

John Stinson Howell, son of Mrs. Arvella Howell, Route 1, Rochester, has been awarded the Joseph Boyer scholarship in the University of Michigan College of Engineering for the school year 1947-48, it has been announced by Dean Ivan C. Crawford. This particular scholarship was established in 1938 by Mrs. Henry E. Chandler of Grosse Pointe.

Awarding of the honor to John recalls to his friends the tense days of March, 1945 when he was reported missing in action as of February 1 that year while piloting a flying fortress in the Mediterranean area, when he failed to return from combat mission to Moosbierbaum, Austria. However, on March 20 he wrote his wife and mother that he was safe in the hands of the Russians and collecting all sorts of souvenirs along the way. He hrd bailed out over Russian territory when the gas supply in the ship gave out.

John S. Howell Turns Up Alive On Russian Tour

Two Rochester boys, missing over Austria since Feb. 1, have shown up alive. They are Lieut. John S. Howell and Rhio Metzler, both to receive the Distinguished Flying Cross. The following letter from Howell to his mother and sister explains:

March 20, 1945 Dear Mother and Edith:

I'll bet you can't guess where I've been the last couple of weeks. Give up! I've been touring Europe "first class," according to Russian style, and can speak four more languages fluently. I can sayessen (German), yo (Hungarian), davoo hka (Russian), and shapta (Rumanian), meaning eat, good, girl and seven respectively. I've been shot at by Russians, divebombed by Germans, fed by Hunbombed by Germans, fed by Hungarians and have been made love to by Rumanian airls (don't tell hay wife??), and have seen a Bulgarian stage play, all in the short period of seven weeks. Outside of that I've done nothing but get the D.F.C. (Distinguished Flying Cross). Oh yes, I spent \$250 doing it, too. Not bad, though, for I have a few souvenirs. I have a beautiful 35-mm. Kodak (Retinal beautiful 35-mm. Kodak (Retina II) with a high-speed lens and a 2.8 focal length. Got it in Bucharest, Rumania, plus a very nice radio for \$25. Have a German Lugar that I traded for and a small Styr. 25-cal. cute little German gun. The only thing that I'm really mad about is that I lost my nice 20 mission hat when I bailed

out. Rhio Metzler, my engineer, who used to live at Rochester, is getting the D.F.C. Or might get the Silver Star for going out in the bomb bays with the doors open, without a parachute on—the gas lines had been shot out—and he held the lines together over the target. 
