MEMORANDUM TO MICHAEL K. DEAVER MAWB FROM MICHAEL EVANS

SUBJECT: THE PORTRAIT PROJECT.

As I mentioned to you the other day, the Portrait Project is moving along more or less on schedule.

To date, I have completed 435 portraits. There are about another 265 that are on my list of subjects of which about 115 are on the "A" list. I suspect that I will probably get about another 120 or so before I run out of time for a grand total of around 550 portraits.

As you know, the Corcoran has scheduled a major exhibition of the portraits which will open on Monday, January 14, 1985. Dr. Alan Fern, Director of The National Portrait Gallery, and Jane Livingston, Curator of Photography of the Corcoran Museum are curating the show.

The exhibition's design is to hang 80-100 large (20"x24") prints in the second floor atrium balcony area. These large prints will be chosen by the exhibition curators on the basis of their photographic worth. In the adjoining center gallery, we plan to hang very large prints of the President, the Speaker and the Chief Justice surrounded by arrays of small prints of all the remaining (450 or so) portraits. Tentatively, I would like to hang portraits of Mrs. Reagan and Mrs. Bush on the walls of the gallery facing the three portraits described above.

Complete sets of the portraits have been accepted by the Archives of the United States (for the Ronald Reagan Library), the National Portrait Gallery, and I have had an informal acceptance by the Library of Congress. The negatives, of course, will also end up in the Ronald Reagan Library.

Abrams Books of New York City, the pre-eminent American photographic book publishers, are doing a book of the portraits, both in hard- and soft-cover, scheduled to come out on January 14, 1985 also. George Will has agreed to do a foreword that would establish the political context of the portraits and Fern and Livingston are doing the same for the photographic context. The deadline for photos is July 15, 1984.

Negotiations are under way with four or five other museums accross the country to travel the show.

I never dreamed that I would be as successful in getting as many people as I have. I can't tell you how fortunate I have been to operate in an atmosphere that allows me the artistic freedom to document the 'Reagan Era' in new and historically valuable ways. It has been good for the historical record and a treasured experience and honor for me as well. Both Livingston and Fern think that the show will be a "landmark" in modern American photography. Your encouragement and support are in large part responsible for my success. I am most deeply grateful.

However, I do have some problems that I am trying to correct on a priority basis.

- 1) I did do the President's portrait last year for the Portrait Project, but for a number of mostly technical reasons, the session did not work as well as I would have liked. I would like your permission to schedule the President for 15 minutes in the Roosevelt Room, or to set up in the East Room. Of the two, the East Room makes a better studio. Can you suggest a date before July 15?
- 2) While I have had some indirect and informal contact with Mrs. Reagan about her portrait, she has been unable to find the time to do it. Obviously I would not hang a picture of her unless she was happy with it. Could you help me to schedule her also before July 15?
