
I asked the National Security Council staff to get me the facts on the questions you raised about the MX program. As you know, the President and Cap Weinberger are studying a variety of possible MX basing modes for the long-term, survivable MX system. Rail-based systems have been studied extensively over the last twenty years. In fact, the Minuteman missile was considered for mobile basing in specially designed railway cars over twenty years ago, but the program was rejected for a number of technical reasons.

Recently the Air Force and the Department of Defense have studied two different rail-based MX systems and have found both not able to meet the various criteria established for the MX long-term basing system.

The first system studied was rail-based MX on public railroads. This system has serious flaws in the area of public safety and interface; locational uncertainty, and therefore missile survivability. A second system was a dedicated railroad for MX, like the multiple protective shelter system, only on tracks. This design was found to be too costly and with too great an environmental impact. Locational uncertainty of the missile-carrying train and responsiveness to increased threats were also judged to be problems.

Let us know when you are headed this way.


