I hope you can understand the reasons we must adhere to that policy, and am sure that no suggestion will be made that either Mr. Deaver or the White House favors any bidder for the contract in question.

LANCASTER daughter Maureen Reagan is coming to Lancaster. She will be the featured speaker at a dinner to be held by the Lancaster Republican Assembly on Friday evening March 26 in the Antelope Valley Inn Convention

Reagan has carved her own space among the heavy weight contenders for the Republican nomination. This is made clear oftentimes to her audiences when she states, "I am not a junior I am Maureen," in obvious reference to the juniors in the race.

Her grasp of the issues both domestic and international, that Senators must face, has evolved after extensive travel both at home and abroad. For the past several years Maureen has traveled the globe speaking on behalf of Sell Overseas. America, an association of mostly small American mostly manufacturers that she helped found, promoting and creating... new markets overseas for American products. She has.... developed a keen insight, she believes, into our foreign trade dilemma and sees the ex-pansion of foreign markets for small manufacturers as a way... to balance our trade deficit.

In looking at this trade situation in terms of employment, Reagan sees each billion dollars of export trade as creating 50,000 jobs. With the U.S. trade deficit running from 30 to 40 billion dollars a year, she believes we are exporting a million jobs a year by default.

Her ability to articulate ideas refreshing breath in the conflicting smog of campaignr rhetoric. While she is personally against abortion, she believes that it is an individual. decision. Her support of ERA is another pillar of her belief in personal independence and has been active in promoting increased opportunities for women in American society. She has also been active in disabled veteran's affair fighting to keep the self help programs alive for Viet Nam veterans.

I recently received a letter from Mr. Donald V. Seibert, Chairman of the Board, J.C. Penney Company, Inc. relating to the future tax bill being debated in Congress. This letter was also sent to other major retailers in the United States. In fact, if one were to combine the volume of these retailers, it would probably be in excess of \$75 to \$85 billion.

Some time ago, due in part to the organized efforts of the American Retail Federation and the National Retail Merchants' Association, we were able to accelerate write-off's -- not for the 10 years we requested, but for 15 years. As a portion of the Economic Recovery Act, it was recognized that the Retail Sector could (and did) benefit from this tax consideration.

As the new tax bill wends its way towards approval, I hope that you will assert the firm, but thoughtful, influence that has characterized your tenure in office, to see that whatever tax policy is adopted, it will focus on an "economic recovery" that this country so desperately needs in the coming months.

We in retailing understand "restraint and realism in budgeting." We live with that realism every day, in conducting our relentless quest for business volume with <u>responsible</u> profit margins.

The United States Industrial Council supports the administration's decision to ban export of pipeline, oil drilling, and natural gas equipment to the Soviet Union, even by European licensees of United States companies.

The USIC's Declaration of Policy states that "the U.S. should ban sales of any and all strategic products, minerals, and technology to Marxist countries."

President Ronald Reagan is being condemned by some European governments and U.S. companies that seem to be indifferent to the worldwide threats of Soviet aggression and subversion in Alfghanistan, and Central America, as well as, Soviet totalitarianism in Eastern Europe.

Construction of the Urengoi Natural Gas Pipeline will give the Soviets a strategic hold on the energy supplies of ten Western European countries. The U.S. should not be a party to bailing out the Soviet economy for the sake of providing profits to a handful of U.S. corporations. Moreover, in the words of USIC President, Anthony Harrigan, "the U.S. cannot protest the Soviet's sponsored crackdown in Poland one moment, and sell strategic technology to the Soviets the next. The U.S. must not allow a tiny minority of American businesses to subsidize Soviet tyranny."

President Reagan is to be commended for his principled stand against pro-pipeline special interests who have the luxury when making their own strategic decisions of not having to consider national security, the security of NATO, and the welfare of the total U.S. economy.
