
Stock car driver Richard Petty said Monday he will leave Petty Enterprises to join a new racing operation in 1984.

Dear Mrs. Reagan:

As you know, I will be leaving the White House in the middle of December to return to the private sector. This has been by far the most difficult decision of my professional career. It has been an uncommon thrill and honor to be part of the Reagan team. But it is time to renew the family life I have foregone and repair the financial security that has been sacrificed.

Serving the President the last three years has been the best experience of my life. I've given everything I have to make sure the fundamental change in direction he promised during the 1980 campaign would be enacted. Working in harmony with a sometimes difficult and independent Congress, the President has led the way to rebuilding our economy and our national security. I am very proud to have been a part of that effort.

Beginning with the transition period after his election, the President has built a sound, strong and superb working relationship with the Congress. More than anyone else, you recognize the many sacrifices that entailed — all the meetings, ceremonies and other events; the countless phone calls from the residence, Air Force One, Camp David and the ranch; the breakfasts, lunches and dinners with various Members and Senators; the numerous intrusions on your time together. I assure you they were necessary or I would not have asked. I hope you will agree that this major commitment of the President's time has paid great dividends. The significant pieces of legislation that have been enacted and the results that have been achieved for our country are overpowering evidence of the strength of his leadership and his willingness to roll up his sleeves to get the job done.

Along with Jim Baker, Mike Deaver and so many others, I, too, have rolled up my sleeves to produce the results with the Congress that the President wanted. I've done it each day proudly and with great loyalty. Not only am I dedicated to Ronald Reagan and his vision of America, I am very grateful for the confidence he has placed in me.

But the time has come for me to leave, to recharge my batteries, to have a family life, to earn some financial security. My wife, Sydney, and I have been married for less than two years. As I know you can appreciate, Sydney has been most supportive of my loyalty to the President and the heavy commitments on my schedule but we would like to have some time to take a honeymoon, fix up our home, have dinner together at a reasonable hour, have a quiet weekend away. The neighbors tease that I'm the phantom of the community. My eight-year-old daughter, Jennifer, from my previous marriage, deserves my undivided attention when we're together on weekends. She has become too accustomed to reading or playing in my office on Saturdays and Sundays or watching me on the telephone.

On the professional side, Bill Timmons, some time ago, offered me a full partnership as a principal in his lobbying firm. I delayed accepting, feeling it inappropriate to ask to leave the President until the legislative agenda for this session of the Congress was completed. Now that Congress has adjourned and so many of his legislative initiatives have been concluded successfully, the professional challenge of representing some of the top corporations of America and helping manage the premier government relations firm in Washington is irresistible. The opportunity to rebuild my more than depleted finances and develop some financial security certainly contributes to my decision. Having the flexibility to assist the President from the outside is a special and necessary requirement which Bill wholeheartedly supports.

I am hopeful the President will seek re-election and am confident he will be re-elected with a renewed mandate, continued Republican control of the Senate and increased support in the House. I am committed to working vigorously in that effort.

I want you to know how much the President and you mean to me. I am grateful for the confidence placed in me and for the honor of serving as a member of the Reagan team. I hope both of you will call on me for other assignments.

### Minutes of Board of Trustees Meeting

September 15, 1983

#### PRESENT:

Present for this meeting at the offices of Rogers & Wells, New York City, were the following Board members: Robert J. Hausman, Chairman; George J. Hauptfuhrer, Jr.; Hon. John F. Lehman, Jr.; Hon. William P. Rogers; Dennis Stanfill; and Mrs. Lynn Wyatt. Also present were: Frederic E. Mygatt, III, Treasurer; Norman E. Donoghue, II, Secretary; Mrs. Phyllis Wagner (representing Mary Wells Lawrence and Wells, Rich, Greene, Inc.); and Hon. Frank Cresci, Consul of Monaco; and, for a portion of the meeting, Ms. Carolyn Peachey (of Campbell, Peachey & Associates, the Washington, D.C., event planning consultants for the Gala); and Mrs. Frances Provencher-Ryder (of Spiro & Associates, the Philadelphia public relations firm).

 $\,$  Mr. Hausman, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 4:00 P.M.

#### INTRODUCTORY REMARKS:

After thanking Mr. Rogers for graciously consenting to the use of his offices for the meeting, Mr. Hausman began with a "state of the Foundation" report, as follows:

"As we all previously agreed, our present priorities are to attempt to fund and introduce the Foundation, in order to render it operative; also, we must continue our efforts to refine our purposes. In the areas of funding and introductory activities, we are starting to see some very positive results."

Mr. Hausman and Mrs. Wyatt reported the great enthusiasm, dedicated interest and numerous activities of the Royal Family relating to the Foundation activities. Many examples were cited. Also, the financial support of the Foundation from the Family has grown substantially, for which all the Trustees are grateful. The Royal Family is looking

forward with great pleasure and enthusiasm to their stay at the White Houise as the guests of President and Mrs. Reagan during the Gala weekend, and to attendance at all Gala events.

As to funding for the Gala, Piaget Watch Corporation has agreed in writing to a sponsorship for \$100,000 in cash, plus other benefits to the Foundation, which amount to nearly another \$100,000. The Foundation is very close to an agreement with Genny, an Italian couturier headquartered in Venice, for a \$150,000 corporate sponsorship. Thirty \$5,000 tickets to the Inaugural Gala have been spoken for to date and in general, the Gala planning is off to a successful start. In addition, Springs Industries has agreed to an advance of funds in support of the Gala (for details of which, see page 4).

Also, Mr. Hausman reported on a proposal made to him by Mr. Michael Reagan, the President's son, for a fund-raising speedboat race in 1985 to break the London-to-Monaco record. (Details of the proposal are in the attached materials.) Mr. Hausman said this proposal could be exciting and is being explored.

As to the future and the refinement of the Foundation's purpose, F. Warren Hellman has agreed to chair the Foundation's Long-Range Planning Committee, focusing on refining the mission statement and planning the implementation of program development.

### ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF:

Mr. Hausman reported that Mrs. Benoliel has resigned her position on the Foundation's staff. Mr. Hausman proposed an expression of thanks from the Board to Mrs. Benoliel for her generous volunteer assistance and devoted attention to the Foundation's affairs in its developmental stage. The Board fully concurred.

Mr. Hausman noted that, through the generous assistance of the Hon. Frank Cresci, the Foundation has since June had quarters in the offices of the Consul of Monaco and Monaco Tourist Board. He also reported that he and Mr. Cresci had interviewed some prospective professional

administrators for the Foundation and expected soon to hire someone as an employee at \$3,000 per month on a trial basis. The Board agreed that Mr. Hausman should do so and gave him authority to hire anyone he personally felt was capable of handling the job.

### APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

The Minutes of the meeting of the Foundation's Executive Committee on June 23, 1983 were approved in the form previously circulated to the Board.

### TREASURER'S REPORT:

Mr. Mygatt handed out a report (attached hereto) of the Foundation's finances and reported as follows:

- 3. All Gala receipts and expenditures are being managed in a separate account.
- 4. The audit of the Foundation's finances for its first fiscal year (ending February 28, 1983) had been prepared by Coopers & Lybrand and sent to the Trustees.

Mr. Hausman reported that he had asked the Vice President-Finance of Loews Hotels, Richard F. Johnson, to

assist in handling the Foundation's checkbook, reporting to Mr. Mygatt. Mr. Donoghue asked that the attached banking resolution be adopted to reflect the appointment of Mr. Johnson as Assistant Treasurer of the Foundation and his authority to sign Foundation checks. The motion to approve the banking resolution, as stated in the attached bank form, and the appointment of Richard F. Johnson as the Foundation's Assistant Treasurer, was moved, seconded and unanimously approved.

Also, after motion made and seconded, the attached agreement made by Mr. Hausman on the Foundation's behalf with North American Watch Corporation (Piaget) was ratified.

### GIFT OF COLLAGE TO FOUNDATION:

Mr. Hausman reported that H.S.H. Prince Rainier, III and his children were about to transfer as a gift to the Foundation a collage which had been created by H.S.H. Princess Grace. It was also reported that Springs Industries has expressed interest in using the collage to create a second line of high-quality bedlinens. It is anticipated that an agreement will be concluded in the near future transferring the collage to Springs Industries in return for the payment of royalties to the Foundation, of which Mr. Hauptfuhrer has arranged for at least \$100,000 to be paid to the Foundation up front as a non-refundable advance.

INAUGURAL GALA, FEBRUARY 17, 18 and 19, 1984:

Ms. Peachey and Mrs. Ryder were asked to join the meeting at this point.

Mrs. Wyatt reported on preparations for the Gala. She said she expected that 5,000 invitations would be mailed out in the first two weeks of November. She urged any Trustees who have not already done so to send to the Foundation office (for forwarding to Carolyn Peachey) their list of persons to whom they wish invitations to be sent.

The site of the Gala, 1400 Constitution Avenue, has a capacity of 600 persons and tables of 10 will be used. The weekend events were again reviewed:

Friday, February 17th Evening

Reception at White House (\$5,000 ticketholders only)

Saturday, February 18th

Luncheon at the L'Enfant Plaza Hotel; Fashion show by Genny (\$5,000 and \$1,500 ticketholders)

Evening

Dinner-Dance at 1400 Constitution Avenue; entertainment by Julio Iglesias (all ticketholders including \$500 tickets)

Sunday, February 19th Noon

Brunch at State Department (8th Floor) (\$5,000 and \$1,500 ticketholders)

Mrs. Wyatt requested that the sample letter-invitations previously sent to the Trustees by the Foundation office not be used. They should be shredded and discarded, since they were sent in error. In lieu of the letters, invitations will be sent offering all three ranges of ticket prices. The Trustees will be asked to use small personal notes to accompany those invitations which are to be sent to their personal friends.

Mrs. Wyatt reported that she has set up a European committee of several people who would be attending.

Mr. Hausman reiterated that Mrs. Wyatt requested that the Foundation would make no other solicitation for funds until after the Gala.

Ms. Carolyn Peachey reported on her firm's efforts in Washington. She said that although many charity and other such gala events are held in Washington, this event had a unique character and distinction in her experience. She reported that for the invitation list she will use her firm's list of names; also, she has already received lists from Mr. and Mrs. John B. Kelly, Jr. and several consuls, as well as Board members.

Mrs. Ryder (whose resume is attached) reported that Spiro & Associates had been handling all public relations for the Foundation and hoped to do the same for the Gala, in cooperation with Carolyn Peachey. She said that, judging by the press clippings she receives, the Foundation and the Gala are attracting considerable attention. She asked that all Trustees refer media inquiries to her at the following address:

so that the Foundation's responses would be consistent and appropriately coordinated. Mrs. Ryder said she hoped soon to be able to have a media release every two weeks to build excitement for the Gala in the media.

In this connection, Mr. Rogers raised the question of the Foundation's charitable mission and it was agreed that the invitations would include a brief statement of the mission. Statements to the press will emphasize the organizational stage of the Foundation and that a Long-Range Planning Committee is actively studying the options open to the Foundation for implementing its objectives.

Mrs. Wyatt and Ms. Peachey reported that while correspondence had been exchanged with Julio Iglesias, no contract had yet been signed. It was urged that this aspect of the arrangements be tied down as promptly as possible and Ms. Peachey agreed to pursue this.

In an open discussion Messrs. Rogers, Stanfill and Lehman and Mrs. Wagner made several helpful suggestions for handling the media, the invitations, the table arrangements and other such details.

### ENLARGEMENT OF THE BOARD:

Mr. Hausman solicited the Trustees' suggestions for possible enlargement of the Board.

Mr. Stanfill urged that the Board continue to use an Executive Committee as the best means for effective Board management, and all agreed that this is a wise course to follow.

### DUBNOFF GALA:

Mr. Hausman reported that this issue was fully under control. The Foundation will receive 35% of the Gala's proceeds as a result of H.S.H. Princess Caroline's attendance "on behalf of the Princess Grace Foundation". The amount is expected to be about \$55,000.

### U.S.S. CONSTITUTION:

Mr. Hausman reported that H.S.H. Prince Rainier had referred to him a request from Mrs. Tung. Mrs. Tung has arranged a Princess Grace Reading Room on the U.S.S. "Constitution" and would like to have some Foundation representation in the Reading Room. Mr. Hausman has arranged for Spiro & Associates to prepare a small presentation, along with solicitation cards which will be placed in the Reading Room.

## PRINCESS GRACE GARDEN - PHILADELPHIA:

Mr. Hausman reported that shortly a blue-ribbon committee in Philadelphia will be asked to select an appropriate way to commemorate Princess Grace in Philadelphia and a suitable site. Mr. Hausman said he expected Mayor Green to be involved with this, even though his mayoral term ends in January, 1984.

### MEETING OF CONSULS OF MONACO:

Mr. Hausman reported on the success of the meeting with nine consuls of Monaco in Dallas in July (the written report of which was previously circulated). Several of the consuls have supplied lists of names for invitations to the Gala. A very gracious letter from H.S.H. Prince Rainier was read to the consuls (copy attached).

## COMING VISIT BY H.S.H. PRINCE ALBERT:

Mr. Hausman reported that H.S.H. Prince Albert would be coming to the U.S. on about October 26th to attend a family wedding in Philadelphia. Prince Albert had indicated to Mr. Hausman that he would be pleased if he could meet with the Trustees or otherwise be supportive of the Foundation's activities during his visit. Mr. Hausman asked Mrs. Ryder, the Foundation's public relations advisor, to confer with him about this matter.

### NEXT MEETING:

It was decided that the next meeting would be an Executive Committee meeting -- but open, as always, to all Trustees who could attend -- in late October or early November to coincide with H.S.H. Prince Albert's visit. The meeting will be held in New York at the Regency Hotel.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, the meeting was adjourned at 6:00 P.M.

I met with Michael Reagan on Thursday, September 8, at the Regency. He stayed at the hotel as our guest. He has been succussful in a program that involves the following:

He races his boat in various areas.

He raises substantial funds, mainly from corporate sponsors, who pay "per mile" the boat travels.

He deducts his costs and gives this money to a worthy cause.

As can be seen by the correspondence, he has raised considerable funds for the U.S. Olympic Committee, the cleaning of the Statue of Liberty, and other causes.

The program works since the recipient is pleased, the donor is pleased, and the event receives wide visibility.

His proposal to the Foundation is as follows:

He intends to attempt to break the Guiness Book of Records' time from London to Monaco. He mentioned that this was established years ago and therefore would be very easy to beat.

He feels he can raise \$1 million to \$1½ million gross. The Foundation should receive around \$1 million.

The funds all go to the Foundation and we pay his costs. I informed Michael that we would not put the Foundation to any risk, i.e., before any funds went to him, the donations would have to be in the Foundation bank account.

He thinks there is a good chance he will get Prince Andrew or a member of the Duke of Kent's family in London to participate.

I would help him obtain a hotel for a gala event in London before the race.

He would proceed to Monaco where the Foundation would arrange for a major gala, including the Royal Family. This would be our big event in 1985. The timing would be around June 17. This would have to be cleared with the Palace.

If the above moves forward, Michael will come to our Gala on February 18 and, if we wish, he will announce the event at that time.

He will leave ample time to allow for weather problems enroute.

The above is preliminary and for your information.




