

Dear Mike:

We are planning a ceremony this fall to commemorate the 30th anniversary of the establishment of the U.S. Information Agency. As I indicated to the President by letter (attached) last May, we would be honored to have him participate in this ceremony and to see firsthand the new USIA Headquarters. I also enclose a recent letter on this subject written by my associate, Jock Shirley, to Joanna Bistany in the White House.

Suggested elements of the ceremony include remarks by the President, cutting a ceremonial ribbon symbolizing the dedication of our new building, and unveiling a USIA plaque ("Telling America's Story to the World") at the front door. The President's message could be relatively short, as was the case for the Voice of America's 40th anniversary last year, or he could use the occasion to make a full-scale foreign policy statement if he so desires.

An appearance by the President at this ceremony would be an occasion on which he could emphasize the spirit of openness and communication which he has brought to foreign policy. It would be a splendid opportunity for him to underline -- particularly for USIA's overseas audiences -- the basic democratic values which underlie our society and which form the principles of Administration foreign policy. It could be an occasion to discuss the war of ideas being waged between the United States and our implacable, totalitarian opponents in the Communist world. Finally, the President's presence would demonstrate personal support for a strong and vigorous American voice in the world and would indicate in a very dramatic way the importance which this Administration gives to public diplomacy in the conduct of U.S. foreign affairs.

We expect to invite to the ceremony Representatives and Senators involved in USIA affairs, the Advisory Commission for Public Diplomacy, foreign diplomats and representatives of the U.S. foreign affairs community, selected representatives of the arts, the Mayor of the District of Columbia, distinguished Agency alumni, Agency employees and, of course, media representatives.



While the actual anniversary date is August 1, I suggest that the ceremony be held in mid- to late September, or at any time during the fall that is convenient to the President. A morning hour, 10:00 or 10:30 a.m., would be best for media coverage.

I will appreciate your advising me of your thoughts on this proposed appearance by the President, and, if you believe his participation appropriate, the most suitable date.

Dear Mr. President:

One year and seven months ago, we began to implement your directive to consolidate the USIA from its several buildings around town. I am pleased to report that, with the relocation of my office and the offices of the senior staff to the new USIA Building, we have now achieved the objective.

Initially, our focus was a consolidation in the HHS North building along with the Voice of America. In March of 1982, Ed Meese, Jerry Carmen and I altered the plan by taking advantage of a newly completed building at 400 C Street, S.W., Washington, D.C. This building, located at the same corner as the HHS North building, enabled us to consolidate USIA without impacting on HHS. From March 1982 to late September, we sought Congressional approval of a prospectus enabling GSA to lease the building.

The lease was signed in early October 1982, and since then we have designed 330,000 square feet of interior space and we have moved approximately 1,400 of the 1,800 employees who will occupy the new USIA Building by July. This consolidation will enhance our management efficiency and, more importantly, the consolidation will enhance our support for your foreign policy and national security objectives.

Your interest in this Agency is well recognized by all of us at USIA. We would appreciate the honor of your visiting our new building, perhaps at our forthcoming 30th anniversary this summer. At that time you will see firsthand the results of our efforts.

Dear Joanna:

USIA Director Wick asked the President in May if he would honor USIA with a visit to our new Headquarters at 400 C Street S.W., perhaps on the occasion of USIA's 30th anniversary later this season.

We have heard informally through Leonard Posa of the LSC that the President is indeed interested in paying us a visit. I am writing you to ask if, first of all, you might be able to confirm his interest in an official way, and secondly, if we can arrange a tentative date.

We can schedule a 30th anniversary celebration on any day and time that is convenient to the President. Our preferred date is Monday, August 1, the actual anniversary date and a day when Congress is still in session. We suggest a morning hour -- say 10:00 or 10:30 a.m. -- for best press coverage.

If this is not suitable, we would suggest a day in mid- to late September, or in fact at any convenient time in the fall.

Dear Mike:

As the enclosed letter shows, I have written to the President's nuclear freeze meeting with a group of 12 European Parliamentarians who will be visiting Washington, D.C. September 12-14.

I believe the meeting should be given serious consideration for the following reasons:

1. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee is scheduled to hold hearings on the Hatfield-Kennedy nuclear freeze resolution September 21. The Parliamentarians will be able to counteract much of the pro-freeze propoganda that will be floating around with their support of the deployment of Euromissiles. Their impact will be considerably enhanced if they meet with the President.
2. The chairman and the co-chairman of the delegation will be speaking at a National Press Club luncheon on Wednesday, September 14. What they say will carry far more weight if they have seen the President.
3. They will be meeting with the editorial board of the Wall Street Journal on Friday, September 16. I am working on sessions with the Washington Post and the New York Times. It would help if I could say they are scheduled to see the President.
4. Finally, the Parliamentarians will be debating leaders of the nuclear freeze movement at Georgetown University on Tuesday evening, September 13. I have every confidence in their knowledge of the issue and their ability to articulate the reasons for the deployment of the Pershing II and cruise missiles. Leigh, the British M.P., led the fight in Great Britain against CND. And Petersen, the West German, who speaks excellent English, has been a long-time member of the Armed Services Committee in the Bundestag.



Dear Mr. President:

As you know from the letter of Baron Frary von Blomberg, dated May 12, 1983, a group of distinguished European Parliamentarians was scheduled to visit the United States in June. These Parliamentarians, all of whom have extensive experience in defense and security affairs, will explain their countries' support of a strong Western defense, including the deployment of Pershing II and cruise missiles in Western Europe by the end of this year.

You were gracious enough to consider meeting with them, thereby, in the words of Baron Blomberg, "sending a clear signal to all the capitals of the world that the nations of the Atlantic community are united in their commitment to peace through strength."

Because of the British and Italian elections, the trip was rescheduled for September 12-16. It would be a very great honor indeed, for them if you could meet with them during their three days in Washington, September 12-14.

It is the conviction of these dedicated Parliamentarians that their visit can make a significant contribution to the public debate about a vital issue that can determine the very future of the Western alliance.



Dear President Reagan:

Western States Meat Association, representing meat packers and processors in the thirteen western states, extends to you a warm and cordial invitation to address its principal General Session at the Association's 38th Annual Convention and Suppliers Exposition on Saturday, February 18, 1984 in the Grand Ballroom of the San Francisco Hilton Hotel.
