

JAMAICA VACATION PACKAGES AVAILABLE FOR APRIL ARTS FESTIVAL

NEW YORK, N.Y. (December 6, 1984) -- The Caribbean island of Jamaica will host the World Youth Festival of Arts, an international celebration of music, dance, film and fine arts, in the capital city of Kingston from April 1-9, 1985.

Some of the world's biggest names in fine and performing arts are expected to participate in such Festival events as the International Pop Music Festival, an International Film Festival, a Gospel Music Festival and the Island's own Jamaican National Festival of Arts. Other activities will include lunch hour concerts, theatre performances and fine art exhibitions, as well as classical music and dance recitals, and an International Book Exhibition. In all, more than 100 activities are planned.

Festival visitors also will be invited to tour some of Jamaica's most popular natural and historical attractions and shop at the Festival's Grand Market, which will include international crafts, cuisine and horticultural products. An International Youth Fun Day, featuring entertainment, water sports and a costume parade, has been scheduled for Easter Monday. Opening and closing galas will mark the beginning and end of the festivities.

A variety of special Festival travel packages — including round-trip air fare, accommodations and tickets to Festival events — are available at prices ranging from \$415 for five days and four nights to \$889 for eight days and seven nights (per person, double occupancy based on New York departure via Air Jamaica, the official carrier of the Festival). Vacationers may choose from a number of event ticket packages and specialized itineraries, many of which include stays in both Kingston and the Island's popular resort areas of Ocho Rios and Port Antonio. Accommodations available during the Festival include the moderately-priced Turtle Beach Apartment Hotel in Ocho Rios and Kingston's classic Pegasus Hotel as well as Port Antonio's luxurious Marbella Club at Dragon Bay.



The Festival will highlight the creativity of youth as well as showcase artists who have demonstrated an ongoing understanding of the concerns of youth throughout the world. The Festival will provide a unique forum for artists and an opportunity for visitors to enjoy a wide variety of cultural offerings.

The Festival will run concurrently with the International Youth Conference, hosted by Jamaica and designed to provide an open forum for the discussion and debate of democratic principles.

FESTIVAL CENTRES:

The Festival is designed with two centres of activity: Devon House and the Cultural Training Centre/Little Theatre on Hope Road/Public Library on Arthur Wint/Tom Redcam Drive. Not only will these serve as general information centres, but will feature some type of festival activity at all times.

Devon House will have informal musical performances, puppet shows, craft displays and the like. This area will serve as the origin for such tours as fine arts, architecture and historic sites. In addition, information on all other Festival activities will be posted and much of the transportation to these events will depart from Devon House.

The midtown cultural complex, comprised of the Cultural Training Centre, the Little Theatre and the Kingston/St. Andrew Library, will be the focus of performing arts activity. Events such as poetry and play readings, chamber music performances, dance concerts, operatic recitals and children's theatre and musical recitals will be featured throughout each Festival day.

ATTRACTIONS

The National Gallery of Jamaica and the Institute of Jamaica offer the visitor an exciting view of Jamaican culture, including the most complete collection of intuitive art to be found anywhere. Outstanding museums include the Archaeological, Coin and Note, Maritime and Science. Among Kingston's many theatres is one of the oldest in the Western hemisphere - the Ward Theatre. Hope Gardens, a cornucopia of dazzling color is the Island's foremost botanical garden.

Youth Conference Kingston is the home of the National Stadium, the focus of major national sporting events and cultural spectaculars. It also boasts one of the world's most impressive conference facilities - the ultra-modern Jamaica Conference Centre, which opened last year.

Music lovers have their choice of reggae, heard at almost every street corner, or classical performances by the Jamaica Philharmonic Symphony, the National Chorale, and the Jamaica School of Music. The University of the West Indies offers many special events and exhibits. Plays created and staged by Jamaican playwrights can be seen at a number of small theatres in Kingston, throughout the year.

The mountain views of Kingston are spectacular. Within easy driving distance are historic Spanish Town and Port Royal, and many fine beaches, "mist forests," places to picnic, and Caymanas race track.

ACCOMMODATIONS

Kingston offers a broad range of hotels, from grand to modest. The high-rise Jamaica Pegasus and the Wyndham Hotel, important landmarks in the capital city, are located in the heart of the business and entertainment district. The 200-room Hotel Oceana in downtown Kingston is convenient to the cruise ship piers and shopping. The Courtleigh is a mid-sized hotel, and for those who prefer cozier accommodations, there is the intimate Sandhurst Inn.

NIGHT LIFE

Kingston is vibrant at night. For dancing, especially reggae and dance music, there are many discotheques, the most popular of which are Epiphany, the Ritz, the Turn Table, Jankanoo Lounge and Mingles. There are also weekly jazz sessions at the Pegasus.

FOOD/RESTAURANTS

A cosmopolitan city, Kingston offers a variety of top-flight dining experience from traditional Jamaican to Indian, Middle Eastern, Chinese, and international cuisines. For atmosphere, there is the Blue Mountain Inn located on the banks of the Mammee River, and Devon House's Port Royal Grog Shop, with a unique setting in a 100-year old national monument. English pub-like places include the Indies Pub, and the Surrey Tavern at the Pegasus Hotel.
