I have been advised that the White House will not approve my appointment for U.S. Marshal in Sacramento area. This in spite of the fact that I am eminently qualified, and have been recommended by Senator Hayakawa's selection committee.

I am appealing to you and your sense of fairness and justice to at least allow me to defend myself before any group in your appointment selection committee.

Your senior staff people have apparently seen fit to believe unfounded rumors and innuendos that I had some business transactions with a known con man and a crooked state attorney. This is simply not true.

And they have chosen to believe some out & out lies that have been initiated by the person and his friends that replaced me as U.S. Marshal. This was done for obvious reasons to prevent me from getting my job back and to perpetuate his own.

I beg of you please allow me to clear my name, everyone in Sacramento believes I will get my job back as I should. However to be turned down when they know how close I have been to you will absolutely ruin my reputation and career. Please allow me to appear before my distractors in your staff to answer any and all questions. My Future is in your hands.

He will serve as Deputy Director of the Office of Public Liaison under Elizabeth Dole, with management responsibilities for the business, labor and agriculture sectors. In addition, he will serve as the liaison to the Catholic and ethnic communities.

Burgess has had extensive administrative and managerial experience in a variety of areas. He served as Peace Corps Country Director in Micronesia from 1975 to 1978 and for several years prior to that was the Executive Assistant to the Director of ACTION. He is a former Assistant Dean of the Georgetown University School of Foreign Service and was Dean of Freshmen of the College of Arts and Sciences.


He meets people very well, whether or not they are his age, or 40 years his senior.

After having the privilege of serving you in your campaign and in the first year of your Presidency, I am today submitting my resignation as Assistant to the President.


My intention from the beginning was to serve you and the ideals you represent. I was committed to remaining a member of your Administration as long as I could make an effective contribution.

I write this as a long-time acquaintance and, hopefully, as a friend and I do so with a deep sense of emotion.

Suddenly, the progress and success I had realized, along with Ed Mills and his wonderful help, toward Presidential appointment to the National Transportation Safety Board, has just simply withered away and I am at a genuine loss to understand it.

Pen James and Helene both take the position I would be given a very rough time if I went before the Senate Committee for confirmation hearing. Or so they think, anyway. They base their reasoning on what they believe is the tenor of the moment of the Senate following the Air Florida 737 crash on January 13.

I presume Ed (Meese) and you both know that I have been asked to withdraw my nomination for consideration to the NTSB position. I indicated to Pen and Helene that if it really is the will of the President, of the Administration (yourself and Ed in particular) that, of course, I will do so and immediately.

I enclose a letter to that effect to Pen and which I hope you might find several minutes to go over. It, plus a simple Dear Ed/Gene letter (Mills) and several quotes from a letter I wrote to Charlie Cook, my benefactor and friend of 25 years and a friend of yours, as well.

Mike, I can't possibly find the proper words to convey to you my disappointment; the hurt that Theda and I will sustain and to say nothing of the disappointment Ed and Grace will sustain as a result of withdrawal.

As I said, I am at a loss as to why I have been asked to do this now after I have been taken to the very brink, to the cliff's edge; the real why, Mike.

Is there some major underlying reason? It just doesn't appear to me that Senator Packwood and the Commerce and Transportation committee members would be that devastating either in their interrogation or in the committee vote.



Dear Pen and Helene:

In the belief that you have not seen my full response to the instructions I received from Senator Packwood, I enclose--among others--an excerpt from that total response in answer to 'why do you think you should be appointed a member of the National Transportation Safety Board?'. .

In support of that lengthy--but not rambling--statement I enclose also an exchange of letters with current Board Member, Patricia A. Goldman. In my letter, I was even more specific as to what I had already boned up on prior to her offer of help, the material I had begun to go over again in preparation for my anticipated hearing.

Over the past months I have had at least four lengthy phone calls with the Safety Board's counsel, all initiated from that end. The calls all lent themselves to the learning process for me and, happily, never was it on a hurry-up basis.

To further point up my long-time interest in the Safety Board, on May 31 and June 1, 1978, I attended the week-long public hearing held by the NTSB into the 'end of runway' accident suffered by Continental Airlines and in which two people were killed and a number of others injured. Jim King chaired that hearing.

In early summer of '81, I attended for one day (a portion thereof) the Administrative Law Judges hearing on a commercial helicopter crash in which two lives were lost. My purpose was to draw a comparison between procedures followed by Federal ALJ's as opposed to State of California ALJ's. I felt it worthwhile--a contribution to my learning process.

Last late December I received a weekend phone call from Jim King, the department Board chairman. He expressed an interest in my Board welfare as well as to congratulate me on my nomination and to wish me well.

Although he made two tentative offers of help, I later declined his major offer in a call I made to the NTSB and to Diana Rock in particular. I know Diana; having met her back in 1978. King's offer of office and telephone prior to and during my expected hearing I did not decline; that both could be provided me at any time I wished--if I so wished.

It was my plan to embody my response to the qualifications question into an opening statement if, indeed, a statement was expected as required. It would have been preceded with a reference to the President and his confidence in me and my expression of gratitude to the President for that confidence and his selection of me for the job. The close would, again, have been a thank you to the President. I was hopeful it would have made a favorable impression upon the Committee and Senator Packwood in particular.

With respect to the Senate, I should say that in the last few months I decided that if I needed help from within that august body, I would seek to enlist the aid of Mark Hatfield, Oregon's senior senator, through a close, mutual friend, Charles E. Cook, here in California. I'm sure that would have posed no problems.


Needless to say, I wanted so very, very much to be a member of the Safety Board and to do the job the President would expect of me. Never did I believe that I was not up to it. All I wanted was to go through the necessities, the hearing and the swearing in--and then get with it. I feel not one bit differently now and, for sure, I would jump at the chance were it offered me again.

If, on the other hand, it is your will, the will of the Administration, that I don't pursue the nomination further, I understand and I shall abide by that will.

Having first associated with the President in 1966 and with Ed and Mike in 1967, they all know only too well that I am a team player and that I will always go with the Gipper. He's the head coach.

With my fullest appreciation for your concern for my welfare.

Dear Ed:

I didn't think to ask Helene or Pen, and it never was disclosed, if anybody there in the White House ever bothered to talk--or tried to talk--to Sen. Packwood.

Odds are that he hasn't been in Washington during the 5-week holiday recess. Perhaps someone might have contacted Commerce Committee staff but I don't know that.

If there hasn't been any conversation, could Pen James and the others simply have panicked as a result of the circumstances, principally the Air Florida crash?

Certainly, that air/ground disaster is the overriding circumstance. Had it occurred at Grand Island, Nebraska or Grand Junction, Colorado, perhaps its significance wouldn't have been as great before the Senate. Perhaps. Who knows?

The extremely late confirmation of Jim Burnett, the 33-year-old, is the other major circumstance. It happened in mid-December, at least six months later than previous NTSB confirmations. Heretofore, they never took place after June at the latest.

Burnett, like myself, Ed, was a political appointment. I despise that expression, in this instance anyway, but that is how the Senate viewed the Burnett nomination and I suspect the Committee Vote was not unanimous.

The Congress then recessed for the 5-week holiday and in the meantime I furnished the Commerce Committee with everything they asked of me by Senator Packwood and then sat back to await his instructions for my hearing.

Without doubt, I was scheduled to be one of the first to be called up. the first of perhaps many nominees before numerous committees. Unfortunately as we see it now, I would have been the first this year for the NTSB, only 6 or 7 weeks after Burnett.

On January 13, Washington, D.C., experienced an almost indescribable disaster--a commercial airliner crashing into the 14th Street bridge and sinking rapidly to the Potomac's bottom with a large loss of lives. For me, the timing couldn't possibly have been worse.

In my packaged response to the Committee's questions, I thought I made a pretty good case as to why I should be appointed to the NTSB. It was lengthy, but not rambling, with the opening third of the statement devoted to accident investigations. I was hopeful I would impress Packwood and his fellow Committeemen. Again, I don't know that he has seen it and I am positive no one in the White House has seen it.

One thing I forgot to mention to you when I reported on Jim King's phone call the Saturday after Christmas was his comment that "already there are some ominous signs in the Senate," i.e., my nomination. That little comment bothered me for the rest of the day; I couldn't seem to part from it.

But in commenting on that comment, King did make a positive statement that I concur in and a statement almost identical to that which I made to Alan Cranston back in '78 or maybe '77.

He said, "But the fact of the matter is you are a very proper person to be appointed to the Board. Look, he said, "the agency already has 285 technicians in it and the very last thing the Board needs is a technician on it."


My argument to Cranston was that the five Board members are policy-makers, they are not investigators. They establish policy, they accept or reject final drafts of investigative reports. They don't concoct them, they adopt them or don't adopt them. I made the same point in my lengthy written report to Diana Rock following my interview with her in the then Carter White House back in the fall of '78.

That report was very much a part of my presentation that went forward to Ed Meese in early October, 1980--before the election. I titled it, "OVERVIEW."

Of course, I'm extremely disappointed. I wanted so much to have that job--tucked away in a small agency but a worthwhile one and a busy one.


