Dear Dr. Stroud:

Thank you for taking the time to communicate your heartfelt feelings to me on the President, the Republican Party and women's issues.

The President has asked me to involve myself more deeply in issues of particular concern to women. Indeed he has asked all his appointees to do likewise. The effect of this heightened sensitivity to women's equity issues is already being felt. You may be aware of the Justice Department's support of a legal challenge to inequitable state pensions in Arizona. A comprehensive package of additional initiatives and reforms is being prepared and should be announced shortly. The President believes that these policies, along with those already implemented, address the substantive concerns of women--and men--about fairness and equal opportunity.

However, the President seeks to lead all Americans, not just women and not just men. He does not seek political support by attempting to break the public down into building block constituencies and then bidding for the votes of each group. Since the President seeks to lead the nation by formulating policies that will help the nation as a whole, it is inevitable that each individual will disagree with particular aspects of his overall ploy for American renewal.

In your letter you identified the Republicans as "the fiscally responsible Party" and the Democrats as the Party that would put us back "on the road to fiscal irresponsibility." Without prosperity, the only equality we can have is equality of poverty and despair. With economic recovery, we can look forward to expanded opportunity for all.

I hope and believe that in 1984 the vast majority of Americans will agree that they are indeed better off than they were when the President took office. I think they will vote Republican because they don't want to go back to failed Democratic policies.

Finally, Dr. Stroud, I hope that you will be among those supporters.

Dear Mr. Deaver:

I am a lifelong member of the Party, who has voted Republican for the past forty-five years.

Since you usually hear complaints, I thought you'd want to hear what a terrific job Eric Rosenberger did in Williamsburg. We had a real emergency on Tuesday morning because the security people would not give our TODAY SHOW crew access to the Governor's Palace Garden, as had been arranged. In desperation, I awakened Eric. Instead of being justifiably annoyed at a 5:30 a.m. call, he jumped into his clothes and rushed over to help. We barely got on the air with my report, and did encounter audio problems while interviewing the Secretary of State shortly afterwards, but without Eric, nothing would have gotten on the air at all.

Since such things usually go unnoticed, I wanted to bring to your attention the job Eric did that morning, and in fact, throughout the Summit Weekend.



I'm writing to thank you for the invaluable support you gave us in Bob's birthday celebration.


