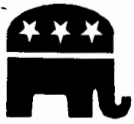



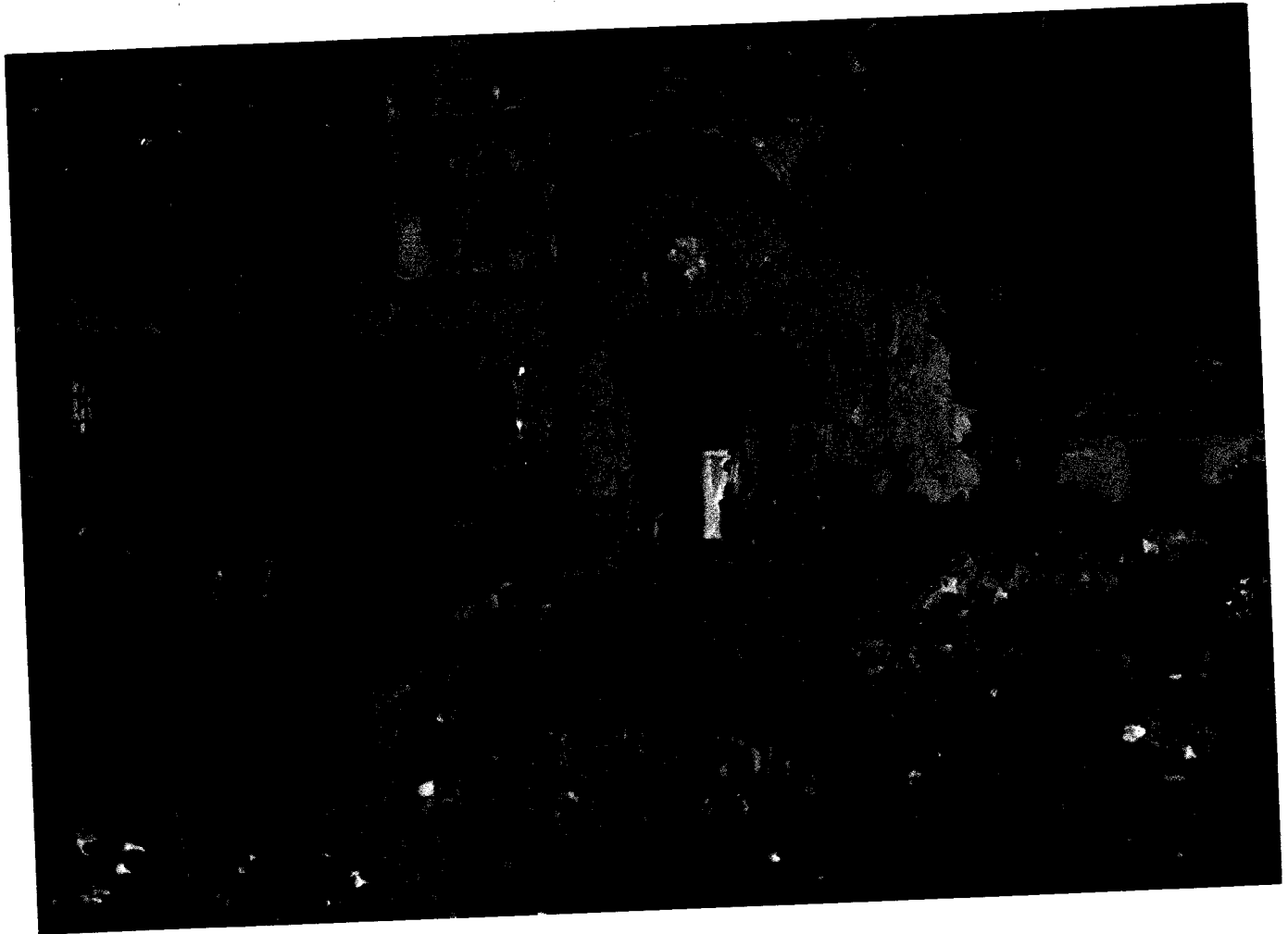

Dear Yue-Kong:

The President has asked me to reply to your letter to him of September 27 in which you mentioned your conversation with Deng Xiaoping, and once again extended an invitation to Mrs. Reagan to sponsor the launch of one of your Group's vessels in Shanghai sometime in 1983.

It is true, as Deng apparently mentioned to you, that we have held informal discussions with the Chinese about an exchange of high-level visits which might eventually include a visit to China by the President. At this point, however, none of the dates for any of these visits is firmly set, and the likelihood is that if the President should make such a trip it would not be until at least late 1983 and more possibly 1984. My understanding is that the last of your ships being built in Shanghai will be launched in the summer of 1983, so that would preclude the possibility of Mrs. Reagan being able to sponsor it.

Your invitation and thoughtfulness, however, are much appreciated here and I am sorry it does not look like it could work out.

It was good to see you once again in Brazil and I look forward to seeing you again during a future visit.

SUBJECT: Third Invitation to Mrs. Reagan from Y. K. Pao to Launch a Ship in Shanghai

Y. K. Pao's letter (Tab B) to President Reagan thanks him for being included in the September 16 dinner for President Marcos, and reports that during a trip to China immediately afterward, Pao met with Deng Xiaoping on September 24. Pao says he mentioned to Deng that he had invited Mrs. Reagan to sponsor the launch of one of his ships being built in Shanghai, and indicates that Deng mentioned that the Chinese government was extending the President an invitation to visit China officially in 1983. Pao therefore repeats his invitation to have Mrs. Reagan launch one of his vessels.

The problem here is, as you know, we have not yet even decided whether we want to recommend to the President that he visit China, and we probably won't make that decision until at least after Secretary Shultz's visit, tentatively scheduled for late January or early February. If the President should go, it would not be until after the Chinese Premier visits the US, which now looks as though it will be in the summer of 1983. This would mean that any visit by the President would be in late 1983 or more likely, 1984. It is our understanding that the last of the series of ships that Y. K. Pao is having built in Shanghai will be completed in the summer of 1983. That seems to kill the idea of Mrs. Reagan launching a ship if it were done while she accompanied the President, and we think the idea of a separate trip by her is not a viable one.

Accordingly, I have had a reply drafted which gives Pao a polite "no," explains why, and thanks him for his thoughtfulness. In my view, this letter should come from you rather than the President, as a letter from the President is more likely to leak at the other end, or encourage Pao to write directly to the President in the future.

An extended trip to China after my Washington visit has prevented me from writing sooner to thank you and Mrs. Reagan for your great kindness in including me and my daughter Doreen in your dinner on September 16 in honour of President and Mrs. Marcos. Not only was the cuisine superb, the ideal weather condition, the excellent company and the immaculately arranged programme all combined to make this a truly memorable occasion and I am very grateful for having had the privilege of participating in it.

While in China last week, I had the opportunity of meeting with the Chinese leader, Mr. Deng Xiaoping on the 24th for a private talk about the world economic situation. During the course of our conversation, I informed him of the invitation I had extended to Mrs. Reagan to sponsor the launch of one of my Group's vessels built in Shanghai sometime in 1983, and was glad to learn from Mr. Deng personally that the Chinese Government are in fact extending you an invitation to visit their country officially next year. customs duties, has not violated Canadian law, and does not owe
Canada one cent in additional duties and penalties.

Amway was doing business in Canada prior to 1964. Our dealings
with Amway of Canada, Ltd., have been based on a Dominion Customs
Appraiser's ruling issued to us in 1965. In 1980, Revenue Canada
abruptly changed that ruling, and is suing Amway for back customs
duties and penalties on goods shipped to Canada. The dispute
concerns the valuation of goods. Now, in an effort to expedite
collection of the duties and penalties, criminal prosecution has
been added to the civil suits.

In order not to risk prejudicing continued discussions with
Canadian federal officials, Amway has endured a self-imposed
moratorium on discussion of issues with the press. The abrupt
and unwarranted decision by a Canadian provincial prosecutor to
file charges now makes it necessary to make the whole story
public.

The situation has been summarized by retired U. S. Customs Commissioner Vernon D. (Mike) Acree, whom Amway hired in 1980 to review the matter. In a statement made to the Detroit News, Acree has said, "I didn't find in my review of memos, and with numerous interviews, any instance where anyone from Amway had set out to snooker the Canadian government. The Canadians seem to have come on rather heavy-handed in this situation. If it was in the United States, we would have tried to settle it, and not bring criminal charges. You don't bring criminal charges without examining the other side of the coin. No one from Canada has been to Ada to say, 'Here are the charges. What is your response?'"

Enclosed is Amway's statement, as well as some facts that you may want to read for further clarification of our position. You can be certain that Amway Corporation and its co-owners, Jay Van Andel and Rich DeVos, are innocent of any wrongdoing.
