Army PFC Wyatt Matthews was convicted by a general courtmartial of murdering and raping Phyllis Villanueva, and
sentenced to death. The Army Court of Military Review
affirmed the findings and sentence; the Court of Military
Appeals heard argument on April 20, 1983. If this court
affirms the death sentence, the case would be presented to
the President under 10 U.S.C. § 871(a). This provides: "No
court-martial sentence extending to death or involving a
general or flag officer may be executed until approved by
the President. He shall approve the sentence or such part,
amount, or commuted form of the sentence as he sees fit, and
may suspend the execution of the sentence or any part of the
sentence, as approved by him, except a death sentence."

Mrs. Villanueva's parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Pike, have written the President to express their hope that the President give Matthews the death penalty. Anne Higgins obtained a fact sheet on the case from the Department of Defense, but decided not to respond to the Pikes. The case is still pending on appeal, so we obviously cannot discuss its merits with the Pikes. Furthermore, the responsibility of the President under 10 U.S.C. § 871(a) "is judicial in its character, not administrative. "Runkle v. United States, 122 U.S. 543, 558 (1887). As Attorney General Bates advised President Lincoln, "Undoubtedly the President, in passing upon the sentence of a court martial, and giving to it the approval without which it cannot be executed, acts judicially . . . . When the President . . . performs this duty . . his act has all the solemnity and significance of the judgment of a court of law." 11 O.A.G. 21 (1864).

While we accordingly cannot comment on the merits, I do think the Pikes deserve some reply. The reply would at least establish for the record that nothing improper was done in response to their letter. I have drafted a reply for your signature, explaining why the President cannot comment on or become involved in the case until it reaches him pursuant to 10 U.S.C. § 871(a).

#### FACT SHEET

#### General Court-Martial of PFC Wyatt L. Matthews

Army Private First Class Wyatt L. Matthews, B Battery, 1st Battalion, 14th Field Artillery, 2d Armored Division, was tried by a general court-martial convened by the Commander, 1st Armored Division. The court, composed of eight officers, convicted PFC Matthews of premeditated murder and rape in violation of Articles 118 and 120, Uniform Code of Military Justice, respectively. On July 3, 1979, he was sentenced to death.

On February 27, 1979, at Graffenwoehr, Germany, PFC Matthews raped and murdered the victim. He stabbed her 53 times with a pair of scissors (inflicting 6 potentially fatal wounds and one non-fatal wound to the pubic area). Subsequently, PFC Matthews had three friends dispose of the victim's clothes and other evidence of the crime. PFC Matthews' friends, in exchange for immunity, testified at the trial.

PFC Matthews pleaded guilty to unpremeditated murder; the court found him guilty of premeditated murder and rape. He was represented by Captain Gilpin R. Fegley, Judge Advocate General's Corps, and Mr. Anthony F. List, a civilian attorney from Media, Pennsylvania.

On December 14, 1979, the Commander, VII Corps, approved the death sentence. The case was then forwarded for review, under Article 66(b), UCMJ, to the U.S. Army Court of Military Review.

On March 17, 1982, the U. S. Army Court of Military Review (sitting en banc) affirmed the findings and sentence. The court specifically found the imposition of the death penalty for premeditated murder was constitutionally permissible and, under the circumstances, an appropriate sentence.

Pursuant to Article 67(b)(l), UCMJ, the case must be automatically reviewed by the U. S. Court of Military Appeals. On April 20, 1983, the Court of Military Appeals heard arguments in the case. In addition to the briefs filed by the Army Government and Defense Appellate Divisions, amicus briefs were also submitted to the court by the Air Force and Navy Government and Defense Appellate Divisions, the Department of Justice Criminal Law Section, the Georgetown University Law Center, the American Civil Liberties Union, the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, and the New York City Bar Association.





# City family watches closely

WASHINGTON - Four years after Phyllis Villanueva was raped and murdered on an American military base in West Germany, her family in Birmingham is closely watching the appeal of the serviceman sentenced to die for the killing.

Although Army Pfc. Wvatt L. Matthews admitted

The 22-year-old serviceman was convicted by court martial of raping and fatally stabbing Mrs. Villanueva Feb. 27, 1979, and was the first soldier in 14 years to be given the military's death sentence. He now is in prison at the U.S. Disciplinary Barracks in Fort Leavenworth, Kan.

The U.S. Court of Military Appeals in Washington, the highest military appellate court, has the Matthews case before it, and a decision is expected by early fall that could determine whether the death penalty is constitutional. Military capital punishment never has been reviewed by that court since the U.S. Supreme Court in 1972 found the death penalty to be cruel and unusual punishment because it was being administered arbitrarily.

BEFORE MATTHEWS can be executed, the death sentence handed down unanimously by a Nuremberg jury must be upheld by the Court of Military Appeals and reviewed by the president. Even then, there is the possibility of appeal to the civilian courts.

Six other soldiers sentenced to die since Matthews' conviction also are closely watching the appeal, since the outcome could determine whether they will be executed as well.

The events leading to the murder and the court vigil began in the tiny, paperback-filled library of Camp Algiers, a 57,000-acre American military base in West Germany. Mrs. Villanueva's husband was stationed there as a warrant officer, and she was filling in as librarian for a woman on maternity leave.

For Matthews, a mechanic from the Philadelphia area, the assignment in West Germany was the latest in his 18 months of Army service.

Liberal chief replaced

Trial witnesses testified that on the February afternoon four years ago, Matthews was trying to talk to Mrs. Villanueva near the library and that she ignored him. Two hours later, the testimony went on, Matthews went into the library, leaned over Mrs. Villanueva's desk and asked her for a date.

She told him she was "happily married." Matthews then asked her for some "sexy books." and she told him to try the bookstore across the

INSTEAD, HE WAITED until the library cleared out, then asked Mrs. Villanueva to get him a book from the back of the library. As she did, Matthews took the library's front-door key from the desk and locked the entrance, according to testimony.

He also took from her desk a pair of 9-inch scissors, then chased Mrs. Villanueva around the library. Matthews raped her at the rear of the building, he told a friend. "She wouldn't move right and I just starts stabbing her all over, in her eyebrows," the friend testified that he was told.

She was stabbed 53 times in the head, chest, back and neck. Villanueva - who met his wife in a sociology class they took together in 1975 at a Huntsville college — found his wife at the library lying in a pool of blood.

A psychiatrist who evaluated him in Germany said Matthews couldn't handle his anger and rage and also was mildly retarded. The doctor said Matthews had an explosive personality and built-up anger, grudges and grievances.

At his trial, Matthews' defense was that the retardation, anger and drinking — he allegedly was drunk at the time of the slaying - culminated in Mrs. Villanueva's death. He admitted stabbing her to death but said it was done without premeditation.

MRS. VILLANUEVA'S mother said the couple "were just so much in love" and had talked of having one or two children after Villanueva retired in 1981. "We're still pretty tore up about all that happened," said her father, William Pike, a photographer for a Birmingham engineering firm.

Villanueva, now 45, said that "after the trial, I just put it behind me... . I don't dwell on it." But, he said, "I'll never forget."

He said he sympathizes with Matthews' family and feels no anger. "I guess I would treat him like any other person," he said. "I'm not for capital punishment."

He said he thinks Matthews should be kept behind bars and put in some type of rehabilitation program.

Matthews' family in Chester, Pa., doesn't think he should be executed. His sister, Clara Ellis, doesn't

Request for Funds

Harold Hale, a member of the Oklahoma House of Representatives, has written the President to ask if there are any funds available to help the Piedmont High School Band attend the International Youth Music Festival in Vienna this July. The band played for the President during his visit to Oklahoma, and has been invited to represent the United States at the Festival. The student-musicians have raised \$60,000 but are still \$40,000 short of the necessary amount. Rick Neal sent Hale an interim response and referred the letter to our office.

I have drafted a reply for your signature advising Mr. Hale that the White House has no funds to dispense for such purposes, and recommending that he contact the National Endowment for the Arts.

#### Dear Representative Hale:

The Office of Intergovernmental Affairs has referred your April 26 letter to this office for appropriate handling. In that letter you noted that the Piedmont High School Band had been selected to participate in the International Youth Music Festival in Vienna this July, but had fallen some \$40,000 short in raising funds to enable it to accept the honor. You inquired if any funds were available to assist the student-musicians.

I am sorry to have to advise you that the White House has no funds available for this purpose. As you know, we operate under a budget approved by Congress, and can only expend funds on White House operations.

The only possible source of funds that I can think of in the federal government is the National Endowment for the Arts, an independent agency. Dear Representative Hale:

The Office of Intergovernmental Affairs has referred your April 26 letter to this office for appropriate handling. In that letter you noted that the Piedmont High School Band had been selected to participate in the International Youth Music Festival in Vienna this July, but had fallen some \$40,000 short in raising funds to enable it to accept the honor. You inquired if any funds were available to assist the student-musicians.

I am sorry to have to advise you that the White House has no funds available for this purpose. As you know, we operate under a budget approved by Congress, and can only expend funds on White House operations.

The only possible source of funds that I can think of in the federal government is the National Endowment for the Arts, an independent agency. I do not know if that agency will be able to assist the Piedmont High School Band, but it is worth a try. The Endowment will, in any event, be more familiar with other sources of funding for this type of endeavor than we are at the White House.

I am sorry that we could not be of more direct assistance. I certainly hope the band is able to participate in the Festival, since I am confident that it would ably represent our country.

## AUSTRIA'83

The Piedmont High School Band has been invited to compete in the International Youth Music Festival in Vienna, Austria in July of 1983. To have been considered worthy of the invitation is a very great honor to be bestowed on the band from Piedmont, Oklahoma.

There are approximately 40 bands competing in this event from all over the world. The United States will send only four or five bands from various regions of the country, and Piedmont will be the only band from Oklahoma.

Piedmont Band received national recognition when they played for President Reagan when he visited our State Capital in 1982. The preparation for the president's visit required students to be at practice at 7:00 a.m. each morning for two weeks prior to the visit. During the two weeks of such intense practice, news of the effort was reported nationwide, and from this the international panel of judges first heard of Piedmont, Oklahoma. Serious inquiry by the judges revealed to them that Piedmont was an excellent band which had been winning in all of their competition throughout the state.

During the last year since they received the invitation to compete in Vienna, the Piedmont Band was appointed by Governor George Nigh as the Diamond Jubilee Band of Oklahoma, and they did perform at Guthrie and Oklahoma City for these related Diamond Jubilee functions.
