I thought you might want to raise the subject of Pat Goldman's reappointment at today's Personnel Meeting.

Elizabeth Dole feels strongly that it would be a big mistake to not reappoint Goldman. My view is that it costs us little to keep her on the Transportation Safety Board, yet it would have a harmful political effect to not reappoint her.

Recommendation: it would be very well received if we went ahead and indicated our intention of reappointing Goldman. If we wait until pressure mounts (her term expires in December), we will get very little credit.

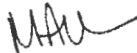

I recently met with Louis P. Terrazas, a leading Hispanic businessman from San Antonio, Texas with excellent Republican credentials. At that time I raised the possibility of his serving on a board or commission, and he indicated he would be pleased to serve in such a capacity. His primary areas of interest are business and foreign trade. He does not wish to be a candidate for positions involving personnel or environmental issues because of possible conflict of interest considerations.

In pursuing this matter further with the Offices of Presidential Personnel and Counsel to the President, Jane Kenny learned that Mr. Terrazas was approved last year by the senior staff for an appointment to the Advisory Committee for Trade Negotiations but was not appointed because his clearance papers were not received on time. According to Mr. Terrazas he completed and mailed them prior to the deadline; according to the White House records they were never received.

While it would not be productive to reconstruct the sequence of events concerning Mr. Terrazas' earlier candidacy, given his excellent credentials, as well as the political situation in Texas, I believe it is essential that he be given "top priority" consideration for appointment to a prestigious board or commission in the near future.

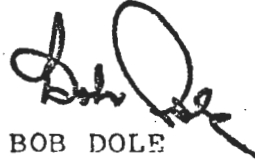

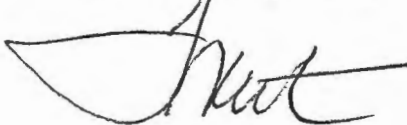

Prior to recommending these appointments, however, I would suggest that some thought be given to the lack of minority representation in Presidential positions at the Department of Labor (DOL). Of the 15 PAS positions at DOL, 2 are held by women (one a careerist); there are no Hispanics and one of the women, Lenore Cole-Alexander, Director of the Women's Bureau, is the only Black.

We have had continuing discussions with Secretary Donovan regarding minority representation, and although he appears understanding, little has changed in the composition of the Department.

The three individuals mentioned above are all white males; in addition, we recently nominated in accord with the Secretary's wishes three others, Ford Ford as Undersecretary, J.J. O'Donnell as Assistant Secretary, and J. Brian Hyland as Inspector General. We also chose to reappoint Dr. Janet Norwood, a careerist, as Commissioner of Labor Statistics.

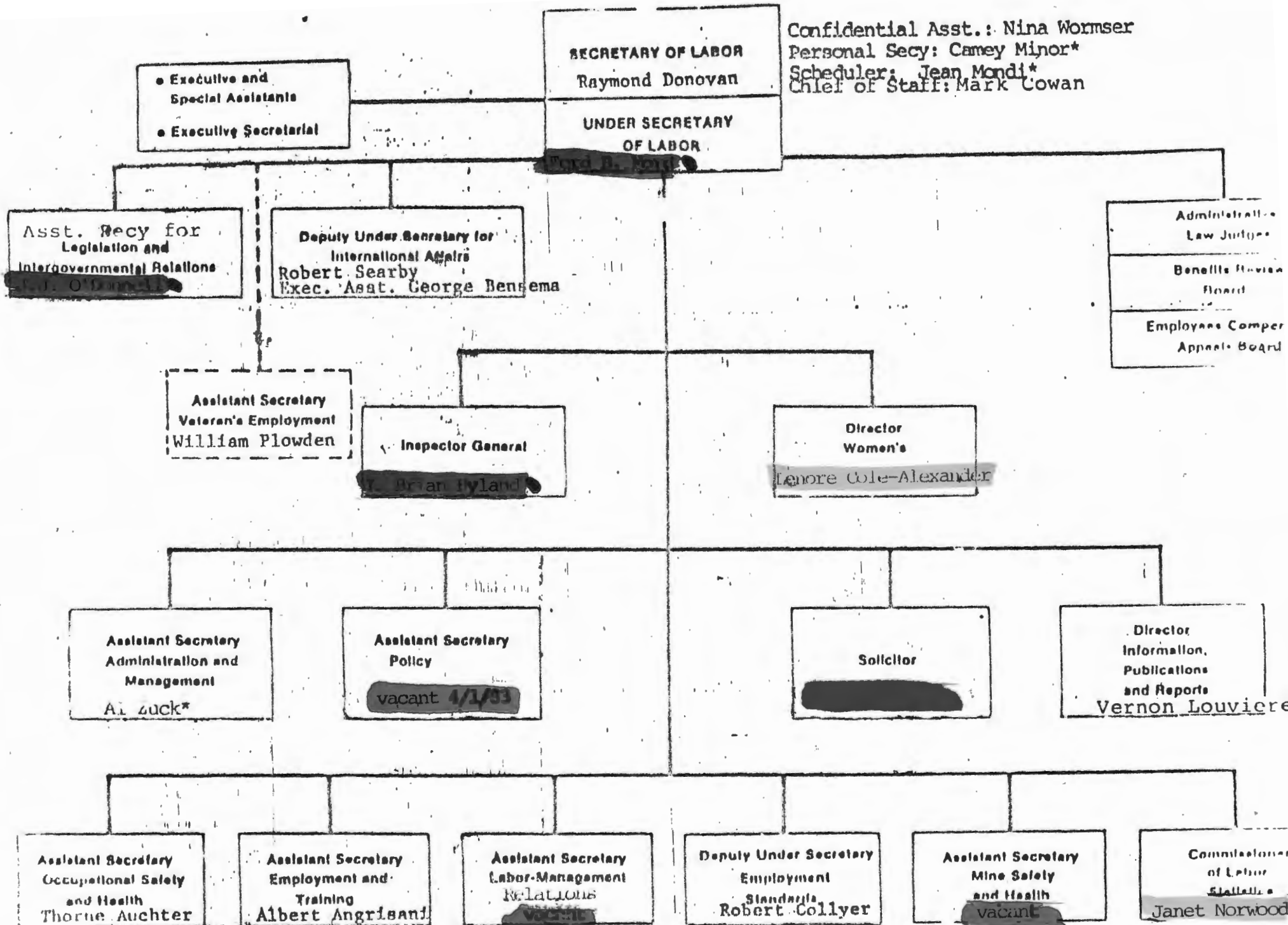
In addition to the above mentioned positions, that of Assistant Secretary for Labor-Management Relations is vacant. We have one candidate for this position who is a woman, but due to the nature of the position there are very few minorities or women with appropriate credentials.

Secretary Donovan anticipates that the position of Administrator of the Wage & Hour Division might soon become vacant and if so suggests we seek a Black with appropriate credentials. Further, the Secretary suggests that we recruit Blacks as Deputies in the Policy and Solicitor's departments and an Hispanic for the Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs. The Secretary's intentions are good, however, these are not Presidential appointments and although important, they lack the visibility and impact of a Presidential appointment.

There have been a number of very fine women and minority candidates referred to the Department of Labor for consideration. If we proceed with the three individuals now recommended it will result in six of the seven most recent vacancies being filled by white males. If our intention is to alter the composition of Presidential appointments with qualified women and minorities it should be recognized we are making little progress.

Please advise how you wish to proceed with the nominations of Messrs. Lilly, Benjamin and Zegeer and future recruiting efforts.
