only with the here and now and perhaps the what might have been—not the eternal, someday infinity of me.

And the humble man knows these things and more:

That fame flickers after life's sunset; and the crucifixion of infamy can be short lived, for there are no printed or spoken words where the stars reside--nor even measured reputations.

It is today's grateful living and loving and growing in my eyes and God's--not necessarily in yours--that guarantees a place for me beyond the hills of home.

In Humility I must consent to my humanity--and yours.

With Humanity I must consent to His divinity in us.
