

Dear Mr. Culvahouse:

The Committee on Foreign Relations has, as you know, examined the classified portions of the diaries of Oliver North and has issued a subpoena for the production of the original diaries which are still in the possession of North and his attorneys.

In the course of exploring the legal issues surrounding the production of the diaries, the Committee has come to understand that these diaries are in the possession of individuals lacking appropriate security clearances and are stored in facilities which have not been approved. Your office and the National Security Council staff have determined that the documents in their original form contain material classified at the codeword level and that the balance of the documents which you have not seen may be classifiable at the same level. This classification places them squarely within Executive Order 12356.

It is the view of the undersigned that no matter how the issue of the Committee subpoena is ultimately resolved, the agency charged with the protection and storage of the documents should be making every effort to retrieve them promptly, secure them and store them properly in accordance with the requirements of the Executive Order.

Inasmuch as the documents were a working record of a member of the National Security Council staff, we believe that the NSC should take prompt steps to retrieve and secure the North notebooks.

The Committee would greatly appreciate knowing what action you plan to take with respect to this matter.
