Attached at Tab A is State Department's recommended guest list for the State Dinner in honor of Sultan Qaboos of Oman on Tuesday, April 12.

This list includes many who have already been here (Ripley, Helms, Wriston, McPherson) and far too many retired ambassadors, DCMs, and academics. I sense State has added names at the desk level to fill a "quota".

There are occasions to use State Dinners for assisting bilateral relations between the United States and the country in question -- however, Oman is solidly in the United States camp. We do not need to woo Oman beyond what we are already doing. Hence, we should use slots at this dinner to help the President in the broader political arena relating to the Middle East.

This might be an occasion to reward some of the distinguished citizens who have helped the President with his peace initiative and have been generally supportive of overall US policies in the Middle East, e.g., Edgar Bronfman, who has taken a courageous stand on the September 1 initiative; Al Spiegel, who has not been invited to a State Dinner as yet, to the best of my knowledge; Ted Koppel, ABC anchorman, who has been supportive of our Mid-East policy; John Wallach, Hearst Newspapers, who has been very supportive of the September 1 initiative and the President's Mid-East policy; and adding Dr. J. R. Spencer of Templeton, California, to the guest list.


We have had the pleasure of working with Governor Nigh of Oklahoma in conjunction with the Will Rogers Heritage Trust for whom we created a fine bronze of Will Rogers after the Jo Davidson sculpture one of which is in The Capitol Building in Washington, D.C. and the other in Claremore, Oklahoma, Will Rogers' birthplace. Governor Nigh made a gift of these bronzes to each Governor of the United States at the Governor's Meeting held in Oklahoma, August 9th, and will be giving one to The White House for President Reagan.

Mr. James C. Leake, Chairman of the Will Rogers Commission, has instructed us that if President Reagan were to desire to have this historic Western sculpture to be used as a gift in the future, we are to make them available at cost. Will Rogers needs no introduction; President Reagan has quoted him on occasion. The sculpture bears Will Rogers' famous words, "I never met a man I didn't like", and stands 13.5-inches high. It is a "lost wax" bronze mounted on a walnut base, and is nicely packaged. An inscribed plaque can be readily applied to the base. A Presidential silver plated version could be supplied at small additional expense.

The sale of this sculpture creates a royalty income for the Will Rogers Heritage Trust, and is very much in keeping with the self help programs being advocated for institutions of this kind.

We have created special gifts for President and Mrs. Reagan: the Christmas tree ornament, as well as a silver letter opener to honor the Senate Wives, and other items. We have been asked to create a unique American historic bronze for Presidential use, and we feel that this Will Rogers sculpture deserves your consideration.

Governors to leave loaded with gifts

SHANGRI-LA (AP) — Fishing rods, statues of Will Rogers and crocks of strawberry jam are among the gifts that will be taken home by the nation's governors today when they leave the National Governors' Association's annual meeting.

Their wives and children won't be heading away empty-handed, either.

Gov. George Nigh, host for the meeting at the private Shangri-La resort near Afton in northeastern Oklahoma, estimated the state has spent about \$100,000 on having the convention in Oklahoma.

"But the benefits are incalculable," he said. "We are getting exposure that is invaluable, exposure that we couldn't possibly afford to buy."

"Not only the governors, but the national media have a chance to see Oklahoma and to know what we have to offer."

IN ADDITION TO the outlay by the state itself, more funds were provided by chambers of commerce and various trade organizations.

The most expensive keepsake the visiting governors got was a foot-tall bronze statue of Oklahoma's favorite son, Will Rogers. It was copied from the full-size statue in Statuary Hall in the U.S. Capitol.

The statues are the state's official gift to the governors and cost the taxpayers \$4,000, said John Reid, Nigh's press secretary.

"The NGA has a policy that the

official gift can't cost more than \$50 unless it is a work of art," Reid said. "We settled on the bronze because Will Rogers is the most widely known Oklahoman ever. He was a cowboy, was part Indian, was a humorist and everybody liked him."

The gift-giving didn't stop there, though. For Sunday night's Western barbecue each governor received a Western shirt and each first lady got a prairie skirt.

Also, first ladies were given a tote bag that carried an outline of her state along with the state flower.

Each governor also got a Zebco fishing rod and reel.

WHEN the governors checked in, they found a Frankoma Pottery crock full of Stilwell strawberry preserves in their rooms.

Also, there were supplies of Oklahoma peanuts donated by the Oklahoma Peanut Commission and pecans given by the Oklahoma Pecan Commission.

Two of the more unusual presents each governor and his wife received were a hand-woven Cherokee basket and a small rose rock sculpture of a mailbox.

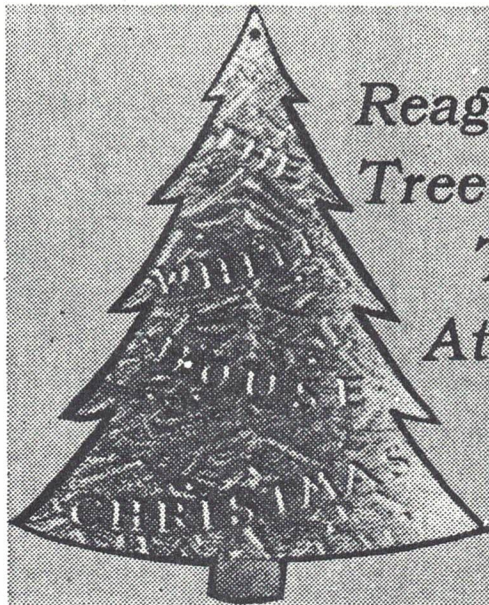

Reagans Giving Tree Ornament To Visitors At Christmas

Thousands of families invited to see the White House decorated for the Christmas season will come away with a glittering memento of their visit: a four-inch, tree-shaped, brass ornament.

An initial shipment of 5,000 of the ornaments was delivered to the White House last Tuesday by a New York concern. They will be wrapped and presented by Ronald and Nancy Reagan to the families of Senators, Representatives, White House staff members, military aides and news reporters.

The modestly priced ornaments were paid for by the Republican National Committee, according to Sheila Tate, Mrs. Reagan's press secretary. There is said to be some sensitivity about costs since the Reagans were criticized a few months ago for a \$209,508 purchase of china for state dinners.

"The intention is to give families a Christmas remembrance of their visit to the White House," Mrs. Tate said, "and we hope they will hang them on their trees for years to come."

'White House Christmas'

The ornaments are etched to reflect light and inscribed with the year and the words, "The White House Christmas." Mrs. Tate said it was a "good possibility" that the Reagans would establish a holiday tradition by giving a Christmas keepsake to holiday visitors each year that they are living in the White House.

The ornament was designed by the concern of Christine Roussel at

22 West 55th Street in Manhattan, specialists in restorations and reproductions of fine art works. Mrs. Roussel was for many years director of the reproduction studio at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. She developed and reproduced the pieces from the Cairo Museum's vast King Tutankhamun collection that grossed \$27 million for American museums and the Egyptian Government.

Mrs. Roussel's 21-year-old daughter, Dianne, drew the original design approved by White House officials and the ornaments were then mass-produced using a photographic-chemical engraving process.

First 5,000 Delivered

Producing thousands of the keepsakes in two weeks, finishing each by hand, involved 11-hour workdays for her family and "friendly gnomes," Mrs. Roussel said. Last Tuesday, she hand-delivered to the White House, in a 30-pound package, the first 5,000 ornaments.

White House aides had emphasized that they wanted an appropriate but inexpensive gift and that "they expected value," Mrs. Roussel said, declining to reveal the cost of the undertaking except to say that the price for each piece was "small money."

"Because they are not costly, the beauty is many more can be given away," said John D. Pollis, Mrs. Roussel's partner. "Such pieces become instantaneous collectors' items."



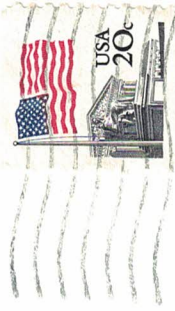
