Dear Mike:

I have been meaning to drop you a note to let you know how much we enjoyed the President's visit to the United Kingdom. Both Jo and I found it to be exciting and rewarding. I feel that it made great strides in improving U.S.-U.K. relations. It was the experience of our lifetime.

We are still receiving letters of thanks and appreciation from our British colleagues reiterating what I am sure people told you while you were here -- that they all enjoyed and appreciated the President's visit.

While we are all basking in the accolades, I would be remiss if I did not mention to you my thoughts on how we might do it even better next time.

Remembering that it was a successful visit and that everything went extremely well, I would suggest that, if we have a second Presidential visit, perhaps we could have fewer people involved. This busy Embassy was almost overwhelmed by the size of the overall party, and just a few more would have stretched our resources to the breaking point.

I also would hope that next time the same advance people who handled the final aspects of the visit would be available from the beginning of the endeavor. I know this is easy to say, but because of staffing problems and press of business, not always easy to carry out. However, I think things would have gone much smoother, vis d vis the British, if we had had the same people here for all the advance visits. It became frustrating for the Queen's Household to be dealing with different people each visit.

If we could have had fewer advance visits, it also would have been beneficial. One pre-advance and then the advance team arriving and staying for some time to work out the details with the host government officials would have been ideal. Questions could have been answered as we went along. Also, it would have helped to have the answers to some of the British queries by cable rather than having to wait for the advance team to give them.

Finally, I believe we could have handled Mrs. Reagan's schedule with greater skill with better guidance from the outset.

Mike, I hope that you will find this letter constructive. We were all absolutely delighted with the visit, and wanted simply to share with you our thoughts on how we could have done the job even better.
