Dear Mr. Grambart:

Thank you for your letter of April 18th concerning the legislation currently before the Congress which would raise salaries and establish certain other benefits for air traffic controllers.

In a letter from Mr. Edwin L. Harper, the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget, to Congresswoman Mary Rose Oakar, Chairwoman of the Subcommittee on Compensation and Employee Benefits, U.S. House of Representatives, the Administration went on record as being opposed to H.R. 1576. This position was taken as a matter of principle. The proposed legislation is opposed because it singles out one group of employees for preferential treatment. Further, it is designed to provide compensation and benefit levels out of line with both public and private sector compensation standards.

The Administration is cognizant of its responsibilities both to the continued assurance of the nation's air traffic safety and to the employees who staff the air traffic control system. We remain ready to reach a reasonable and a responsible contract settlement with the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization.

Sorry that I have not written to you sooner to give you an up date as to what is going on with Cable here in Sacramento. My last correspondence indicates that I wrote to you on April 6th and chatted with you on the phone a few days later and a few things have happened since our last conversation.

It looks as if we are still about one year off before the award of the franchise and it still looks as if our chances are excellent as to the acquisition of this major market. Because of the delay, now going into its third year, the "price of poker" has gone up. Originally, when ATC/McClatchy made their initial offering, (about 1½ years ago) their numbers indicated cost to construct the system somewhere in the neighborhood of \$40,000,000. This original estimate was based on a single cable system and 40 channels. With inflation, increased cost of construction and new state of the art, (102 channels and a dual system), equates to a new total cost in construction to somewhere in the neighborhood of \$100,000,000.

Quite naturally, this is going to change the investment numbers, for not only the local investors but for ATC/McClatchy, which we are currently working on.

Even with this monumental change, the investment is still exciting and the return looks good and I can assure you that I am going to invest all that I can personally since the basic rule has not changed - i.e., no investment until the acquisition of the franchise.

We should have everything pretty well finalized as to what the changes will be by sometime the first part of July.

There is no way I can explain all this to you in letter form and I indicated to you I might be back East sometime this summer. Specifically, I have a speaking engagement in Hartford, Connecticut on Wednesday, July 22nd and Thursday, July 23. I was thinking that I might come to Washington Sunday night, July 19th and could perhaps meet with you either Monday the 20th or Tuesday, the 21st. I have to be in Hartford early evening on Tuesday the 21st. I have a couple of things I want to do in Washington when I am there.

If this is not convenient, I could meet with you on Friday, July 24th or Saturday July 25th which would be on the tail end of my trip to Hartford.

Why don't you examine those dates and let me know if either is convenient and I will go ahead and schedule.

Thanks for your recent letter regarding Amtrak.

The Administration has proposed a reduction in Federal subsidies to Amtrak as part of the President's program to cut Federal spending and reduce inflation. Amtrak serves a relatively small number of travelers. Common-carrier air and bus services, which receive much lower Federal subsidies, are available in most of the cities served by Amtrak. Large Federal subsidies to Amtrak, almost one billion dollars in 1981, cannot be justified under these circumstances.

The Administration has proposed that beginning in 1982 Amtrak cover 50 percent of its costs by fares or subsidies other than from the Federal Government. We believe that Amtrak can operate a national system of passenger trains within the proposed budget, which includes at least \$150 million for subsidizing service outside the Northeast Corridor. Amtrak will have to raise fares, cut expenses and eliminate its least patronized and most unprofitable routes to accomplish this objective, but it can be done. The train between Seattle and Los Angeles is the best long distance train in terms of average ridership. However, in 1980 it required over \$36 million in Federal subsidy (\$67 per passenger). Since the ridership is good, a combination of fare increases and expense reductions should allow this route to remain in service. These proposals and the subsidy reductions are important components in the Administration's effort to meet the nation's economic challenges.

Dear President Reagan:

The one-quarter of a million people who depend on the domestic nonrubber footwear industry for their jobs are anxiously awaiting your decision on the International Trade Commission's recommendation that you extend import relief for their industry. We respectfully request that you extend the current import relief program for an additional three years to ensure that the industry has sufficient time to complete its adjustment to import competition, thereby safeguarding the remaining jobs in this industry.

In 1977, after two unanimous findings of serious injury from imports by the International Trade Commission (ITC), two Orderly Marketing Agreements (OMA's) were negotiated with Taiwan and Korea. These four year (1977 to 1981) agreements were accompanied by Presidential authority to control imports from non-OMA countries. This authority, however, was not exercised and import surges from other countries totally negated the moderate rollback in imports from Taiwan and Korea. In fact, import penetration in 1979 rose to record levels, capturing over one-half (51%) of the domestic market. Even in 1980, import penetration levels (48.9%) remained higher than pre-OMA levels and the first two months of 1981 show an alarming 55% penetration rate.

Although the domestic footwear industry did not receive the relief promised in 1977, the import relief program has been successful in reducing the rate of import growth and production declines in the footwear industry. The industry took full advantage and initiated efforts to adjust to import competition. The ITC cited the industry's "considerable effort to improve its competitive position vis-a-vis imports during the relief period." Expenditures on new plants, equipment and research and development increased substantially. Exports nearly tripled during the import relief period. Substantial investment was made in special programs designed to improve marketing, productivity and management skills in this long-beleaguered industry. Premature termination of import relief at this time will jeopardize the gains which have already been made, arrest progress toward recovery and undoubtedly increase unemployment in the many small towns and rural areas in 38 states which depend on employment generated by the domestic footwear industry.

The ITC stated that the industry is clearly "adjusting" to import competition, yet all four commissioners recognized the need to continue the import restraints on Taiwan -- the largest foreign supplier of footwear -- to permit the completion of this process.

Only one commissioner, however, recognized the continuing threat of Korea. Termination of the CMA with Korea would seriously inhibit, if not halt, the adjustment process. Prior to the CMA, Korea had the highest average annual growth rate (85%) of all major suppliers of footwear to the U.S.; termination of import restraints could result in resumption of this phenomenal growth. Moreover, Korea's exports of footwear to the U.S. are concentrated in the most import-impacted segment of the domestic footwear market -- athletic footwear. Import penetration in the athletic market is 68.2% and over 75% of Korea's nonrubber footwear exports fall into this category. The ensuing injury, however, would not be limited to this segment since athletic footwear is substitutable and competes directly with casual footwear. Extension of the Korean CMA is clearly necessary to safeguard the adjustment process.

Import relief also must be extended for the full three years permitted by law to ensure that the domestic industry has sufficient time to complete the adjustment process and provide the industry with a full four years of sustained effective relief promised in 1977. Imports surges seriously hampered the adjustment process during the initial years of import relief, and an extension of the relief program is now necessary to partially remedy the dilatory effects of previous surges.

To ensure that effective relief is provided during the extension period, Presidential authority to control import surges from the nearly 70 non-OMA countries must be exercised as recommended by the ITC. Tailure to exercise this authority when needed seriously disrupted the adjustment process during the initial import relief period.

The history of the domestic footwear industry is well known, Mr. President. This import-impacted industry has been in a long period of decline, resulting from the rapid growth of imports during the 1960's and 1970's. For too long, the domestic industry has suffered because the U.S., as verified by the ITC, is the most open footwear market in the world, the focal point for world shoe exports. Import relief has given this industry the opportunity to reverse this trend. The footwear industry has taken full advantage of this opportunity, beginning the adjustment process. A full three-year extension of the current import relief program will allow this industry to continue its efforts to adjust to import competition and truly recover from the serious injury caused by decades of growing imports. This is the purpose of temporary import relief under the "escape"

clause" provisions of the Trade Act of 1974. Please do not thwart the adjustment process envisioned under the "escape clause" by prematurely terminating import relief; extend the current import relief program without modification for a final three years.

Thank you for your letter of May 15 concerning the possibility of a call on President Reagan by President Kyprianou when he will be in this country to address the United Nations General Assembly.

I am afraid that it will not be possible this September for President Reagan to receive President Kyprianou. It will be an extremely busy month for the President and, much as he would like to meet your President, it will simply not be feasible at that time. Since both our Presidents will be in office for some time to come, I am sure they will be able to meet one another at some other time.

I am happy to hear from the State Department that there are prospects for real progress on the intercommunal negotiations on Cyprus in the near future. The United States strongly supports this progress. We all look forward to the time that Cypriots of all backgrounds will live together in peace.
