Foley: Premature tax cut may result in higher deficits

U.S. Rep. Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., said Monday it may be "foolish" to approve President Reagan's tax cut program before Congress shows it can reduce government spending.

Reagan will go before a joint session of Congress Wednesday night with his own budget-slashing plan. Foley, House Democratic whip, said he has been invited to the White House today for an advance look at the proposals.

"I'm a bit concerned that we would be foolish perhaps to rush in headlong to a three-year across-the-board tax cut (proposed by Reagan) before we've seen what capacity the Congress has to reduce the growth of the federal budget," Foley told a Spokane news conference.

"When it comes to expenditure cuts, there is almost, for every single dollar of the federal budget, some constituency that feels that it is important to retain those particular expenditures. So it's tough."

Foley warned that if tax cuts are made and budget cuts don't follow "we might be faced with unacceptably high new deficits and, again, some pressure on inflation."

During the news conference, Foley also addressed:

WHEAT TO IRAN — "I think it's better if things start out on a quiet, easy resumption if we're going to have that kind of trade resumed.... The wounds are a little fresh and the blood is a little hot in the country still about the treatment of our hostages."

U.S.-SOVIET RELATIONS — "I think we've seen recently a barrage of charges back and forth between the Soviet Union and the United States and I expect that it will come to an end pretty soon."

POLAND — "No one anticipates that the U.S. will engage in any kind of military response if there is an invasion of Poland."

GRAIN TO RUSSIA — "I think that lifting the embargo (on grain sales to the Soviets) has become somewhat of a confused term. Lifting the embargo does not mean, and has never meant, an unlimited immediate opportunity for purchases by the Soviet Union."

"What lifting the embargo would mean... would be the opportunity for consultation with the Soviets about what their requirements might be and what we might find it possible to permit them to purchase."

HUMAN RIGHTS — "I would hope that the U.S. could continue the stand for advancement of personal liberty and human rights abroad, perhaps with a little lower public visibility."

"To take another tack, I think it is a mistake for this administration to publicly signal that the human rights record of South Korea will not particularly affect our policy with them with respect to military alliance."

FOOD STAMPS — "I can see the possibility of cuts there of about \$1 billion. If they try to cut \$2 billion from the program, I think they would be seriously affecting the nutrition of some of the poor citizens in the country."

SUBJECT: Administration Plans for the C.P.B.

Walter Annenberg's letter to Michael Deaver raises the question as to whether the Administration intends to phase out the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, as per some press accounts of the Transition Team Report. Mr. Annenberg is concerned because of his tentative plans to donate \$10,000,000 per year to the C.P.B.

It is not the Administration's policy to phase out the C.P.B. Rather, the plan is to reduce the annual government subsidy from the current level of approximately \$160 million to a cap of \$100 million by Fiscal Year 1985. In F.Y. 1982, for example, the projected subsidy of 172 million would be cut by 25% to 129 million. These reductions will be targeted at administrative overhead and national broadcasting programs, with lesser cuts for local programming.

The theory behind these cuts, aside from the present economic constraints, is that private funds are available for this kind of cultural/educational activity. Evidently, an official of Xerox Corporation has privately expressed interest in increasing its own contribution to C.P.B. In line with the Administration's policy, contributions such as those contemplated by Mr. Annenberg should be encouraged.

Dear Mr. Deaver:

I thought you might want to have more background on the project we discussed during our telephone conversation yesterday — the granting of funds by the Annenberg School of Communications to the Corporation for Public Broadcasting to develop college-level courses that would be delivered to students by means of new communications systems.

For some years I have been concerned about the rising costs of college education and the burden those costs place upon low and middle-income families. I have also been aware of the many students who drop out of college for various reasons and then later cannot resume their education because of lack of time, financial or instructional resources. Finally, mid-career people whose advancement may depend upon earning a degree frequently find it difficult to satisfy the requirements.

There are currently efforts by a number of colleges and by public television stations to provide college level courses using telecommunications systems. Invariably these efforts are hampered by lack of funds and in most cases it is necessary for them to emphasize such income-producing courses as computer programming and accounting. As a result there are many gaps in the courses offered and it has been impossible for them to present a well-rounded education leading to a degree.


It was to correct these shortcomings that I proposed that the Annenberg School of Communications grant the Corporation for Public Broadcasting \$10,000,000 a year for 15 years. IRS approval was obtained and a Task Force headed by William J. McGill, former president of Columbia University, developed a plan to fill gaps not adequately met by existing programs, to provide national availability of programs developed and to explore the application of instructional methods, course designs and new technologies.

We were prepared to go ahead with the plan when it was reported that the Transition Team looking into CPB and public television had recommended that CPB be phased out. In view of this recommendation we had no alternative but to postpone action.

If the Administration decides not to accept the Transition Team report, we will go forward as planned with the Corporation for Public Broadcasting/Annenberg School of Communications project. If the Administration is inclined to accept the Transition Team report and phase out CPB, we will, after obtaining IRS approval, proceed using another organization, possibly The Annenberg School itself, to administer the plan.
