Dear Mr. President:

This year the freshmen and transfer students of the Colorado College in Colorado Springs, Colorado were asked to read and discuss Sissella Bok's, Lying: Moral Choice in Public and Private Life. We are convinced that this book deals with a critical issue in United States life, the morality of a lie. Of the many types of lies discussed in the book, the one that concerned us the most was the lie told by government to its people. We feel that you, your staff and the Congress should analyze Sissella Bok's discussion of this lie.

Please understand from the outset that by sending you this book, we are not accusing you of lying or implying that you or any member of your administration is a liar. We simply want to provide you with an essay that critically examines the morality of deception in a democracy.

We do realize that under some extraordinary circumstances lies to the United States public may be necessary; for example, we believe that many citizens would accept a lie for national security purposes as necessary. Even though some lies may be necessary and acceptable, truthfulness in government is a critical issue today. We agree with Sissella Bok that criteria which would be used to determine if a lie were necessary in a particular situation should be established, by public debate, prior to any deception. We urge you and your staff to take the initiative to publicly establish those criteria; we urge you to hold fast to those criteria so that United States citizens can accept governmental proclamations with less suspicion.

This is your chance, Mr. President, to lessen the mistrust in the government that has grown in the last few years. Our purpose in sending you these books is to help you toward this end.
