With G.M., Ford, A.M.C. and other large corporations laying off white collar workers, reducing their salaries, benefits and COHAs, eliminating paid holidays, renegotiating blue collar union contracts, etc. to reduce deficits and sweat out the interim business depressed period until Pres. Reagan's economic plan peaks; a "physician heal thyself" civil service pay and benefits reform plan should be implemented to reduce federal budget deficits. I suggest:

- A moratorium on white collar pay raises, and a realignment of blue collar pay scales to those being adjusted downward in union contracts.
- Eliminate paid holidays for all.
- Reduce annual leave from 26 days to 20, 20 to 15 and 13 to 10.
- Eliminate accrued sick leave as an add on for retirement purposes.
- Reduce by one grade GS-18 thru GS-11 positions, and WS 10 thru 6.
- Eliminate retirement COHAs.
- Eliminate Outstanding and Sustained Superior awards. These are mainly "buddy" oriented.
- Double the number of years to qualify for "in grade" step increases.
- Reduce from 2% to 1% retirement pensions for each year of service.

These suggestions would not only help reduce budget deficits, they would also reduce the need for massive reductions in force and their inherent severance pay and unemployment compensation costs.

In addition I suggest:

- A moratorium on S.S. pension COHAs, military and congressional pay raises and benefits.

- V.A. disability pensions non ~~ambidextrated~~ related for the fully employed, especially for those employed by the federal government, either directly via civil service or indirectly via government contracts and grants.

- Civil service retirement pensions be reduced dollar for dollar with S.S. pensions received.

- Dissolve the FICA S.S. minimum from the pension fund and fund it from general revenues on a base-by-case qualification of need basis determined by the states in a "block grant" process.

If private enterprise, whose taxes fund all government programs and operations is mandating its employees to bite the fiscal bullet to remain solvent and again become competitors in a depressed world economy, it is essential that government employees and others whose income is derived from private enterprise taxes, also bite the federal fiscal bullet.

Defense contractors can also bite the fiscal bullet by reducing costs for weapon systems. For example the Carter B-1 was going to cost \$110 million each, and now the Reagan B-1B will cost \$350 million each, a 218% increase in less than one year. The Carter MX was \$30 billion for 400, and now the Reagan MX is \$68 billion for 100.

I am a retired C.S. employee, gross \$18,000 per year, and I can hack a 10% pension cut to help reduce deficits, the congressional debt, etc.

Dear Mr. Deaver:

About 85% of news has been denigrating the president and his programs. I have a few ideas intended to help.

A recent UM-PB panel included a professor of economics who said that expenditures of tax money for welfare purposes are \$36,000 annually per beneficiary and implied that only 18% is reaching the needy. If true, the president should inform the people that excessive cost of administering these programs is the target, not the needy. This has been the original "trickle down" device.

Bids received by the 100% federally funded Flint Housing Commission for scattered site "low income" housing averaged almost \$100,000 per living unit for construction only. There are literally thousands of good houses for sale here at minor fractions of that cost and many federally funded houses are vacant and boarded. The president should explain that the taxpayer has been building \$100,000 "low income" houses and that the objectives can be achieved for 1/3 that cost. This would voice compassion for both the taxpayer and the needy.

Town house bids averaged \$55,000 per living unit. Interest rates alone would approximate \$1,000 and \$550 per month per unit at current T-bill rates. It would be interesting to know total cost per living unit for the entire housing program including pro-rata interest on federal debt.

Almost every American family has or had some member associated with the military establishment. The president has inherited a complex of bungling inefficiency that has generated almost as many bitter jokes as congress. I read of ammunition shortages, lack of repair parts, leaky missiles, arbitrary purchases etc. So the pentagon hires 15,000 civilian analysts, secretaries etc; the president should set somebody straight. This criticism is intended kindly; the presidents objectives are generally constructive.

As a long time (retired) municipal budget officer it was my experience that, if given loose reins, the hierarchy would resist budget cuts with every device known to the confidence profession. If required to do so, they would cut where it hurts most. Remember what grandpappy said? "If there's a skunk in the chicken coop, don't use the scatter gun."

My motive is selfish. My 1976 pension dollar is now worth 65¢. Debt-deficit-devaluation must be halted or at least sharply curtailed.

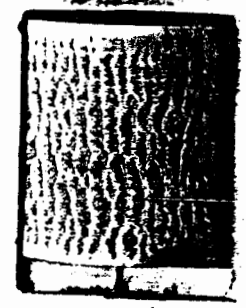


