A brief note to update you on some significant activity during the month of June relevant to our National Coalition Development Project, and its emphasis on promoting voter registration activities.

Under the direction of Executive Vice President Andre LeTendre, we have just completed Phase IV of the project by conducting seminars in the key nine states in which the project has been underway the past twelve months.

Over five hundred (500) individuals attended the seminars representing two hundred ninety one (291) organizations that account for a membership of over two million eight hundred ninety five thousand (2,895,000) individual members. Extensive research has been done relevant to these organizations -- their purpose, membership, operational details, etc. Each has now been educated on the most effective method of voter registration, voter turnout, and other legal avenues open to their membership for significant political involvement this year and beyond.

Enclosed is an example of the book and agenda for one of the meetings. We believe the potential impact of this effort is significant and appreciate your continued support and assistance. I would welcome your comments and suggestions.

Dear Mike,

Your friendly and efficient staff informs me you'll be spending a day or two in Washington prior to going to Dallas. They suggested I put my subject matter in writing so you'll have a frame of reference before we talk. This makes good sense.

An electronic manufacturer here in San Diego County has developed an incredibly exciting device for educating and counseling young people (and their parents) concerning the use of drugs and other harmful and illegal substances.

Greatly oversimplified, the program and hardware works like this:

1. At a student body assembly, students, faculty and parents are briefed and are given a list of drug and substance questions which may interest them. They are given a special telephone number (the line is never busy). They may call from the privacy of their own home. Codes are given for a great variety of messages. (See partial list).
2. With complete anonymity, a well-informed (recorded) voice gives the caller the facts. No recriminations, no embarrassment, no hassle, just the facts.

It seems a lot of young (and sometimes older) people who are intimidated by asking a live person a question are very comfortable listening to a machine.

No tax dollars are needed from any level of government. The electronic and miraculous answering machines are donated by corporate givers who get public service credit by a simple "this information service is made available to our school district through a grant from the XYZ Corporation" — Business firms "adopt-a-school."



## MOUNTAIN GROWN WINNERS

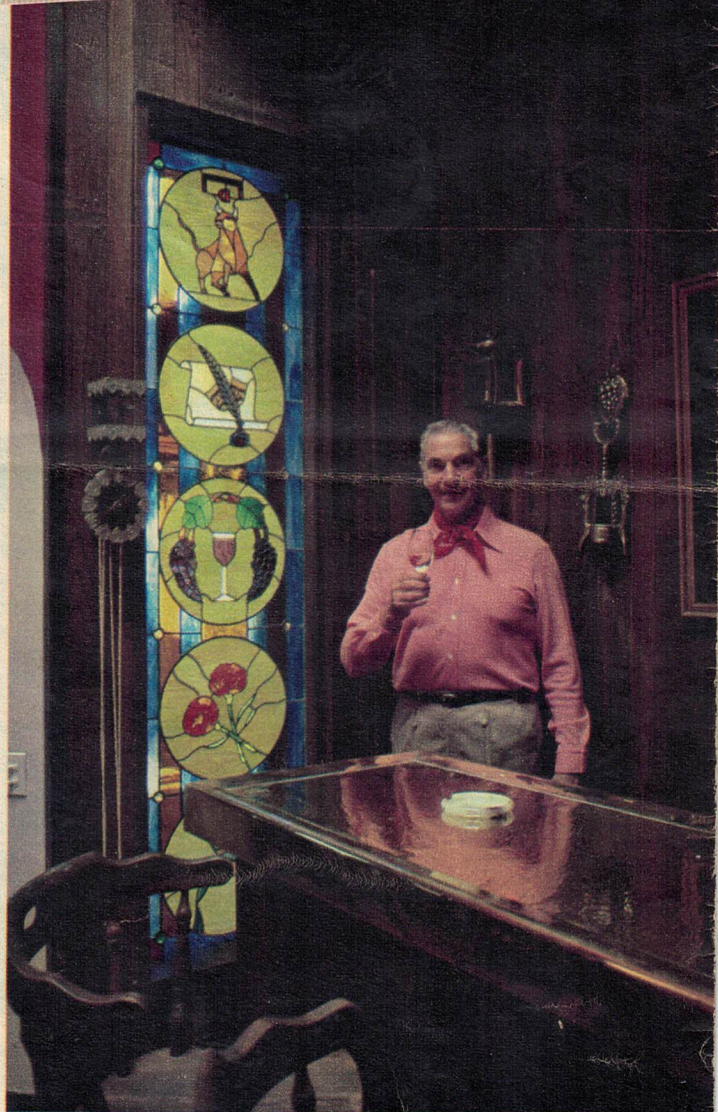
Members of the family that started the Carnation Company and the Alaska salmon industry are now producing award-winning wines on a ranch in the California mountains.
