On May 5, 1982, Jim Baker, Ed Meese, Mike Deaver and I approved the selection of Richard McCormack to be Assistant Secretary for Oceans and International Environmental and Scientific Affairs, Department of State. On May 6, 1982, you approved McCormack's appointment to this position.

McCormack's selection was approved by Secretary Haig verbally for this post. The White House has yet to receive written notification from Haig of his approval; however, because of the already lengthy delay in the appointment process and in order to expedite his confirmation, the presidential personnel office decided to go ahead and submit McCormack to you for your approval and to Ken Duberstein for congressional clearance.

McCormack cannot be announced or nominated until Ken Duberstein and Fred Fielding complete their legislative and security clearances or before his predecessor as Assistant Secretary, James Malone, is confirmed as Ambassador-at-large for the Law of the Sea Conference.

Secretary Haig may be calling you to express his concern that the White House proceeded without written notification of his sign-off. We did this entirely to expedite matters.

SUBJECT: Richard Heldridge

Richard Heldridge was nominated to be a Director of the Export-Import Bank on December 2, 1981. According to the Legislative Affairs office, Senator Heinz has succeeded in holding up the confirmation procedure on the grounds that he know, before considering Heldridge, the identity of our next Export-Import nominee. Senator Garn, the Chairman of the Banking Committee, has not intervened because he has no special interest in the issue. Bill Draper, the Export-Import President, evidently could care less about accelerating Heldridge's confirmation. Senior Staff has yet to decide on the next vacancy appointment. Until that decision is made, which should be in the near future, it is unlikely that Heldridge will be reported out of the Banking Committee. Apparently, Heinz has several candidates for this vacancy. Legislative Affairs is working to try to ameliorate the impasse.

Do you remember when you had your father tell me to schedule Maureen into Iowa after Charlie Black told me not to? Well, someone at the White House is using my involvement with you and Maureen as a reason to deny me political clearance for a job at the Agriculture Department.

I was fired from the campaign right after Iowa, but went to work at Pete McPherson's law firm writing legal memos on the Presidential Transition Act and Federal personnel law for Pete to give to Ed Meese. (I'm a lawyer.) Later I was on the Transition staff.

McPherson's people have so far been unable to get the White House to clear me. Maybe someone is blaming him for the defeat in Iowa. They've forgotten that we would have gone down much worse if you and Maureen hadn't come in and saved us.

I worked for the Agriculture Department for seven years during the Nixon-Ford Administrations, and have been here on a temporary appointment since February of 1981. An Assistant Secretary (who was one of my volunteers on phoning during the Iowa campaign) has a job for me, but I can't have it without political clearance.

The clearance person is Becky Dunlop, who was not around during Iowa. She must be acting on orders from someone else.

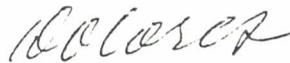
