On March 18, Deputy Energy Secretary Danny J. Boggs will receive the 1986 Distinguished Service Award from the National Energy Research Organization, a respected Washington energy organization. Previous recipients include Don Hodel, Senator Jim McClure, Dave Stockman, Robert O. Anderson and Charles Spahr.

This ceremony will mark the end of Danny Boggs' 10-year career in federal energy policy. The President recently nominated him to the 6th Circuit Court of Appeals; the Senate is expected to confirm him shortly.

Danny Boggs has served the President with distinction and has been a constant advocate of free markets, federalism and the sanctity of human life. In the first three years of the Administration, he served in the Office of Policy Development, as a Special Assistant to the President and Executive Secretary of two cabinet councils (Natural Resources and Environment, and Food, Nutrition and Agriculture). Since October 1983, Danny has served as Deputy Secretary of Energy.

Danny Boggs has also served as an alternate delegate to the 1984 International Conference on Population, where he was instrumental in crafting the U.S. position against the use of foreign aid to support population programs that include forced abortion of sterilization, and as the U.S. representative to the 1985 International Atomic Energy Agency conference, with ambassadorial rank.

A biography of Mr. Boggs and a draft presidential letter are attached. I will arrange delivery for appropriate presentation at the NERO awards banquet.

BIOGRAPHY

DANNY JULIAN BOGGS

Danny J. Boggs was nominated by the President on September 9, 1983, and confirmed by the Senate on October 28, 1983, as Deputy Secretary of the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE). As DOE's second highest ranking executive, he works closely with the Secretary in directing the activities and programs of the Department.

Prior to joining DOE, Mr. Boggs was Special Assistant to the President and Assistant Director of the Office of Policy Development at the White House, a post he assumed in March of 1982. His areas of responsibility included agriculture, energy, natural resources, and environment, and he served as Executive Secretary to both the Cabinet Council on Food and Agriculture and the Cabinet Council on Natural Resources and Environment. He had been a senior Policy Advisor at the White House since January 1981.

Mr. Boggs had extensive experience in energy before joining the White House Staff. From 1975 to 1977, he was Assistant to the Chairman of the Federal Power Commission, handling the legal, policy, public, and press relations aspects of the Chairman's office. From 1977 to 1979, he was Deputy Minority Counsel for the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources, where he worked primarily on natural gas and public utility matters.

In 1980 Mr. Boggs engaged in private law and consulting practice and also served as Staff Director for Energy on the Platform Committee of the Republican National Convention. He served as Assistant to the Solicitor General of the United States from 1973 to 1975.

A native and resident of Kentucky, Mr. Boggs was Administrative Assistant and Legal Counsel to the Governor of Kentucky from 1970 to 1971, and ran for State Legislature there in 1975.

Mr. Boggs received an A.B. degree <u>cum laude</u> from Harvard College in 1965, and a J.D. degree from the University of Chicago Law School in 1968. He is a member of the American and Kentucky Bar Associations and is active in a number of professional societies.

Mr. Boggs was born in Havana, Cuba, on October 23, 1944. He and his wife, Judith, and three children live now in Arlington, Virginia.

THE WHITE HOUSE WASHINGTON

I am happy to send greetings to everyone at the Annual Mid-Year Seminar of the National Institute of Municipal Law Officers.

The topic you have chosen, Tort Liability and Insurance Crises, is not only timely but urgent. The last two decades have witnessed an alarming growth in the size and number of damage awards. This phenomenon has thrown the civil justice system into crisis. It represents a grave threat to small businesses and professional people.

We must confront this problem boldly yet prudently, probing it to its roots. A reform of tort law is urgent, but we must be careful to avoid government indemnification of businesses as a way of setting judgments, for this would only heap more burdens on the taxpayer.

I can assure you my Administration is committed to resolving this problem in a comprehensive and responsible manner. The Attorney General has established a Tort Policy Working Group, which is formulating a broad range of policy recommendations. This inter-agency working group will recommend appropriate responses on the Federal level, dealing with legislation, regulation, and litigation. We have every confidence they will provide the states with sound guidelines for tort reform.

Hand-in-hand with this goes a change in approach by the courts. Judges and juries must recognize that the costs of civil justice suits have to be brought under control -- and quickly. Your conference is taking a big step toward that goal.

I wish you good luck and every success in your deliberations. God bless you.

I am writing to request a message from you which will be read at NIMLO's Annual Mid-Year Seminar to be held in Washington, D.C. on March 16 to 18, 1986. British Request for Presidential Message

I have reviewed your memorandum of March 14 on the proposed Presidential message to appear in a British advertising supplement to the New York Times. It is a long-standing White House policy that the President not provide messages for such advertising supplements. Pursuant to this policy, we have turned down requests for similar messages from several other countries, including Israel and the People's Republic of China.

If it is your view that it is in the national interest to make an exception to this policy in this case, we can do so. I cannot tell whether the points in your memorandum are meant to suggest that the national interest warrants an exception, or more broadly that you disagree with the policy itself.


In reaching your decision on whether an exception is warranted in this case, I assume you will take into account the possibility that those countries we have turned down in the past will be understandably upset should they learn of our willingness to provide such a message for the British, as well as the difficulty that will arise in the future when we wish to decline to provide messages for other countries that may be familiar with the British exception.

If you decide to proceed with a message, I recommend deletion of the reference in the first paragraph of the proposed text to "the generosity of a major American corporation." You may then want to refer to cooperation between our peoples rather than our two governments.

DRAFT MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Some months ago Nancy and I visited "The Treasure Houses of Britain" exhibit at the National Gallery of Art in Washington. It reminded us again of the historic ties which we share with the United Kingdom, and of the fact that this unique exhibit was made possible by the cooperation of our two governments and the generosity of a major American corporation.

The history of our two countries is the history of individual initiative and the spirit of enterprise and adventure. Long may it continue to be so.

You will recall, I think, that we talked on the phone in late February about the singular Operation Feed efforts of the 5,400 ?

Nationwide Insurance employees in Columbus, Ohio, and the possibility (probability) of their receiving some message of congratulations from President Reagan after the results of their present (Feb. 6 through March 14) campaign to again provide food for the needy of the Greater Columbus area.

I am to phone you with results of this year's five-week drive as soon as they are available (on or about March 17) and to discuss the message with you at that time.

Until then, I am sending a summary of what we spoke of earlier for your convenience and information. You will agree, I believe, that what the Nationwide employees are doing is just the kind of private enterprise, neighbor-helping-neighbor activity that President Reagan espouses.

There have been countywide "Operation Feed" drives here since 1982, and in each the Nationwide employees have been Number One by large margins. So large, in fact, that after the 1984 effort "Operation Feed" headquarters reported that "if Nationwide's campaign was an independent campaign and was measured against all the other food bank programs in the U.S. that year, it would have been the third largest in the country and would have exceeded New York City's campaign by more than 200,000 cans of food." Then, after 1985 figures were in, "Operation Feed" headquarters noted that "the next best food drive in the whole U.S. to Nationwide's was the state of Minnesota, which garnered 550,000 cans . . . about one-half of what Nationwiders gave."

Nationwiders' contributions have helped make the Columbus food campaigns the most successful in the nation, and Franklin County's "Operation Feed" headquarters has published a pair of booklets that outline "the Nationwide concepts to send to people who write or call about "how do you do what you're doing?"

Here are the statistics:

- 1982 (8-week campaign) Nationwiders: 80,870 food units (cans, boxers, jars), equalled 16% of the county-wide goal.
- 1983 (8-week campaign) Nationwiders: 497,543 food units equalled about 66% of the county-wide goal.
- 1984 (5-week campaign) Nationwiders: 660,856 food units equalled about 66% of the county-wide goal.
- 1985 (5-week campaign) Nationwiders: 999,659 food units equalled about 50% of the county-wide goal, and about 33% of the county-wide result.

Main cog in Nationwiders' successes has been an "Operation Feed Country Store" that the employee steering committee has operated in the main lobby of Nationwide's home office in downtown Columbus every campaign.

The store buys food in case lots or more from brokers/wholesalers for the wholesale price minus an advertising adjustment and 2% discount for payment within 10 days of delivery. Store items are sold at the nearest nickle above cost. The idea behind the store was its convenience: employees could buy cheaper and in any quantity without having to lug in a bag or box of canned goods. Also, employees who forgot to bring in cans or boxes from home simply could buy what they wanted right at the work site either from 6:30 to 9:00 a.m. or 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

During the first year, most of the food contributed was either carried in by individuals or bought by individuals at the country store. Gradually it dawned on employees that they could buy more by banding together and having money-raising events ... raffles, food sales, white elephant sales, eating contests, and the like (really, whatever creativity and ingenuity can come up with, within the bounds of good taste and some management regulations).

Now, during the Operation Feed campaign, each employee unit (44 in all, divided along departmental lines, and each with a campaign captain and lieutenants) runs its own contests and promotions to raise money. E.g., an eating contest (how many White Castle hamburgers in 5 minutes?) by one unit gathered about \$1,000 at the morning coffee break today.

The fund-raising for food-buying also has included such things as bake sales, white elephant sales, a variety of raffles, a plano concert, bowling tournaments, and some far-out events like the hamburger eating contest and raw-egg eating competition between four teams of three employees each (one team was female).

It takes a lot of activity, ingenuity, creativity, and enough money to provide a million or more cans of food, believe me! But Nationwide's relatively small home office force has done it four years in a row and, I believe, will do it a fifth time by the time I phone in final results to you! Until then, I thank you for your consideration.

P.S. "Operation Feeds" aren't the only community-benefit activities that turn on Nationwide employees. They've been the No. 1 blood donor group in the State of Ohio ever since 1977 and they've been the No. 1 contributing group (and last year were the first locally to pledge over \$1 million) to the United Way of Franklin County for a number of years.



A larger than life statue of Justice Marshall by sculptor Reuben Kramer will be dedicated at Douglass High School on February 20, 1986.

Principal, Mrs. Jean B. Owens will be joined by Baltimore Mayor William Donald Schaefer, Congressman Parren J. Mitchell and other community leaders for the dedication ceremony.

Thurgood Marshall graduated from Douglass High School in 1925. He attended Lincoln University, graduating in 1930 and graduated from the Howard Law School in 1933.

As Chief Counsel for the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund, he successfully argued the historic Brown vs. Board of Education case which led to the banning of segregated schools. He ascended to the Supreme Court August 30, 1967 by appointment of President Lyndon Johnson.
