The Special Counsel of the Merit Systems Protection Board has written to advise you that he has completed his investigation into an allegation that violated personnel statutes in the course of "RIFing"

an employee. Special Counsel O'Connor has concluded that the allegation is unsubstantiated.

This notice to you is in one sense gratuitous, since the pertinent statute only requires a report to the President by the Special Counsel when he determines that a Presidential appointee has committed a violation. 5 U.S.C. § 1206(g)(2). O'Connor has advised us, however, that he prefers to notify our office when he determines that an allegation is unsubstantiated as well. He has explained that since these allegations often become public it is only fair to the individual involved to at least let our office know when the Special Counsel has completed an inquiry and determined that no violation took place. I have drafted a brief acknowledgment.

Dear Mr. Baker:

On behalf of many regulated motor carriers, by the Interstate Commerce Commissions, we would like to bring to your attention the following information.

In the New England area some of the staff members have government cars assigned to them which they use to travel to and from their homes at the tax payers expense.

For Example, at the Portland, Maine office of ICC. He has a government car and uses the same to travel to and from his home to his office, driving about 35 miles a day.

At Springfield, Mass., two staff members use government cars to travel to and from their homes to the Springfield, Mass. office. Such travel involves about 20 miles per day. One staff member lives in Holyoke and the other resides in Wilbraham, Mass.

Another wasteful practise involves that of James Perry, who lives in Westfield, Mass. and is the District Super-This transportation of a government car to and from his work is about 70 miles daily.

There are other incidents of wasteful practises in the New England area, and we are sure if other regions were investigated, the same situations would exist.

A similar situation exists in the New England area involving staff members of the Federal Highway Administration of the U.S. Dept. of Transportation. In the interest of the tax payers, these agencies, as well as all Federal agencies, should be looked into with a view towards eleminating wasteful practises of these government cars.

This letter, for obvious reasons, is not signed, but the reader can be assured that the many motor carriers that are sending this information to you wish to advise that such information is accurate.

I am sorry I forgot to send the attached AEI publication analyzing natural gas legislation pending before Congress. The AEI analysis is a fairly succinct and accurate description of the gas problem. Whatever the merits of the various legislative approaches, it is clear that this legislation will have enormous economic significance, and will attract political attention this year.

Also enclosed is a recent Open Commission Meeting Report which Jackie Jaffe prepares each week. I invite your attention particularly to the comments of Commissioner Richard in the Mich Wisc case. (We are not involved in this matter.) It is very clear that the working majority on the Commission now is Richard, Hughes, and Sheldon, not a Republican majority. Even the confirmation of a new chairman may not change this alignment much. It is clear from Richard's comments that he will reflect the views of a well entrenched FERC Staff bureaucracy, and those Staff views will be the ones provided to the Congress in the upcoming legislative battle on natural gas policy. I have no specific suggestions. However, leaving this Commission in the hands of the other side at this time makes little sense to me.



# Presser will discuss labor at White House

Teamster President Jackie Presser is scheduled to meet at the White House Oct. 12 with Edwin N. Meese, White House counselor.

Presser, one of the few union leaders backing Reagan for reelection, will discuss "labor issues in general" with Meese, sources said. It was unclear whether the 1984 election will be discussed. Reagan has not declared his candidacy but is expected to run again.

The president is not expected to be at the meeting, sources said, but they did not preclude a meeting between Reagan and Presser at a later date.

"If Meese can handle it, he'll handle it," one administration cofficial said. "If it requires a decision only the president can make, it will go to the president."

There has been concern by some members of the White House staff over Presser's ties to the administration because a federal strike force is investigating alleged corruption in Presser's Cleveland Teamster Local 507.

Allen Friedman, Presser's uncle and former head of Local 507, was convicted Wednesday of embezzling \$165,000 from the local. The government said Friedman, a ghost employe, was paid \$1,000 a week for work he never performed by Presser and another Teamster leader, Harold Friedman, as payment for a takeover by them of the union.

Meese's faction is regarded as wanting to stand by Presser while James A. Baker III, White House chief of staff, reportedly favors the more cautious "arms length relationship" suggested by White House counsel Fred Fielding because of the federal probes.

In August, Presser was reported to have been stricken from the White House social list, though he later attended one social function there.

Friedman, who turned 62 this month, also was once friendly with Harold Friedman, a Presser ally recently named a Teamsters vice president. Harold Friedman, who is not related to Allen, is Local 507 president. Court documents identify him as a target of the investigation.

The two Friedmans go way back. In 1949, they were arrested in a multi-state car theft ring. Both were convicted, then rebounded to become powerful figures in Cleveland's labor movement.

They got together again in 1966, joined by Presser, to form Teamsters Local 507 and Local 752, an independent warehouse local. According to Allen Friedman, Local 752 was formed to organize businesses Local 507 couldn't or didn't want to organize. Allen Friedman was given primary responsibility for Local 752, with Presser and Harold Friedman exerting influence.

From 1967 to 1976, Allen Friedman worked to establish the two locals. When they merged in 1977, he continued on the Local 507 payroll until retiring in 1981.

In February 1982, agents of the Labor Department's Office of Inspector General here got a tip that Local 507 had paid no-show or ghost employes, according to federal court testimony last week.

The agents; James F. Thomas and George R. Simmons, began looking into the tip, and set out to interview employes of the local.

In May 1982, Thomas went to Allen Friedman's Beachwood home to deliver a subpoena By Stephanie Saul

The last thing a newly elected union president needs is public airing of corruption in his local and a feud in his family.

But that's what Teamsters Union President Jackie Presser is getting, five months after taking office with the claim he would clean up the scandal-plagued union.

The forum will be in U.S. District Court this week, when Presser's uncle, Allen Friedman, goes on trial here.

Friedman is charged with embezzling \$165,000 from Presser's Teamsters Local 507 by receiving paychecks even though he didn't work. The alleged ghost payrolling scheme has been the subject of an exhaustive Labor Department investigation since last year.

If Friedman is convicted, he will become the second man to collapse in a domino chain that could ultimately fell Presser, the investigation's primary target. One man has pleaded guilty to receiving local payroll checks illegally.

Two lawyers for Presser were spectators at a pretrial hearing in the case last week, their presence illustrating its potential implications for him. As secretary-treasurer of Local 507, Presser was one of two men who signed payroll checks to suspected ghost employes, according to documents filed in the case.

Presser has never been charged with a crime, but he has long been the target of allegations he has ties to organized crime. Several of the suspected ghost employes have felony convictions and strong underworld connections.

Any charges against Presser would further damage the Teamsters' image, already badly tarnished by pension fund scandals and the convictions of three of its last four presidents.

The trial also will divulge the acrimony splitting Presser's family, pitting him against Friedman.

At one time, the men were like father and son, Friedman has said. Their relationship has deteriorated so badly Friedman recently charged Presser "should have been in jail dozens of times."

"I practically raised Jackie," Friedman said, reminiscing about the days when they were close. "When he was inducted into the Navy, I went over to boot camp to watch the ceremony."

ordering Friedman's appearance before a grand jury, he said.

Friedman invited him in, offered him coffee and then began to hold forth.

"He told me of his history in the labor movement," Thomas said. "He told me how he felt he had been double-crossed."

According to Thomas' federal court testimony and documents in the case, Allen Friedman's story went like this:

Presser and Harold Friedman ganged up to push him out of their affairs. Their conspiracy began in the early 1970s. And in 1976, when Allen Friedman was recovering from his second heart attack, they visited him in the hospital to offer a deal.

They promised to pay him \$1,000 a week for life, if he would merge Local 752 into Local 507. Friedman agreed, in effect selling Local 752. He went along with the deal because it was clear he was being forced out.

When Friedman regained his strength, he tried to go back to work at Local 507. But Presser and Harold Friedman told him to stay out of the union hall. And from 1977 to 1981, when Presser and Harold Friedman forced him off the payroll, he did absolutely no work for his \$1,000-a-week pay.

During that period, Friedman received more than \$200,000 in union funds.

Friedman refused to tell the story to a federal grand jury investigating the ghost employe case, saying he couldn't testify against Presser, his sister's son.

Friedman's statement, which his lawyers deny, is one of several interviews Friedman granted Thomas and Simmons. The statements are expected to figure prominently when the case against Friedman is presented by lawyers Stephen H. Jigger and Steve W. Canfil of the Justice Department's Strike Force Against Organized Crime. Jury selection in the case begins today.

In Friedman's defense, lawyers Jack M. and Dennis P. Levin have said federal agents misinterpreted his statements.

The Levins have contended that Friedman was not a ghost employe.

According to Jack Levin, Allen Friedman continued to work for Local 507 after 1976 as an adviser and consultant. His work was limited by his heart condition, Levin said.

"To Allen Friedman, work means 16 hours a day — on the picket line, organizing, conferences, health and welfare board meetings," said Jack Levin. "That's what Allen Friedman meant when he said he wasn't working."

Furthermore, the Levins said, Allen Friedman's mental function has been diminished by medication and reduced blood flow to his brain, caused by his circulatory disorders. He can't be responsible for his statements, they said.

Last year, in connection with the investigation, the government searched the headquarters of Local 507 and its affiliate, Bakery Workers Local 19. Both are at 1870 E. 19th St.

An affidavit filed in federal court to explain reasons for the

search said the government suspected the two locals paid at least five ghost employes.

One was Anthony Hughes, formerly in the restaurant business with Presser's wife. The affidavit said the locals had paid Hughes \$77,000 a year since 1977. Documents in the case suggest agents believed Hughes spent more time at the restaurant than the union hall.

Another suspected ghost employe was John J. (Skip) Felice Jr., a convicted felon. Felice was paid \$7,950 by Local 507 in 1978, the affidavit said.

Another man identified as a ghost employe, George Argie, pleaded guilty to bribery this year in an unrelated case. The affidavit said he was paid \$200 a week from September 1978, through June 1979.

A fifth ghost employe, Jack Nardi, pleaded guilty to the charges last March and signed an agreement to cooperate in the government investigation. Nardi, son of the murdered Teamster leader and reputed racketeer John Nardi, is not expected to be a witness in Friedman's trial.

The investigation was well under way when Presser took office in April. In a June Senate hearing, Presser denied the ghost employe allegations. But he has declined to comment further.

The investigation already has taken its toll on Presser's effectiveness. The Washington Post reported last month that the Reagan administration has been advised to exclude him from White House parties because of the investigation.





Dear Mr. Hoffman:

We have received your letter of October 5 to the First Lady, along with the invitation to the Quality of Life Ball. In that letter you announced that the First Lady had been selected to receive the first "Quality of Life Award of Merit." The printed invitation to the ball indicated that the ball was being held "to honour First Lady Nancy Reagan and to benefit The Northern Kentucky Diabetes Association And the Paul I. Hoxworth Blood Center."

We appreciate the kind and supportive sentiments expressed in your letter, and certainly applaud your charitable activities. The invitation to the Quality of Life Ball, however, could be construed as suggesting that the First Lady is associated with the ball, the Dixie Jaycees, the Northern Kentucky Diabetes Association and the Paul I. Hoxworth Blood Center. It also conveys the impression that the First Lady will be in attendance at the ball, which as you know is not possible. It is unfortunately probable that some individuals decided or may decide to attend the ball and make donations to the organizations involved on the basis of these false impressions.

Established White House policy generally prohibits use of the President's or First Lady's name in connection with particular private charitable fundraising efforts. As you might imagine, we receive countless requests that the President or First Lady participate in such efforts. cannot accept them all, and out of fairness it has been necessary to adopt a policy of uniformly declining such requests, no matter how laudable the objectives of the charitable organizations involved. In fact, if you had advised us of your plans before proceeding, we would not have been able to approve the use of the First Lady's name on the invitation. It is now necessary to correct the false impressions that unfortunately may have been created by the use of the First Lady's name, and to take steps to guarantee that no funds were raised on the basis of those false impressions.

I assume that the invitations have already been mailed. If not, they should be recast so as not to suggest that the First Lady is involved or will be attending. Anyone who has received an invitation should be contacted, to the extent possible, and advised that Mrs. Reagan will not be at the

ball, and that she has no association with the Dixie Jaycees, the Quality of Life Ball, the Northern Kentucky Diabetes Association, or the Paul I. Hoxworth Blood Center. It would also seem necessary to offer to refund donations to any invitees who may have thought otherwise.

Please let us know what steps you have taken to correct the problems inadvertently caused by the invitation. We regret that action of the sort outlined above is necessary, but I trust you will appreciate the reasons we must adhere to our policy of avoiding associations with particular fundraising efforts. Our adherence to the policy in this instance should in no way be construed as an adverse reflection on you or the Dixie Jaycees. You have our best wishes for what I am confident will be a successful event.
