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INTRODUCTION

#### INTRODUCTION

In October of 1984, approximately 554,000 copies of the 1984 Fall issue of National Forum entitled "Toward the Bicentennial of the Constitution" were released from the press. This issue was cosponsored by The Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi and the American Bar Association. Mead Data Central made possible the distribution of this issue to the entire membership of the American Bar Association. In addition, contributions from The Brown Foundation, Inc., The General Electric Foundation, The George Gund Foundation, the Kettering Foundation, The Mead Corporation Foundation, and The Pfizer Foundation made possible the selection of well-known authors and further distribution to a wide array of organizations. To date, the total cost of the project is approximately \$224,511. (See pp. 8-11 for details of contributions and expenditures for this project.)

The wide distribution of the issue will ensure its availability to large numbers of persons planning Bicentennial programs. Approximately 479,410 copies were mailed directly to individuals and approximately 73,924 copies were shipped to various organizations for distribution by them. Of this 73,924 copies, approximately 20,000 are being distributed from Dr. Mark W. Cannon's office. Additional overcopies are being distributed from the National Forum office.

A copy of the print order and a detailed description of the distribution can be found in the distribution section of this report (See pp. 15-40). The issue was distributed to the entire membership of The Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi (104,968) and the entire membership of the American Bar Association (346,388). More than 8,700 copies were sent to professors of American history, American politics, constitutional law, and political theory in American colleges and universities. Over 14,000 copies were sent to social science teachers in American secondary schools. In addition, the United States Information Agency distributed 11,000 copies to overseas leaders.

In addition to direct distribution, various articles in the issue will receive wider readership through reprints in other publications. As publisher, The Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi has waived all reprint fees for material printed in the issue. However, the issue was copyrighted in order to ensure our ability to accurately report on use of the articles. If reprint fees are available, these funds are directed to the authors. To date, the most significant reprint request is from the United States Information Agency. The agency plans to place 15 of the 17 articles in the issue on its availability list offering them to its entire field of 126 countries and 205 posts. The Rio de Janeiro post has already expressed an interest in translating the material into Portuguese for use in consideration of constitutional questions. A list of the 10 reprint requests received in the last 3 months may be found on pages 42-43 of this report. It is our expectation that reprint requests will increase as the Bicentennial of the Constitution approaches.

To alert the media to the availability of the issue, 750 news packages

(including a copy of the journal, 2 news releases, and excerpts) were mailed in early December to a media list of 750 editors furnished by the Kettering Foundation. Approximately 250 additional news packages were mailed to various groups and individuals. In addition, 3 news releases have been distributed to the local media and 26 target cities by the Office of University Relations at East Tennessee State University. A list of this publicity can be found on page 45 of this report. Two supplemental news releases are also in a draft stage.

DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT

#### Description of Project

In the fall of 1983, The Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi, the American Bar Association, and Mead Data Central undertook a unique project to stimulate interest in the upcoming celebration of the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution. Through a special issue of National Forum: The Phi Kappa Phi Journal, we sought to reach civic minded citizens likely to influence the planning and implementation of Bicentennial programs and festivities by national and community organizations.

We hope that the issue, entitled "Toward the Bicentennial of the Constitution," will bring about a greater appreciation of the historical and contemporary significance of our founding document. The 200th anniversary of our Constitution in 1987 provides us with an exceptional opportunity to examine fundamental questions about its creation and implications. The guest editor of the issue, Mark W. Cannon, secured commitments from a broad array of public and private persons deeply concerned with the livelihood of our Constitution; Dr. Cannon encouraged the authors to write broadly and to avoid professional jargon. Mead Data Central has made possible the printing and distribution of the journal to the membership of the American Bar Association.

In selecting appropriate avenues for the distribution of the issue, we wished to meet several broad objectives. Initially, we sought to stimulate interest among scholars concerned with the history, philosophy, and contemporary significance of the United States Constitution. The American Political Science Association and the American Historical Association are examples of such organizations.

Civic education is one of the most important charges that we as a society must undertake. As a second objective, we therefore sought to peak the interest of national, state, and local leaders dedicated to promoting broader public understanding of the American constitutional system. Included among these groups are the American Bar Association Commission on Public Understanding About the Law, Project '87, the Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity Organization, and the Supreme Court Historical Society. In addition, we made certain that the Bicentennial issue would reach libraries and influential members of the media.

Finally, with an eye toward the future vitality of the Constitution, we sought to reach students and teachers across the country. To this end, we contacted organizations that sponsor special programs for highly selective groups of young people—the future leaders of our nation. In many cases, we chose organizations that specialize in the training of teachers. Distribution to groups such as the Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge, the National Council for the Social Studies, the Center for Civic Education, and Presidential Classroom for Young Americans will ensure that the special Bicentennial issue will have an impact beyond the celebrations of the coming years.

Dear Mr. Roberts:

I write at the suggestion of Dr. Mark Cannon to request permission to reprint the President's article, "The Presidency: Roles and Responsibilities," from the Fall, 1984 National Forum as part of The New Federalist Papers.

The New Federalist Papers is the bicentennial project of Public Research, Syndicated, and is supported in part by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. The project began last January. Each month we syndicate six articles on constitutional themes to a nationwide audience. Two articles a month are sent, free of charge, to more than two thousand small, community newspapers. A weekly article is sent to some one hundred daily papers. The articles examine the various provisions of the Constitution, as well as its historical roots, its political principles, and its meaning today.

A distinguished roster of authors has contributed to the series, including Chief Justice Burger, Attorney General Smith, Civil Rights Commission Chairman Clarence Pendleton, and Eugene McCarthy. From the scholarly community, we have had articles from Henry Steele Commager, Samuel Beer, Gordon S. Wood, and many others. We hope the President will be willing to join this list.

Dr. Cannon has given his permission for us to excerpt and to syndicate selected articles from the Fall, 1984 issue of National Forum, of which he was the guest editor. The first of those articles which we will syndicate is Dr. Cannon's; it will be distributed on February 13. We will also ask Speaker O'Neill for permission to use an excerpt from his article, and we plan to use several others as well.

We would use an 800 word excerpt from the President's article; if we are given permission, we would plan to do the excerpting here and send it to you for approval. However, we are open about the precise arrangements for the editing. We offer an honorarium of \$250, though I do not know what the rules are concerning such things.
