Regarding Event in her Honor to be  
Given by the Quality of Life Dixie  
Jaycees - November 11, 1983

On October 5, 1983 Drew Hoffmann, founder and chairman of the Quality of Life program of the Dixie Jaycees of Kentucky, wrote Mrs. Reagan to advise her that she had been selected as the first recipient of the Dixie Jaycees "Quality of Life Award of Merit" for her work with the Foster Grandparent program and her efforts to combat drug abuse. The award will be "presented" at the Quality of Life Ball to be held on November 11. Tickets to the ball are \$50 per person, and the proceeds will go to the Northern Kentucky Diabetes Association and the Paul I. Hoxworth Blood Center. As Ann Wroblewski explained in her memorandum to you, the first anyone knew of all this was when we received the October 5 letter, along with a copy of the invitation to the ball "to honour First Lady Nancy Reagan." The letter from Hoffman recognizes that Mrs. Reagan cannot attend the ball, because she will be out of the country with the President, but the date cannot be changed because "plans were made weeks ago."

SUBJECT: Proposal for Mrs. Reagan to Serve as  
Honorary Chairman of Foster Grandparent  
Night at the Boston Pops

Sheryl Eberly of Mrs. Reagan's office has asked if there are any problems with Mrs. Reagan lending her name as Honorary Chairman of a Foster Grandparent Night to be staged by the Boston Pops Orchestra. Mrs. Reagan's name would be printed as Honorary Chairman on stationery used both to solicit funds to pay for the concert and to support the Foster Grandparent Program. Eberly indicates that they would like to participate in this effort.

There are no legal bars to Mrs. Reagan agreeing to permit her name to be used as Honorary Chairman of this event. Since this is in fact Mrs. Reagan's favorite charity, and since she apparently wants to lend her name, prudential concerns about showing favoritism would not seem applicable. Our memorandum to Eberly should point out that Mrs. Reagan's name should not be used by the sponsors of the event in any fashion that suggests individuals or groups participating in the Foster Grandparent Night will gain any influence with the White House.

You have inquired if there are any legal problems with Mrs. Reagan lending her name as Honorary Chairman of the Foster Grandparent Night to be staged by the Boston Pops Orchestra. We see no legal impediments to this proposal.

The sponsors of the event must, however, be careful in their use of Mrs. Reagan's name. The First Lady's name may not be used in a manner that suggests that individuals or groups participating in the Foster Grandparent Night will derive any benefit from that participation in dealings they may have with the White House or Federal Government generally. If any questions arise in this regard, please contact this office for specific guidance.

Thank you for bringing this matter to our attention.

Sarah McElroy has inquired if we see any problems with Jim Brady serving as Honorary Chairman of a gala evening at the Kennedy Center to benefit the Vest Fund. The Vest Fund, a non-profit, charitable organization, purchases bullet-proof vests for policemen. The gala evening, scheduled for June 20, will be emceed by Phyllis Diller, and feature at least a tape by the President (already completed; he may attend in person), the cast of Hill Street Blues, the Washington Redskins, and Mr. T.

There are no legal bars to Mr. Brady accepting the invitation. We generally discourage such activity to avoid showing favoritism among charities and precipitating a flood of similar requests, but these concerns would not seem particularly strong in this case and, in any event, can be appropriately weighed by Mr. Brady and his office.

When I called Ms. McElroy to obtain more information about her request, she noted that Mr. Brady had also been invited to be Honorary Chairman of the upcoming March of Dimes casino night. What has been said in connection with the Vest Fund applies to this request as well, with the additional caveat that assurances should be obtained from the March of Dimes that the planned "gambling" activities have been approved by local authorities.

You have inquired whether this office sees any problems with Jim Brady accepting an invitation to be Honorary Chairman of the Vest Fund Kennedy Center gala planned for June 20. There are no legal bars to accepting such an invitation should Mr. Brady desire to do so. In responding to inquiries on honorary chairmanships from members of the White House staff we generally raise the prudential concerns of showing favoritism among charities and precipitating a flood of similar requests, but these concerns would not seem particularly strong in this instance.

I also understand that Mr. Brady has been invited to be Honorary Chairman of the upcoming March of Dimes casino night. While I see no legal problems with this request, assurances should be obtained from the March of Dimes that any planned "gambling" activities have been approved by the local authorities.

Dear Mr. Hoffman:

We have received your letter of October 5 to the First Lady, along with the invitation to the Quality of Life Ball. In that letter you announced that the First Lady had been selected to receive the first "Quality of Life Award of Merit." The printed invitation to the ball indicated that the ball was being held "to honour First Lady Nancy Reagan and to benefit The Northern Kentucky Diabetes Association And the Paul I. Hoxworth Blood Center."

We appreciate the kind and supportive sentiments expressed in your letter, and certainly applaud your charitable activities. The invitation to the Quality of Life Ball, however, could be construed as suggesting that the First Lady is associated with the ball, the Dixie Jaycees, the Northern Kentucky Diabetes Association and the Paul I. Hoxworth Blood Center. It also conveys the impression that the First Lady will be in attendance at the ball, which as you know is not possible. It is unfortunately probable that some individuals decided or may decide to attend the ball and make donations to the organizations involved on the basis of these false impressions.

Established White House policy generally prohibits use of the President's or First Lady's name in connection with particular private charitable fundraising efforts. As you might imagine, we receive countless requests that the President or First Lady participate in such efforts. We cannot accept them all, and out of fairness it has been necessary to adopt a policy of uniformly declining such requests, no matter how laudable the objectives of the charitable organizations involved. In fact, if you had advised us of your plans before proceeding, we would not have been able to approve the use of the First Lady's name on the invitation. It is now necessary to correct the false impressions that unfortunately may have been created by the use of the First Lady's name, and to take steps to guarantee that no funds were raised on the basis of those false impressions.

I assume that the invitations have already been mailed. If not, they should be recast so as not to suggest that the First Lady is involved or will be attending. Anyone who has received an invitation should be contacted, to the extent possible, and advised that Mrs. Reagan will not be at the



ball, and that she has no association with the Dixie Jaycees, the Quality of Life Ball, the Northern Kentucky Diabetes Association, or the Paul I. Hoxworth Blood Center. It would also seem necessary to offer to refund donations to any invitees who may have thought otherwise.

Please let us know what steps you have taken to correct the problems inadvertently caused by the invitation. We regret that action of the sort outlined above is necessary, but I trust you will appreciate the reasons we must adhere to our policy of avoiding associations with particular fundraising efforts. Our adherence to the policy in this instance should in no way be construed as an adverse reflection on you or the Dixie Jaycees. You have our best wishes for what I am confident will be a successful event.

Dear Mr. Hoffman:

We were extremely distressed to receive your letter of October 5 to the First Lady, along with the invitation to the Quality of Life Ball. In that letter you announced that the First Lady had been selected to receive the first "Quality of Life Award of Merit." The printed invitation to the ball indicated that the ball was being held "to honour First Lady Nancy Reagan and to benefit The Northern Kentucky Diabetes Association And the Paul I. Hoxworth Blood Center."

We appreciate the kind and supportive sentiments expressed in your letter. The invitation, however, conveys the false impression that the First Lady is associated with the Dixie Jaycees, the Quality of Life Ball, the Northern Kentucky Diabetes Association and the Paul I. Hoxworth Blood Center. It also strongly suggests that the First Lady will be in attendance at the ball, which as you know not only is not true but not even possible. It is highly probable that individuals decided or may decide to attend the ball and make donations to the organizations involved on the basis of these false impressions. In short, it seems to us that the First Lady's name is being used to solicit contributions, and we cannot and will not permit that to happen.

As a matter of fact, established White House policy generally prohibits use of the President's or First Lady's name in association with particular private charitable fundraising efforts. As you might imagine, we receive countless requests that the President or First Lady participate in such efforts, and out of fairness it is necessary to decline them all. If you had advised us of your plans before proceeding, we would not have approved the use of the First Lady's name on the invitation. It is now necessary to correct the false impressions created by your impermissible use of the First Lady's name, and to take steps to guarantee that no funds were raised on the basis of those false impressions.

I assume that the offending invitations have already been mailed. If not, they should not be. In any event, no remaining invitations should be used in any way.

It will also be necessary for the Dixie Jaycees to contact anyone who has received an invitation and expressly advise them that Mrs. Reagan was completely unaware of these matters, that she will not be at the ball, that she has no

association whatever with the Dixie Jaycees, the Quality of Life Ball, the Northern Kentucky Diabetes Association, or the Paul I. Hoxworth Blood Center, and that she has not endorsed any of these organizations. Your letter must also expressly offer to refund donations to any invitees who may have thought otherwise. Please advise us immediately of the steps you have taken to comply with this letter.

We regret that such action is necessary, but I hope you will appreciate our need to protect against misuse of the First Lady's name. Thank you in advance for your cooperation.

Craig Fuller has asked for our views as soon as possible on a request that the President agree to serve as Honorary Chairman of the Federal Office Automation Conference, to be held November 6-8, 1984. The President did a videotape for the Conference last year, and Conference Chairman William A. Saxton would like to expand the President's participation to promote the shared goal of increasing the efficiency of Federal offices. Fuller is interested in advancing this goal and accordingly recommends that the President accept the Honorary Chairmanship and do another welcoming videotape. Fuller notes that the Conference is run for profit, but argues that the admission charges seem reasonable and doubts that the President's expanded involvement will increase attendance.

We generally do not approve acceptance of honorary chairman positions for charitable endeavors and surely should not do so for commercial enterprises. People make money off of this conference, and they should not be permitted to use the Presidency to increase their take. Even the videotape strikes me as problematic, but the President did one before, and we can at least shape the message as one promoting Federal office automation and efficiency rather than the commercial activities of the Conference itself. A memorandum to Fuller outlining our policies on honorary chairmanships and endorsement of commercial enterprises is attached for your review and signature.

You have asked for our views on a request that the President serve as Honorary Chairman of the Federal Office Automation Conference, to be held November 6-8, 1984. You noted that the President did a videotape for the Conference last year, and that his expanded involvement this year would help promote the goal of increased Federal office efficiency.

Established White House policy generally limits the participation of the President as honorary chairman to charitable endeavors, and even then generally to those that are traditional (e.g., American Red Cross) or those with which the President or Mrs. Reagan have a longstanding personal association (e.g., the U.S. Horse Cavalry Association). The President has never served as honorary chairman of a commercial endeavor. Doing so would contravene our policy of not permitting the President's name, likeness, photograph, or signature to be used in any manner that suggests or could be construed as an endorsement of a commercial product or enterprise. We frequently turn down requests that the President serve as honorary chairman of the most laudable charitable activities; I hardly think we should accept such an invitation from a for-profit commercial enterprise. It is permissible for the President to do a videotape, as he has done in the past, discussing the goal of increasing Federal office automation, but the direct personal endorsement that would be conveyed by the acceptance of the honorary chairmanship strikes me as very objectionable.



Dear Craig:

Our meeting of April 10th was unquestionably a major step forward in the planning of office automation briefings for top-level executives within your Departments and Agencies. On behalf of the Federal Office Automation Conference, I want you to know how pleased we are to be contributing to this timely and important project; and, are eagerly anticipating receiving the list of the "most common" application areas from you so that we may begin specifically formulating the program.

Further consultation with members of the Office Automation Council and Industry Committee of the Federal Office Automation Conference has resulted in an overwhelming consensus in favor of the suggestion that President Reagan be the Honorary Chairperson for our 1984 Conference. It is our feeling that his participation in this capacity would dovetail perfectly with our Conference theme as well as with your initiatives to educate senior Federal executives on office automation applications and methods.

You may be interested in knowing that our Conference theme ... Office Automation: Getting Down to Business ... was inspired by the President's videotaped message to last year's Conference attendees in which he affirmed his (and our) obligation "to the American people to give them a Federal Government that operates in a businesslike manner." Our Conference's response to his call will be reflected in a Program this year aimed at improving efficiency and reducing waste in Government through the use of office automation.

If the President were to serve as the Conference's Honorary Chairperson, our campaign to publicize the event would place an even greater emphasis on the Administration's continuing efforts to combat inefficiency and waste, and the success that it has achieved thus far in increasing Federal productivity.

Presidential perspectives and initiatives on these subjects would be part of, and appear in, approximately 500,000 pre-Conference brochures planned for nationwide mailing between June 1st and November 1st. In addition, we are planning a major publicity campaign on radio, television, and in countless trade and consumer publications and newspapers, all of which would represent additional exposure for the President and his association with an effort committed to better Federal management. All this, plus whatever publicity about the President's participation that the White House itself may choose to originate, would certainly create a significant added awareness of the importance that the President places on improving efficiency and reducing waste within Federal operations.

In recognition of the even heavier burdens on the President's schedule than usual in this election year, we would certainly structure his participation as Honorary Chairperson for maximum visibility and support by us on one hand, but minimum time expended by him personally on the other. Some suggestions that come to mind to achieve an optimum return on his investment in time include:

1. A brief appearance to open your senior executive office automation briefings - that would be right at the White House.
2. A Presidential Proclamation relating office automation to improving Federal Government operations, and referencing the Conference.
3. A few, periodically spaced, White House statements or press releases on office automation initiatives and/or gains within the Executive Branch, or perhaps on policy or position as either might affect, or relate to, the implementation of office automation.
4. One or two photo-taking sessions with Conference officials at the White House. One thought might be to have a typical office automation terminal on hand to discuss or use as a backdrop.
5. A videotaped address, set up similar to last year's, in which the President - as Honorary Chairperson - opens the Conference.

I am sure that there are numerous other ideas such as these, but this should serve to illustrate what we have in mind. We would, of course, be open to any reasonable and feasible approaches that you or anyone else might have.

Craig, we would be most honored if the President agreed to be Honorary Chairperson for our 1984 Federal Office Automation Conference. We feel that his acceptance of this title would help continue and even accelerate his drive toward a more businesslike Government begun with the likes of



Reform'88 and the Grace Commission. Furthermore, we believe that by tastefully and professionally identifying him with a non-profit educational Program on office automation - a major new high-technology tool for more efficient, less wasteful operations - we would be providing a visibility and recognition for his efforts far beyond the Federal office automation community itself.

I am most anxious to hear your thoughts on this matter. Please bear in mind that time is of the essence once again. If we are fortunate enough to have the President as Honorary Chairperson, we would immediately have to begin factoring that into our planning and publicity, much of which is already well underway.

May I hear from you soon?
