Arthur Green vs. Joseph Green and Mary Stein

Arthur Green is a disappointed litigant in a New Jersey probate proceeding. In an effort to redress his grievances, he has filed a pro se petition for certiorari with the U.S. Supreme Court (No. 82-2000), claiming violations of due process and equal protection. Green has also written Mr. Fielding and the President, providing them with a copy of his petition. In his letter to the President, Green notes that he recognizes the separation of powers and only enclosed the petition for the President's information.

We obviously cannot comment on Green's frivolous petition, which is pending before the Court. I do not think we should respond to Green at all. Like the case of Jarndyce v. Jarndyce described in Charles Dickens' Bleak House, probate disputes begin with a death but have a way of never dying themselves, and it would be unfortunate for the White House to become involved in this one.

Dear Mr. Fielding:

I am submitting the enclosed letter and its enclosure to the President through your good offices. The matter is transmitted strictly for the President's information since the brief has been filed within the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of the United States.

Due Process of Law and Equal Protection under the Law are concepts of our society which are not normally exclusive. These concepts are also not exclusive of all the declarations on Human Rights of the individual which our Presidents have expounded since the end of World War II.

Several of our Presidents have placed their signature on numerous treaties, compacts, covenants, agreements and conventions at international conclaves, which have underlined the inherent dignity of human rights and fundamental freedoms of the individual.

We need not look exclusively to other participating nations to such agreements, nations which may be accused of gross violations. From time to time we have to be introspective to recognize violations of human rights of our own citizens where such recognition may be required.

As pro se defendent within the courts of the State of New Jersey, in a civil case, I have been denied my human rights by flagrant violations by the courts which my Petition demonstrates. I pray that the Supreme Court of the United States will grant my Petition with an issuance of an Order of Remand which I respectfully requested so that these denials may be rectified.

It represents a case which experienced extraordinary denials of Due Process of Law to me during the course of the proceedings in the State of New Jersey.

During appellate process of this case I have represented myself as <u>pro se</u> and the denials of Equality under the Law and New Jersey Rules of Court are not only manifest of violations of the several guarantees under the State and Federal Constitutions and Federal Statutes but are equally repugnant to provisions which declare the Human Rights of the individual by the numerous international covenents and agreements to which our Country has adhered.

Rule 52 of the Supreme Court of the United States declares that all process of the High Court shall be in the name of the President of the United States.

Mr. President, it is for this reason that I am sending you copy of my Petition for Writ of Certiorari in which I have respectfully requested of the High Court that an Order of Remand to the appropriate court below issue, so that all these abuses of my human rights may be rectified.

I fully understand the separation and independence of powers of the Executive and Judicial Branches in our democratic society. I submit copy of my Petition solely for your information since my case can be representative of what a pro se can be subjected by the various court levels of our States in infringement of Human Rights guarantees promulgated by our Presidents in open declaration, by pronouncements and by treaties which have become the Law of the Land.



Ward L. Quaal, apparently a personal friend of Mr. Deaver's, met with the President on March 16 but, as he advised Deaver in a letter two months later, did not have an opportunity to discuss with the President the importance of the study of American history. Quaal had hoped to brief the President on a twelve-part television series on American history developed by Walter Schwimmer. Quaal asks to bring Schwimmer in for a meeting with the President to discuss the project.

The series seems to be simply a commercial television production, and accordingly the President should not become involved in it. The President could of course meet with Schwimmer and Quaal to hear about their project, but frankly I see little reason for such a meeting. The only reason would be for Schwimmer and Quaal to obtain a Presidential endorsement which would be inappropriate.

Our response to Deaver concerning this matter does not exhibit the promptness for which our office is justly renown because the item as it arrived from Deaver's office was attached to other incoming material and, like the sister city of Machu Picchu, has only recently been unearthed. Because of your thoughtful arrangements, I had the pleasure of a fine meeting with the President on March 16th.

There were several key matters to discuss and one was urgent; namely, Radio Marti. Our meeting was cut a bit "short" because a group of Congressmen, visiting with the President on the budget, overstayed their timeframe. The series, as proposed, takes the people of America through the difficult early days to the present. The air presentation of this series will do more, by far, than anything done to date to truly tell the people of America what this nation is all about and why we stand as the beacon of freedom for all the world to see. Mike, this series would help so very much to fill the void that exists today in this important area of educating our young people. Concurrently, it will be a reminder to those of us who are older how fortunate we are to be Americans and to have a little role in this very special land of ours.

Walter and I are not seeking one dollar of taxpayer support. This series, when aired, will be presented by American advertisers for the people of America!

Mike, I am so excited about the potential for this great presentation, in twelve showings, that I would like just a little bit of time, even ten minutes, for Walter Schwimmer and me to meet with our great President and discuss this briefly with him.
