Attached is a letter we received from Supervisor Michael Antonovich requesting a meeting with the President similar to the one he held in March of 1982.

In his letter, Mike refers to two interesting ideas. first is an innovative program to contract traditional county services to private companies. The second is a five-year comprehensive program for Los Angeles County.

These two programs have been developed in an effort to reduce costs to the city and provide greater efficiency in the delivery of services traditionally provided by the county government. This approach is consistent with themes stressed by the President.

On one of the President's trips to California, it would be advantageous to have the President meet with the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors and discuss the successes they have had in these two areas.

On a number of occasions in speaking with Michael Antonovich, Dean Dana and Pete Schabarum, they have expressed some concerns that whenever Presidential visits are scheduled in the Los Angeles area, the advance team usually contacts either the mayors office or the city council. They would like to be in the position of hosting events for the President whenever possible, to demonstrate their continued support. I am sure you are aware of the rivalry between the Los Angeles County government and the Los Angeles City government.

Pete Schabarum and the other two supervisors feel they can do a much better job providing favorable press and reinforcement of whatever statements the President makes, than can Tom Bradley and the rest of the city council.

In talking with John Beaven, Consul General for Great Britain in San Francisco and Ed Hardy up at Yosemite about Queen Elizabeth's visit, I thought perhaps the U.S./British delegation might be interested in some of the SUNSET literature on Yosemite. I want to thank you, Mike, (or whomever rode shotgum on the invitation list for the March 3 dinner) checking names put forward for the President's dinner honoring the Queen and Prince in San Francisco. Jean and I appreciate very much being included and we are looking forward to the event.

I have had more than a few personal involvements with the Royal family, both on our shores and in their own country. One early meeting goes back to the early 1950's in Vancouver, B.C.
