Dingell stated he had received "disquieting" reports that those provisions were not being followed, and requested that the President advise him of any actions he might take with regard to this matter and identify how any appointments he might make to the Commission comply with the law.

The Office of Presidential Personnel advises that they are not going ahead with plans to appoint the apparent source of Dingell's concern. That prospective appointment was never even announced. They have asked that this office draft a reply to Dingell.

Dingell's letter does no more than tell the President what the law is and admonish him to abide by it. I have drafted what I consider an appropriate reply to such a presumptuous letter, telling Dingell we are aware of the law and will, as always, comply with it. As for his request to be kept advised of any actions taken with respect to this matter, I would tell Dingell that appointments to Commissions of this sort are routinely publicly announced. The contemplated Hobbs appointment was never announced, and I do not think Dingell has any right to know that we have decided not to pursue it.

Dear Mr. President:

I understand that you may be considering the appointment of a new Chairman of the Marine Mammal Commission. Questions have been raised about both the process by which the appointment is being made and the qualifications of the person.

As one of the authors of the Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972, which created the Marine Mammal Commission, I would like to let you know exactly what we had in mind when writing the provisions governing the Commissioners. I draw your attention to the following, which requires:

"(b)(1) The Commission shall be composed of three members who shall be appointed by the President. The President shall make his selection from a list, submitted to him by the Chairman of the Council on Environmental Quality, the Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, the Director of the National Science Foundation, and the Chairman of the National Academy of Sciences, of individuals knowledgeable in the fields of marine ecology and resource management, and who are not in a position to profit from the taking of marine mammals (emphasis added). . " 15 U.S.C. 1401 (b)(1)

The Act requires that Commissioners be chosen from a list of names submitted by the National Science Foundation, the Smithsonian Institution, the National Academy of Sciences, and the Council on Environmental Quality. This was done to ensure

unanimous agreement on a list of people knowledgeable in marine ecology and resource management and otherwise qualified to serve as Commissioners. We believed, and continue to believe, that such an approach should provide necessary assurances to you or any President as to the non-political, professional nature of the Commission.

I have received disquieting reports that suggest that the requirements governing the qualifications and development of a list of candidates have not been adhered to. I trust that this is not the case. However, in the event any person is nominated to be the Chairman of the Marine Mammal Commission who fails to meet the requirements of 16 U.S.C. 1401(b)(1), you may be assured of my active involvement.

I request that you apprise me of any actions which you take with regard to this matter and further request that you identify the way in which any appointment which you make to the Commission comports with the requirements of the Act.

Thank you for your consideration of this matter.

The President shall make his selection from a list, submitted to him by the Chairman of the Council on Environmental Quality, the Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, the Director of the National Science Foundation, and the Chairman of the National Academy of Sciences, of individuals knowledgeable in the fields of marine ecology and resource management, and who are not in a position to profit from the taking of marine mammals (emphasis added). . " 15 U.S.C. 1401 (b)(l)

The Act requires that Commissioners be chosen from a list of names submitted by the National Science Foundation, the Smithsonian Institution, the National Academy of Sciences, and the Council on Environmental Quality. This was done to ensure

unanimous agreement on a list of people knowledgeable in marine ecology and resource management and otherwise qualified to serve as Commissioners. We believed, and continue to believe, that such an approach should provide necessary assurances to you or any President as to the non-political, professional nature of the Commission.

I have received disquieting reports that suggest that the requirements governing the qualifications and development of a list of candidates have not been adhered to. I trust that this is not the case. However, in the event any person is nominated to be the Chairman of the Marine Mammal Commission who fails to meet the requirements of 16 U.S.C. 1401(b)(1), you may be assured of my active involvement.

I request that you apprise me of any actions which you take with regard to this matter and further request that you identify the way in which any appointment which you make to the Commission comports with the requirements of the Act.
