

Whole divisions of the North Vietnamese Army were routed and fled back across the DMZ in disarray. If President Johnson had not declared a halt to the bombing of North Vietnam just before the 1968 presidential election there is a good chance South Vietnam and Cambodia might not be living through the terroristic nightmare those countries have suffered through for the past half-dozen years.

The Office of Program Development (OPD) is the successor to the three-year-old Office of Programming and Training Coordination

This is the office that fulfills the functional and technical training, programmatic and back-up needs of the PCV in the field. OPD also provides the experts that go to the field to explain, implement and-where appropriate—assess for the purpose of improving programs.

Manuals PC produces for the

field come from OPD; the ICE Alamanac, part of The Peace Corps Times, comes out of OPD. The United Nations volunteers, the initiatives with private voluntary organizations and disaster relief conference planning are products of OPD's operations.

In short, OPD is the functionaltechnical backstop of Peace Corps.

As a field-based office, the 28 OPD personnel are most effective if they are in the field a third to a half of the time.

They work primarily in the six OPD sectors that have been targeted for special emphasis as part of the Peace Corps mission and the overall US "aid" mission generally in recent

The six sectors are energy, agriculture, forestry, fisheries, health and water/sanitation.

While energy has been an important consideration in years past, it is most certainly a high priority today. This includes harnessing power that comes from such things as wind mills, bio-gas digesters and solar

- The agriculture sector includes small animals, vegetable gardens and grain storage facilities and their role in developing countries.
- The forestry area is certainly high priority today from a standpoint of conservation, watershed management and fuel wood.
- Fisheries programming is one of Peace Corps' biggest success stories. It has had a big impact on people's health as well as income generation and protein development.
- Health sector activities deal with nutrition as well as nursing and a whole panorama of associated
- Our water/sanitation involvement includes everything from irrigation to well construction to sanitary conditions for the water.

These are the principle thrusts of OPD.

Two of these programs are cur-rently funded under what is called a PASA (Participating Agency Service Agreement) with the Agency for International Development (AID).

Director of Program Development Shares Directional Thoughts

Rick Abell, a Returned Volunteer who served in Colombia (1967–69), is director of the Peace Corps' (newly named) Office of Program Development, formerly Office of Programming and Training Coordination, in Washington.

He oversees development of Peace Corps programs abroad as well as pre-service training for Volunteers as he has been doing since March of last year.

Before returning to the Peace Corps, Abel was in the Army in Vietnam, studied and taught law, and held several jobs in local and national government.

As a Volunteer in the Andes Mountains of Colombia, Abell performed a variety of duties, including forming township level governments; constructing schools, roads and

As a volunteer in the Andes Mountains of Colombia, Abett performed a variety of duties, including forming township level governments; constructing schools, roads and bridges; teaching nutrition and English; and managing demonstration projects such as pig inoculation and seed distribution.

While there, he met and married Lucia del Carmen Lombana-Cadavid, a Colombian

who later served as a Peace Corps staff member.

He served in the Army from 1969–71 and was wounded in action. He was awarded the Air Medal, the Army Commendation Medal for Heroism and the Purple

Abell, a 1974 graduate of George Washington University Law School, was a member of the adjunct faculties of Delaware Law School and West Chester State College. He earned a B.A. degree in international affairs from GWU in 1966.

He served as assistant district attorney and police legal coordinator of Chester, PA.

He, his wife and three children reside in Alexandria, VA.

These sectors, energy and forestry, rely on mutual agreement on objectives along with support funds from AID. This includes collaboration in the areas of study, training and consulting inputs as well as the development of new training modules and manuals for Volunteer support.

Another valuable area of OPD is the Information Collection Ex-change (ICE). This is the source of specific, technical manuals and the ICE Almanac.

The office which the Volunteer in the field is most likely to interact with is, of course, the country PC staff office. (There may be administrative relationships with his or her country's regional officials but generally the Volunteer is not involved in this area.) If there is direct contact with PC/Washington, the most likely office the PCV would be in touch with is OPD.

This would occur if a Volunteer had a technical question that nobody on the in-country staff could answer. ICE would then look up, track down, or sub-contract the question to a knowledgeable individual or group to determine the answer. Either the answer or an explanation of when the answer is coming is then passed on to the

(It should be noted, from an organizational standpoint, that OPD no longer handles the staff training function but is, now, in charge of PC's association with the United Nations Volunteers, private voluntary organizations and such ad hoc programs as disaster relief.)

Ideally, and in practice, OPD also works with the PC leadership to im-

plement programming and Admin-istration goals in a "think tank" capacity. We develop programmatic modules which are implemented by the Regions,

A practical—and current—example of this is the anti-communism training module which is being de-veloped in accordance with Section 8-C of the Peace Corps Act for use

at overseas stagings.

The speech by President Ronald
Reagan to the World Affairs Council last fall was unique and important in that this was the first time in

"One thing that should be noted is the outstanding job Agriculture Sector Specialist Franklin Moore is, doing. His grasp of knowledge and his ability to transmit this to the Volunteers through our training programs are superb," said Abell.



The main focus of the Administration in terms of developmental philosophy is on agriculture, energy and competitive enterprise develop-ment. (PC is already well-positioned in agriculture and energy related projects and is looking for appropriate areas of free enterprise that promise the most potential for income generation and success on the part of the people of countries where we are involved.)

These are the areas of emphasis, in many ways traditional and on-going, which OPD and its various components will address in the years ahead while trying to assist Volunteers as best we can.



WASHINGTON — Merrie M. Spaeth is one former Philadelphia politician who is not suspicious of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and vice versa.

eMany of Philadelphia's erstwhile politicians have had dealings with the FBI, but none has had a closer relationship than this 33-year-old woman, who grew up in Chestnut Hill.'

Until recently, Miss Spaeth was a White House Fellow serving as a top assistant to FB! Director William Webster.

wil was the first Fellow at the FBI and the first woman to sit in on meetings of the bureau's executive council," Ms. Spaeth said in a recent interview. "This is a group of middle-aged men who all their lives have associated with nigh. They were unused to working with young women. The highest-ranking career woman at the FBI is at the fifth level from the top.

C'At first they were all excessively polite. They would stand up when I entered the room and when they would swear, they would say, 'Excuse me.'

"Of course, being a journalist, I had never heard anyone swear," she said with a smile.

But the FBI is trying to charge its character and its

image. When Ms. Spaeth was selected from the 2,000 applicants in the summer of 1980 to be one of 17 White House Fellows, she was recruited by Webster to come spend a year as one of his four executive assistants

Although it was not her first choice, she accepted.

The year stretched into 15 months as Ms. Smooth he

The year stretched into 15 months as Ms. Spaeth became involved in the management and public-relations problems of the bureau.

"I did not do any investigating, although I did sit in on some briefings," she recalled. She wrote speeches, prepared testimony for Webster's appearances before congressional committees, arranged meetings for Webster with businessmen, set up an exhibit about women special agents for all to see on the popular tour of the FBI building, and helped work out plans for the television show, "Today's FBI."

It was a real education for Ms. Spaeth, who, after all "went to college in the '60s and didn't think very highly" of the FBI.

She found that the bureau, although a "secret society," is "a professional organization of dedicated people. Americans can be proud of the FBI."

"I was there, right at the top," she recalled. "Judge Webster (the director was a federal district judge) told me to go in and stir things up.

The Executive Director of the Council is appointed by the President after receiving recommendations from the Council. Our office has checked with the Counsel's Office and OLC at Justice and they have confirmed that the President is not required to follow the recommendations of the Council.

The previous Executive Director was Monroe Freedman who resigned. Thereafter a consultant to the Council Robert E. Agus appears to have declared himself "acting director". Such a person is unacceptable to Elizabeth Dole and our office. Red Caveney and Mike Farrell are working to get an acceptable person forwarded by the Council so as not to cause a controversy. As of today no recommendations have been forwarded by the Council.

Dear Helene:

I am bringing to your attention a very serious matter which can become explosive once it becomes official, and it has the potential of being very embarrassing to the President.

The forthcoming appointment of Mr. Robert E. Agus to become the Executive Director of the Holocaust Council (if true) is a grave error which may have repercussions in the Jewish Community and specifically, among the Republican sector. Let me give you reasons which I believe will make Agus not qualified for the above mentioned position:

- 1. He made his own announcement, preempting the President and putting the President in an embarrassing situation. (See enclosure.)
- 2. Agus is totally unknown in the Jewish Community and has no backing whatsoever.
- 3. Agus' political views are totally alien and opposite to the President's and are to the left of former Senator McGovern.
- 4. Agus has been involved in some Jewish organizations which are not part of the Jewish mainstream and are against the Jewish establishment.
- 5. The Holocaust Council created by President Carter has a 95% membership of Democrats. Its new Director will face over a period of time six million Jews. The Director will have to explain President Reagan's views on every aspect of his policies and philosophies. Agus cannot in good conscience represent the President, he opposes them.
- 6. Agus has absolutely no qualifications for his present job. His resume (which is enclosed) very cleverly omits or conceals his political activities.
- 7. Agus was recommended for the position of Executive Director by the outgoing Acting Director, Monroe Freedman, as a part of a package. Once Agus is in that job he will appoint Freedman as a legal counsel and advisor to the Holocaust Commission. Freedman, incidentally, is also an ardent radical who is not supporting the President.

- 8. Agus advocated resistance to the draft and himself did not serve in the Armed Services.
- 9. Agus has so-called expertise in real estate and all his career was devoted to organizing communities for grants and dissent.

Perhaps you did not hear many opposing Agus' appointment. It is simply that so few know him and it is customary among Jews not to criticize an appointment of a Jew, but once it becomes final, the press will have a heyday.

Mr. Wiesel, who is the Chairman of the Council, will see the President to discuss the appointment since he (Wiesel) feels that the President should honor his recommendation. This simply should not be so.

There are many highly visible and qualified individuals who are supporters of the President, and to choose a non-entity (Agus) will certainly not bring credit to President Reagan since Agus is totally not qualified from every point of view to hold any appointment in this Administration.

I share my views with you since I do want the President to succeed and yet, such a minor appointment may be very damaging to him.
