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

### editor's view

In its 193-year history, no woman has ever served on the U.S. Supreme Court.

This may change soon.

Justice Potter Stewart announced Thursday that he is retiring next month after 23 years on the court. Which brings up the distinct possibility that his replacement on the high-court might indeed by a woman.

What makes this seem so likely is the residential candidate Ronald Reagan told women delegates at July's Republican Convention. "I am announcing," he said at that time, "that one of my first Supreme Court vacancies in my administration will be filled by the most qualified woman I can find."

Not that the president is not already aware of her qualifications, but we believe he has a candidate of the

very highest standards in Elizabeth Dole.

Mrs. Dole, the president's special assistant for public liaison, has been suggested for that position by Kansas Sen. Nancy Kassebaum, a colleague of Mrs. Dole's husband, Kansas Sen. Bob Dole.

Mrs. Dole's qualifications say it all. She was an honor graduate in political science at Duke University and has a master's degree in education and a law degree from Harvard. Under President Lyndon Johnson, she was deputy director of the White House Office of Consumer Affairs. Before taking her current post, one which makes her the highest-ranking woman on the White House staff, she was a member of the Federal Trade Commission. It was there that she received high praise from consumer activists.

Sen. Kassebaum feels her public involvement and inborn sense of fairness make her an outstanding

candidate.

We'll second that. Not only is Elizabeth Dole a distinguished scholar and administrator, but she has earned the high remarks and respect in positions of great responsibility which make her an ideal choice for the Supreme Court. That selection would also be an honor to the state of Kansas.

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

Dear Mr. President:

Although I am certain that you presently are considering many outstanding candidates to fill the vacancy on the U.S. Supreme Court created by the resignation of Associate Justice Potter Steward, I am writing to urge your serious consideration of a superlative New Hampshire justice for this appointment, also. The Honorable Charles G. Douglas, III of Hopkinton, Associate Justice of the New Hampshire Supreme Court.

While I will comment more directly on Judge Douglas below, I think it appropriate to note that no New Englander is currently a member of the Court, nor has there been an appointment from this region for many years. While our distinguished former Chief Justice of the New Hampshire Supreme Court, the late Frank R. Kenison, was considered seriously for appointment to the Supreme Court by President Eisenhower, New Hampshire has not figured strongly even in speculation about an appointment for many years. I request that you take mind of this factor and the need for geographical balance on the Court in your deliberations.

Justice Douglas, 39, has served on the New Hampshire Supreme Court since 1977 and was on the Superior Court for three years prior to that. He was legal counsel to former Governor Meldrim Thomson, Jr. from January 1973 until his appointment to the Superior Court in November 1974. A graduate of the University of New Hampshire and Boston University Law School, Justice Douglas also practiced law privately in Manchester and Concord. He was active in the Republican Party prior to his becoming a judge.

Since becoming a judge, Chuck Douglas has gained a national reputation for his work in resolving the balance between the public's right to know and all individuals' right to a fair trial. He has formed the New Hampshire Fair Trial/Free Press Conference which as met on a regular basis over the last few years in an attempt to bring about a greater understanding amongst all parties of the needs and demands of the system.

He has lectured and taught nationally and locally. He writes decisions that have been commented upon and discussed by lawyers across the country. He is a hard and willing worker who would give years of excellent service to the Supreme Court.

Dear Mr. Fielding:

Upon the retirement of Mr. Justice Stewart, I feel that I would be remiss if I did not bring to your attention the name of Hon. Joan Marie Durante, Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, who has served on that Trial Bench with distinction for eight years. A Republican, she sits in the Eleventh Judicial District, covering the County of Queens with its population of two million persons and having a case load larger than most Trial Courts in the United States.

Justice Durante's ability and knowledge speak for themselves and I am sure that an investigation in that regard would find her ultimately well-suited for service on the Supreme Court.

In light of the fact that the media tells us that the President is actively considering the appointment of a woman to the High Court, I have to think that any list of those being considered which did not include Justice Durante would be incomplete. I am certain that she shares with the President his view that the role of the Courts is to interpret the law and not to enact new law by judicial fiat. If the touchstones with reference to the appointment are that the appointee be a woman, that she share the President's viewpoints on the role of the Courts and that she have the ability and experience to fill the seat being vacated by Mr. Justice Stewart, I would strongly recommend that Justice Durante meets all those tests.

Dear Fred:

I have been told that Victor M. Earle, III, of New York City is one of the lawyers who has been recommended for consideration to succeed Potter Stewart as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. He has asked me to pass along my observations in connection with his candidacy.

It may be unusual to consider for the High Court a lawyer who is the general counsel of one of the major accounting firms, rather than a sitting judge, a law professor, or a private practitioner, but I can understand why present and former Justice Department officials and others have suggested that Vic Earle be considered. 

Dear Mr. Stein:

It is my understanding that several letters have gone forward suggesting my name for the vacancy on the Supreme Court. These letters have covered my background and broad experience in diverse fields of the law.

I am 53 years of age and I am now in my 26th year as a judge. For the past 10 years I have served as United States District Judge for the District of Colorado and was appointed in 1971 by President Richard Nixon. I was first appointed to the State bench at age 26.

My judicial pronouncements in a broad spectrum of litigation reflects my judicial philosophy of judicial restraint and adherence to constitutional expression.

The enclosed reprint of an article Justice, Though Due to the Accused, Is Also Due the Accuser, Vital Speeches Magazine, August 15, 1960, reflects on my judicial observations in criminal proceedings. The article points up that beneficiaries of justice cannot only be criminals. The public, the other party to a criminal action, cannot be ignored. Further, that there is a need for the exercising of judicial restraint in reversing criminal convictions and engrafting a maze of legal technicalities in these proceedings.

The views expressed in the article continue to be considerations in my handling of criminal cases.

I would be deeply honored if my name is included among those being considered for a vacancy on the Supreme Court.
