France: The Counterterrorist Policy of the New Conservative Government

After two months in power, the policies of the conservative government that emerged from the March legislative election in France are becoming clearer on many issues, including terrorism. The new government's approach to terrorism will be shaped by two forces: the plans of the new policymakers involved in domestic security and the grim realities of the terrorism problem the French face. On the basis of early indications, the new government probably will be tougher within France, but will continue to be hesitant about actions abroad. The result is likely to be only a limited improvement in cooperation with the United States against terrorism.

Pressure for Change

Fears about a decline of law and order—including both street crime and terrorism—were an important part of the conservatives' indictment of the incumbent Socialist government during the election campaign. Rightist politicians lambasted the left for inefficient organization, lack of support for the police, overconcern about civil rights, and naivete and sentimentality about the motives of terrorists. Public concern was especially strong in February when authorities seemed unable to prevent a wave of bombings in Paris or to catch the perpetrators:

- In a February opinion poll, 59 percent of the respondents thought the government should be doing more about terrorism.
- Public support for the US strike against Libya has been much stronger in France than in other West European countries, with as many as 61 percent expressing approval.

Even before the election, President Francois Mitterrand was becoming increasingly disturbed about terrorism and was easing his objections to multinational cooperation that might compromise French independence. According to press reports, he is distressed not only by the rash of bombings but also by the frustrations of trying to negotiate the release of the French hostages in Lebanon.

The New Counterterrorist Team and Its Plan
The new cabinet headed by Prime Minister Jacques
Chirac came into power determined to show more
toughness and effectiveness.

Chirac's key subordinates on counterterrorism are:

- Charles Pasqua, the Minister of the Interior,
- Robert Pandraud, Pasqua's deputy for public security,

 This appointment reflects the Prime Minister's personal interest in improving security. He will have day-to-day control of counterterrorist operations.
- Bernard Gerard, who was named head of the French counterespionage and counterterrorist service—the DST—in April.

In his first policy speech to the National Assembly on 9 April, Chirac presented his plans for improving France's ability to deal with terrorism. Legislation to put these plans into effect reportedly will be introduced before the current session of legislature ends in June. The main points are said to include:

- Establishing an interministerial committee (with representatives from Interior, Justice, Defense, and Foreign Affairs) on terrorism that will report directly to the Prime Minister. This would be an effort to overcome the notorious lack of cooperation among the security agencies, which have been reluctant to share information that might enable others to get the credit for important arrests.
- Setting up a special police unit to handle counterterrorism. The unit would draw specialists from throughout the security apparatus and would handle the entire process of pursuing terrorists, from intelligence and investigation to prosecution.
- Establishing special courts to handle terrorist cases.
- · Making terrorism a crime in the penal code.
- Extending the time a suspect could be isolated and interrogated without charges being brought or legal assistance provided.
- Allowing suspects who are willing to provide information to bargain for reduced sentences.

The New Government's Record So Far

Chirac's government already has taken visible steps to head off further terrorism in France. Police patrols have been increased, and the authorities have followed up on lengthy investigations by arresting several members of the extreme-left group Action Directe. The French also expelled six Libyans, as well as an Algerian and a Tunisian who were working for Tripoli, for planning terrorist attacks in France, according to press accounts.

Overseas, however, the new French Government has been much more cautious so far, and the record of actions last month is mixed:

· Paris pulled its cease-fire observers out of Beirut,

This was clearly an attempt to reduce French vulnerability to killings and kidnapings.

- The French agreed to increased security measures in Berlin that will limit the movement of Libyan diplomats, but they refused to go along with the United States and the United Kingdom in an effort to expel Libyan People's Bureau personnel.
- The French Government disagreed with the goals and methods of the US airstrike against Libya and denied overflight rights.
- France joined the other EC countries in limiting the movements of Libyan diplomats, but probably will not take more serious steps like recalling its ambassador or breaking diplomatic relations.
- The French have acknowledged the need for greater international cooperation, but have not yet taken any new steps.

Outlook

We expect the French will continue to beef up security within France. The government probably hopes that having more policemen on the street is not only a highly visible sign that something is being done about terrorism, but also that such measures will help

reduce the street crime that the public is also worried about. The National Assembly will probably pass most of the government's proposals, although the bureaucratic barriers to cooperation among the many different security agencies cannot be legislated out of existence. The protection of US interests in France will benefit from this increased emphasis on security, but—in line with conservative tradition—the new government will probably be wary of cooperating extensively with the United States on security and intelligence matters.

Paris will probably be hesitant, however, about acting against terrorists abroad, where its ability to protect French interests is more limited. France does not have sufficient means to exert enough pressure in Beirut, Damascus, and Tehran to get its hostages freed, and a rescue operation is fraught with risk. Chirac thus will probably continue to try to gain the release of the French hostages in Lebanon through negotiation, although he is probably less willing than his predecessors to make concessions. Paris may be interested in putting pressure on Qadhafi by withdrawing its objections to President Hissein Habre's desire to attack the Libyans in northern Chad. They would probably prefer that Habre took the lead in such an operation, but they might be willing to provide air cover, especially if Habre got into trouble. We believe, however, that the French will be reluctant to get involved in any joint action where they would have to place French forces under foreign command and where they do not feel French interests are directly at stake.

SUMMARY

Two weeks ago, State led an interagency briefing team to Mexico and four Central American countries (Guatemala, Costa Rica, Panama and Honduras) to brief Emergency Support Team (EST) capabilities. El Salvador is sufficiently familiar with USG capabilities of this nature that it was not visited. As you recall, an EST briefing team visited seven Middle East countries in February. Four more trips are planned this year to an additional 15 countries in South America, the Persian Gulf, Europe and the Pacific. Coincident with the briefing trip, US agencies in Washington tested the EST ability to mobilize and deploy rapidly. There is also underway a plan to deploy an EST permanently to Frankfurt so it would be able to respond more rapidly to an incident in the Mediterranean area.

BRIEFING TEAM

Ted McNamara of PM led the team which included representatives from S/CT, CIA, JSOC, and SOUTHCOM. As in the previous trip to the Middle East, the team explained how the USG is able, through the EST, to provide special assistance to embassies and friendly host governments during terrorist crises. McNamara emphasized that the EST provides the ambassador a single "button" to push for counterterrorism assistance specifically tailored to the host government's needs. Embassies were pleased that Washington was pre-coordinating its counterterrorist assistance and that EST members, once they arrived, would work directly for them as additional members of the country team.

The briefing team also met with senior government officials (those most likely be involved in a decision to

request U.S assistance) to explain the EST concept and the U.S. willingness to assist them. McNamara stressed that the host country remains in charge and that EST could come in small (1 or 2 persons), medium (5-20 persons), or large with (20 - 50 persons) according to their wishes. Accepting the EST would in no way obligate the country to accept a deployment as well.

Overall the host government responses were very positive, each recognizing that it would lack at least some of resources needed to handle a major incident:

MOBILIZATION EXERCISE

On May 15, the NSC successfully tested the EST's ability to mobilize, load and deploy within The exercise began with a simulated terrorist incident in Central America.

At the direction of the Terrorist Incident Working Group (TIWG), these elements proceeded to Dulles International Airport where the State team leader assembled them into a single eighteen-man team. The NSC terminated the exercise once the team and its 9000 pounds of equipment were on board the Boeing 737 ready to depart.

Overall, the Department and the NSC were pleased with the exercise. The team was ready to depart well within the response time, and there were no major problems in preparation and implementation. There are still some loose ends in the area of communications which are currently being addressed.



- 2. QUAI DEPUTY SECRETARY GENERAL COMBAL INFORMED POLCOUNS EARLY IN THE DAY ON JUNE 9 OF COMPOSITION OF FRENCH DELEGATION AND OF GOF PROPOSALS FOR THE AGENDA. AS REPORTED PREVIOUSLY, DELEGATION WILL BE HEADED ON THE FIRST DAY BY QUAL MIDDLE EAST DIRECTOR BONNEFOUS AND ON THE SECOND DAY BY LEGAL DIRECTOR GUILLAUME. GOF SUGGESTS THAT AGENDA FOR THE FIRST DAY CONSIST OF :
 - (1) A TOUR D'HORIZON OF THE POLITICAL SITUATION IN THE MIDDLE EAST, AND
 - (2) DETAILED ANALYSIS OF SITUATIONS IN SYRIA AND LIBYA.

3. THE OTHER MEMBERS OF THE DELEGATION WILL BE PHILIPPE COSTE, HEAD OF THE QUAI'S POLICY ANALYSIS CENTER (CAP); MLLE. MICHELE RAMIS OF THE QUAI'S LEGAL DIRECTORATE; PIERRE VERBRUGGE, DIRECTOR GENERAL OF THE NATIONAL POLICE; DIDIER QUENTIN, TECHNICAL ADVISER TO MINISTER-DELEGATE FOR SECURITY PANDRAUD; FRANCOIS LE MOUEL, -INTER-MINISTERIAL COORDINATOR FOR COUNTER-TERRORISM; COLONEL MORREAU OF THE DGSE AND YVON GOETZINGER OF THE DIRECTORATE GENERAL FOR CIVIL AVIATION.



7. AS THE RPR AND UDF PROMISED, THE GOF HAS CREATED WHAT IT CALLS A NATIONAL SECURITY COUNCIL TO DEAL WITH TERRORISM. THIS "COUNCIL", COMPOSED OF CONCERNED MINISTERS -- PASOUA, PANDRAUD, RAIHOND (FOREIGN AFFAIRS), CHALANDON (JUSTICE), AND GIRAUD (DEFENSE) -- HAS MET TWICE ALREADY. A MATIGNON ADVISOR TOLD US RECENTLY, HOWEVER, THAT IT IS UNLIKELY A PERMAHENTORGANIZATION WILL BE CREATED TO FLESH OUT THIS PAPER ENTITY. INSTEAD, THE "COUNCIL" WILL BE IMITED TO THE FIVE MINISTERS MEETING EVERY COUPLE OF MONTHS. THIS MOVE FULFILLS THE CAMPAIGN COMMITMENT IN A MINIMAL WAY, AND AT LEAST REMOVES SOME OF THE AD HOC ASPECT TO INTERMINISTERIAL DISCUSSIONS OF TERRORISM UNDER THE FABIUS GOVERNMENT.

8. THE GOF'S LEGISLATION ON TERRORISM HAS NOT YET BEEN PUSHED THROUGH PARLIAMENT. NEVERTHELESS, ITS

BASIC LINES ARE CLEAR. FIRST, THERE WILL BE A MEASURE PERMITTING INVESTIGATION AND TRIAL OF TERRORIST CASES TO BE CENTRALIZED IN A PARIS COURT. SUCH CASES, IF THEY COME TO TRIAL, WILL BE DECIDED NOT BY A JURY OF ORDINARY CITIZENS, BUT BY PROFESSIONAL MAGISTRATES. THESE MEASURES ARE INTENDED TO AVOID HAVING INEXPERIENCED PROVINCIAL MAGISTRATES INVESTIGATING COMPLICATED TERRORIST CASES. JUSTICE MINISTER CHALANDON HAS INSISTED, HOWEVER, THAT THERE BE FLEXIBILITY WHICH WOULD PERMIT THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES RATHER THAN PARIS TO TAKE CHARGE IF THIS WOULD BE MORE PRACTICAL IN ANY PARTICULAR CASE. (COMMENT: IF THE CENTRALIZATION IS WIDELY IMPLEMENTED, THIS COULD HAVE A MARKED EFFECT ON CASES INVOLVING ACTION DIRECTE, BT



A MATIGNOM ADVISOR TOLD US RECENTLY, HOWEVER, THAT IT IS UNLIKELY A PERMANENTORGANIZATION WILL BE CREATED TO FLESH OUT THIS PAPER ENTITY. INSTEAD, THE "COUNCIL" WILL BE LIMITED TO THE FIVE MINISTERS MEETING EVERY COUPLE OF MONTHS. THIS MOVE FULFILLS THE CAMPAIGN COMMITMENT IN A HINIMAL WAY, AND AT LEAST REMOVES SOME OF THE AD HOC ASPECT TO INTERMINISTERIAL DISCUSSIONS OF TERRORISM UNDER THE FABIUS GOVERNMENT.
- 8. THE GOF'S LEGISLATION ON TERRORISM WAS NOT YET BEEN PUSHED THROUGH PARLIAMENT. NEVERTHELESS, ITS BASIC LINES ARE CLEAR. FIRST, THERE WILL BE A MEASURE PERMITTING INVESTIGATION AND TRIAL OF TERRORIST CASES TO BE CENTRALIZED IN A PARIS COURT. SUCH CASES, IF

THEY COME TO TRIAL, WILL BE DECIDED NOT BY A JURY OF ORDINARY CITIZENS, BUT BY PROFESSIONAL MAGISTRATES. THESE MEASURES ARE INTENDED TO AVOID HAVING INEXPERIENCED PROVINCIAL MAGISTRATES INVESTIGATING COMPLICATED TERRORIST CASES. JUSTICE MINISTER CHALANDON HAS INSISTED, HOWEVER, THAT THERE BE FLEXIBILITY: WHICH WOULD PERMIT THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES RATHER THAN PARIS TO TAKE CHARGE IF THIS WOULD BE MORE PRACTICAL IN ANY PARTICULAR CASE. (COMMENT: IF THE CENTRALIZATION IS WIDELY IMPLEMENTED, THIS COULD HAVE A MARKED EFFECT ON CASES INVOLVING ACTION DIRECTE. WHICH ARE CURRENTLY DIVIDED AMONG SEVERAL RT

THE NEW LEGISLATION ALSO ENVISAGES PRISONERS WHO ARE PRESUMED TO BE TERRORISTS BEING HELD INCOMMUNICADO BY THE POLICE FOR FOUR DAYS AFTER THEIR ARREST (VICE TWO PRESENTLY) BEFORE BEING ALLOWED TO SEE A LAWYER. THE JUSTICE MINISTRY HAS PHRASED THE HIRE THIS MEASURE CAUTIOUSLY, SPECIFYING THAT THE STEYING INFORMATION PROVIDED MUST PREVENT A TERRORIST ACT, OR VENUE CONTRIBUTE TO ESTABLISHING THE GUILT OF SOMEONE WHO - 111 HAS ALREADY COMMITTED SUCH AN ACT.

11. IN ANOTHER MEASURE THAT MAY AFFECT ANTITERRORISM. THE GOF PROPOSES TO BROADEN THE CIRCUMSTANCES UNDER WHICH POLICE MAY REQUIRE INDIVIDUALS TO PRESENT THEIR IDENTIFICATION PAPERS. THE LAW ENVISIONS THAT ANYONE REFUSING TO SHOW THEIR I.D. CAN BE TAKEN TO THE POLICE STATION TO BE PHOTOGRAPHED AND FINGERPRINTED. THOSE REFUSING TO COOPERATE COULD BE SENT TO JAIL. THE GOF WILL ALSO INTRODUCE A NEW, "UNFALSIFIABLE" 1.D. CARD.

12. THE GOF HAS STILL NOT REALLY ADDRESSED ITS MOST FAR-REACHING COMMITMENT: THE REORGANIZATION OF THE SERVICES INVOLVED IN THE FIGHT AGAINST TERRORISM. THE RPR AND UDF HAD INDICATED DURING THE CAMPAIGN THAT THEY WOULD CENTRALIZE THE COUNTERTERRORISM COMPONENTS OF- ALL THE SERVICES UNDER ONE HEAD. LITTLE OR NOTHING HAS BEEN DONE AS YET. HOWEVER. THE INTERMINISTERIAL CLEARING HOUSE CALLED UCLAT, CREATED BY THE FABIUS GOVERNMENT AND HEADED BY POLICE PROFESSIONAL FRANCOIS LE MOUEL, CONTINUES TO FUNCTION. THIS MECHANISM HAS ACHIEVED SOME DEGREES OF COORDINATION ON SPECIFIC CASES, BUT IN GENERAL THE DST, RENSEIGHEMENTS GENERAUX, POLICE JUDICIAIRE, ETC., CONTINUE TO GO THEIR OWN WAYS WITH A MINIMUM OF INTERCOMMUNICATION. POSITIVE DEVELOPMENT FROM THE U.S. STANDPOINT. IN ADDITION TO HELPING PREVENT FUTURE TERRORIST ACTS AGAINST U.S. OFFICIALS AND INTERESTS IN FRANCE.

14. NEVERTHELESS, IT IS NOT YET CLEAR HOW DRAMATIC A CHANGE THE GOF CAN ENGINEER WITH THE MEASURES ADOPTED. FRANCE IS A CROSSROADS COUNTRY FOR INDIVIDUALS OF HANY DIFFERENT NATIONALITIES AND BACKGROUNDS. LIKE ITS EC MEIGHBORS, THE GOF HAS DIFFICULTY RECONCILING THE IDEA OF INCREASINGLY OPEN BORDERS WITH THE THREAT POSED BY MERRORISTS. EVEN IF THE GOF DECIDES TO TIGHTEN UP ON SERSES AND OTHER MEANS



24. ON RELATED ISSUES, THE GOF HAS NOT RESPONDED TO REPEATED EMBASSY SUGGESTIONS ON THE ISSUE OF A NEW EXTRADITION TREATY BETWEEN THE U.S. AND FRANCE. IN PARTICULAR. THEY SHOW HO SIGN OF RETHINKING THEIR

POSITION AGAINST LIMITING POLITICAL EXCEPTIONS. THE RPR/UDF HAD ALSO SIGNALED EARLIER AN INTENTION TO REVIEW ITS GENERAL POLICY ON POLITICAL ASYLUM IN THE LIGHT OF TERRORIST THREAT, AND TO INSTITUTE A VISA REQUIREMENT WITH WORTH AFRICAN COUTRIES FOR THE SAME REASONS. THE GOVERNMENT HAS REPORTEDLY BEGUN TO EXPEL SOME BASQUES SUSPECTED OF THES TO THE TERRORIST ORGANIZATION ETA WHEN THEIR REQUESTS FOR POLITICAL ASYLUM HAVE BEEN DENIED. IT HAS NOT YET HOVED, HOWEVER, TO EXPEL ITALIANS WITH RED BRIGADE BACKGROUNDS, EVEN THOUGH MANY OF THESE HAVE NEVER RECEIVED FORMAL REFUGEE STATUS PANDRAUD TOLD THE PRESS ON JUNE 12 THAT FRANCE WOULD "RESPECT ITS OWN TRADITION OF POLITICAL ASYLUM" AS LONG AS REFUGEES BEHAVED THEMSELVES. IN THE SAME VEIN, THE GOF HAS DECIDED TO LEAVE ASIDE --AT LEAST FOR THE MOMENT -- THE LEGISLATION IT HAD INTENDED TO PROPOSE TO HODIFY THE ASYLUM LAWS.

26. TO GET OUR MESSAGE ACROSS ON TERRORISM, WE ARE CLEARLY GOING TO HAVE TO CONCENTRATE ON THE SMALL COTERIE OF KEY OFFICIALS. THIS WILL BE DIFFICULT AT TIMES, SINCE SOME HAVE NO FORMAL RESPONSIBILITY FOR COUNTERTERRORISM, ALL HAVE MANY OTHER IMPORTANT RESPONSIBILITIES, AND THEIR TIME AND ATTENTION ARE AT A PREMIUM. TO TAKE IT ONE STEP FARTHER, WE BELIEVE OCCASIONAL APPROACHES TO THE PRIME MINISTER HIMSELF WILL BE NECESSARY.
