Events of recent weeks have made it impossible for me to respond to your letter of March 13, 1981 as rapidly as I should have liked.

I have discussed with my White House collegues your request that the President write an introduction to the catalogue which will accompany the Anschutz Collection on its upcoming foreign tour. Although they join with the President and me in expressing great personal admiration for the Collection and tour, we have concluded that it will not be appropriate for the President to write the introduction.

You asked for my comments on the request that the President write an introduction to the catalogue which will accompany the Anschutz Collection on its tour of several foreign museums.

Because of the deluge of requests to associate the President's name with various ventures which pass through my office, my instinctive reaction is to say no. This is simply for the reason that it is difficult to support one project and decline another without appearing to be unfair.

Even so, I would not have as much trouble with this request if the collection was owned by a non-profit museum or organization. There is a chance that by lending his name to this collection, the President would be increasing its value as a whole, or the value of some individual work of art in the collection. Since the collection is privately owned, the President's imprimatur might be seen as use of his office to increase the value of Philip Anschutz's investment holdings.

Likewise, like it or not, the association of the President's name and office with a collection that, in a sense, glorifies the "Wild West" and all that it connotes, might not be appropriate so soon after the assassination attempt.
