SUBJECT: Appointment of Don MacGillivray to the National Highway Safety Advisory Committee

I have reviewed the personal data statement submitted by Don MacGillivray in connection with his prospective appointment to the National Highway Safety Advisory Committee (NHSAC). Pursuant to 23 U.S.C. § 404(a)(1), the President may appoint 35 members of NHSAC. The statute provides that the appointed members "shall be selected from among representatives of various State and local governments, . . of public and private interests contributing to, affected by, or concerned with highway safety, . . . and of other public and private agencies, organizations, or groups demonstrating an active interest in highway safety, as well as research scientists and other individuals who are expert in this field."

Mr. MacGillivray is a retired general building contractor who also served in state and local government for some 30 years. In light of the fact that he no longer holds office, however, he should not be considered representative of state and local government. Barbara McQuown advised me that during his government service MacGillivray was very active in considering and proposing highway safety measures. He can, therefore, be considered representative of private interests concerned with highway safety, or of groups demonstrating an active interest in highway safety, or an individual expert in the field.

Nicolas Salgo was Chairman of the Board of Bangor Punta Corporation during the legendary battle between Bangor Punta and Chris-Craft for control of Piper Aircraft. That battle led to extensive litigation and several landmark securities decisions by the Second Circuit and the Supreme Court. See generally Piper v. Chris-Craft, 430 U.S. 1, 9-21 (1977) (history of litigation). Bangor Punta and Salgo were found by the Second Circuit to have violated registration and antifraud provisions of the Securities Act of 1933 and the Securities Exchange Act of 1934. The Supreme Court eventually decided that Chris-Craft did not have standing to bring the suit. Accordingly, it did not reach the merits.

The saga began when Chris-Craft announced its intent to take over Piper. Piper responded by seeking out a "white knight," Bangor Punta, to make a friendly takeover offer. Bangor Punta acquired Piper family shares and, on May 8, 1969, issued a press release announcing that it planned an exchange offer for other Piper stock. A registration statement for that offer was filed on May 29. While the exchange offer was pending, Bangor Punta continued cash purchases of Piper shares. Bangor Punta eventually secured 51 percent of the Piper shares, leaving Chris-Craft with a very expensive minority interest.

In response to suits by the SEC and Chris-Craft, a divided Second Circuit determined that:

1. Bangor Punta and its officers violated § 5(c) of the 1933 Act when they issued the May 8 press release. According to the court, that release itself constituted an offer, and as such was not properly registered. The SEC sued Bangor Punta on this ground, and Bangor Punta consented to an injunction barring any future press releases. When Chris-Craft raised this ground in its damage suit, however, the court ruled that this violation was not a violation of the antifraud provisions.

Bangor Punta and its officers violated § 14(e) of 2. the 1934 Act, the tender offer antifraud provision, because the May 29 registration statement listed the worth of an asset -- the Bangor and Aroostook Railroad -- at \$18 million, the value at which it was carried on the books. The directors knew the railroad to be worth only \$5 million, since they were engaged in negotiations to sell it for that amount. The \$18 million figure was arrived at through "dubious accounting procedure." The § 14(e) violation was not based on intent to defraud but "reckless disregard" for the accuracy of the reported figure, which the court considered sufficient to satisfy the scienter requirement. Both the SEC and Chris-Craft raised these allegations. Although agreeing with the SEC that a violation occurred, the court denied the SEC's request for an injunction against future violations.

3. Bangor Punta and its officers violated Rule 10b-6 issued under the 1934 Act, an antifraud rule, by engaging in cash purchases while the exchange offer was outstanding. The court reasoned this inflated the price of the Piper stock at a time when it would appear that the increase was due to the exchange offer, making the exchange offer appear more attractive.

The Supreme Court reversed the eventual award of damages and injunctive relief to Chris-Craft. The Court reasoned that the securites laws did not create a private cause of action for the benefit of rival tender offerors such as Chris-Craft. In light of its holding, the Court noted that it had "no occasion to pass on the Court of Appeals' underlying determination that petitioners actually violated the securities laws . . . " 430 U.S., at 37 n.24.

With respect to the Second Circuit's determination that such violations did occur, it is significant to note that the court itself recognized that it was deciding issues of first impression, see 480 F.2d at 379, and that a majority rebuffed the SEC's request for a permanent injunction against Bangor Punta and its officers, agreeing with the district court that there was no basis to assume any danger of future violations by Bangor Punta or its officers. The court opinions broke new ground, and Bangor Punta's activities were hardly egregious. Indeed, the opinions continue to be widely-read in securites law classes, and have provided ample fodder for commentators, precisely because of the closeness of the issues presented. I do not think the episode should preclude Salgo's nomination.

He was Founder and Owner of Nicolas Salgo and Company in New York City in 1959-1983. In 1960-1974 he was Vice Chairman, and Chairman of Bangor Punta Corporation and subsidiaries in Greenwich, Connecticut. He was Co-owner and President of the ZX Ranch in Paisley, Oregon in 1966-1980.

Mr. Salgo was Founder and Limited Partner of the Watergate Improvement Associates in Washington, D.C. (1960-1977) and has served as Chairman of the Watergate Companies since 1977. He has also been a consultant to the United States Information Agency since 1982 and a member of the International Private Enterprise Task Force since May 1983.

He received his LL.D. and Ph.D. from the University of Budapest (Hungary) in 1937. His foreign languages are fluent Hungarian, French, and German. He was born August 17, 1914 in Budapest, Hungary and became naturalized in 1953.

SUBJECT: Seeley Lodwick

I mentioned this morning my recollection, prompted by the <u>Post</u> report that Mr. Lodwick had been confirmed while his independent co-nominees had not been, that the International Trade Commission enabling act required members of different political parties to be appointed alternately to the ITC. The actual phrasing provides that "in making appointments members of different political parties shall be appointed alternately as nearly as may be practicable." 19 U.S.C. § 1330(a) (emphasis supplied). The underscored language is of some significance, as I have discovered that Lodwick was commissioned last Friday, August 5. Lodwick's appointment means that the last four appointees to the ITC have been Republicans, so the record of compliance with the statute's alternating scheme has not been good.

It can, however, readily be maintained, at least with respect to Lodwick's appointment, that the Administration made every effort to comply with the alternating requirement, and only failed to do so because it was not "practicable." Lodwick's name was sent up along with two non-Republicans, and the Administration can hardly be blamed for the Senate's refusal to confirm the Independents while confirming Lodwick. Nor is there anything in the statute to suggest that the appointment of a confirmed nominee must be held in abeyance until the Senate confirms a nominee of a different party.
