





state's celebrated Chardonnays and Cabernet Sauvignons.

Berkley isn't being paid for his expertise. He said he is volunteering his services because of the excitement that surrounds his White House chores — he has no problem whatever getting his phone calls to wineries returned — and because of the rare opportunity to have a hand in showcasing exceptional California wines. "We have some of the finest wines in the world, and now we have a president who is promoting our product and who is literally stimulating the market," remarked Berkley.

Whenever the Washington press reports the menu and wine list for a state dinner, the district's wine shops are swamped with hosts and hostesses in search of the latest label that seems to have captivated the Reagan fancy, said Deaver in a telephone interview. "There have been a lot of raves about the new and up to this time unknown California wines," he remarked. "The president," he added, "considers himself a connoisseur of wines and would like to highlight them while he's back here." So far, he noted, Reagan has been "very impressed" with Berkley's selections.

**WHAT HAS BERKLEY** learned of Reagan as an enophile? "The president," he replied, "has an adventurous palate. His wine tastes seem eclectic. They're not bound up by prejudices. He seems very curious. He's an adventurer who enjoys many types of wine. He takes a real personal interest in the wines."

To illustrate the Reagans' interest in serving fine foods and complementary wines, Berkley recalled that several days before the Prince Charles dinner they and the Deavers sat down to a preview meal of the courses and wines to be served the prince. Berkley left the final wine choice to the president, recommending that either the 1975 Joseph Phelps Cabernet Sauvignon or the 1970 Beaulieu Vineyard Georges de Latour Private Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon be served with saddle of lamb. The president picked the Beaulieu Vineyard, as Berkley confidently predicted he would. "He does like his reds mature," Berkley was so certain Reagan would select the BV he had arranged to ship the necessary cases for the prince's dinner even before the preview meal.

(Deaver hesitated to single out one wine as the president's favorite, but said Reagan seemed particularly fond of the BV Cabernet. The president, he noted, prefers red wines, while Nancy Reagan prefers whites, particularly the 1978 Chardonnay produced by Trefethen Vineyards.)

Reagan's adventurous palate may be demonstrated most daringly by his willingness to adopt Berkley's suggestion that state dinners be concluded with a sweet dessert wine rather than the customary Champagne. The 1978 Stony Hill Semillon de Soleil, for example, was served with a sorbet at the Prince Charles dinner, and the 1979 Raymond Late Harvest Johannisberg Riesling was served with melon and raspberries to conclude the dinner for Chancellor Schmidt.

**ALTHOUGH THE** Raymond Johannisberg Riesling is expensive, generally retailing for around \$25 a tenth, the president apparently isn't a wine snob. A wine he has enjoyed more than once, and which was served him by a Georgetown hostess adventurous in her own right, is the Trefethen Eschol Red Blend 379, an everyday wine that generally retails for around \$3.75 a jug.

Both Berkley and Deaver said

they don't know what the White House is spending on wine. Deaver, however, estimated that the White House served about seven cases of table wine and four cases of sparkling wine during May. Using Berkley's estimate that the wines generally are costing \$6 to \$15 a bottle, the White House wine budget totaled between \$800 and \$2,000 in May.

Two factors have handicapped Berkley in making his wine recommendations. One is the limited availability of some wines in Washington, D.C., even though its annual per capita wine consumption (six gallons) is three times the national average and even though it is appointed with nearly as many well-stocked wine shops as it is with marble monuments. "A lot of small California wineries don't have East Coast representation, let alone D.C. distribution," said Berkley.

The other is the lack of a White House wine cellar. Because of Secret Service concern that a storehouse of wine intended for the president could be tampered with, or that its easy accessibility may be too tempting for bibbing aides who also have ready access to war rooms, Moscow hot lines and such, the presidential residence is without a wine cellar.

**THEY ARE MINOR** obstacles, however, and Berkley remains remarkably unflappable as he copes with them while patiently juggling the other demands of a hectic and varied professional life. At 37, big and moon-faced, Berkley conveys the air of a hale and hearty renaissance man, sort of a young and restrained Santa Claus.

By and large, he's a self-taught enophile. The son of a former minister who is now the assistant schools superintendent in Wheatland, Berkley is a native Arizonan who grew up in Pasadena, graduated from Live Oak High School north of Yuba City and earned a bachelor's degree in biology at Pasadena College in 1970.

He started to flirt with pre-med studies at the University of California, Davis, a decade ago when a friend persuaded him to enroll also in a beginning viticulture class. The course sparked his initial interest in enology, but he didn't get far, injuring his back, dropping out of school and spending two months in recuperation, during which he was given two wine books to read, which further fired his interest.

Once recovered, he traveled about the vineyards of Europe for four months, returning to California convinced that selling wine would be "more interesting to me than being a doctor."

In 1973 he went to work part-time for Corti Bros., using his spare time to read wine books, taste wines and grill Darrell Corti, a widely recognized wine authority. Before 1973, Berkley had never even been to the Napa Valley. "I was a milk drinker prior to 1973."

**SINCE THEN**, he's been to Europe five times, leading tours and selecting wines for Corti Bros. He also teaches wine-appreciation classes at William Glen, a Sacramento kitchen shop; appears once every three weeks on the KCRA-TV noon news as a wine consultant; writes occasional wine articles and advises restaurants on their wine lists.

He and his wife, Diania, who works in real estate loans at the Downtown Plaza branch of the Bank of America, are partners in the newly opened Cafe Natoma in Folsom, an elegant restaurant specializing in "California French" cuisine.

In addition to overseeing the cafe's cellar, Berkley is pioneering an innovative concept in wine service: specific preselected wines are offered by glass or bottle for each course on the night's menu. Berkley drew the idea from his experience at Corti Bros., where in his most familiar pose he's holding a bottle of wine in one hand and is gesturing pointedly with the other, explaining to a puzzled customer the intricacies and nuances of the proper marrying of wine and food. During one recent week at the cafe, for example, diners were offered a 1974 Chateau Le Grave from Pomerol for \$3.75 by the glass or \$13 by the bottle with the main course, roast rack of lamb with mustard, garlic and thyme.

Inevitably, Berkley is asked — not by Deaver or Reagan, however — what wine he would recommend with the president's favorite snack, jelly beans. At first, he laughs and attempts to avoid answering the question (this wine business is serious, after all). But then he replies: "Because of their high sugar content, you would need a wine that is refreshing, maybe effervescent — a California sparkling wine!"

Berkeley hopes to deliver it to the president later this summer when he is expected to meet with White House chefs to discuss menus and wines. The Port, said Berkeley, would be "only appropriate to honor what must be his most memorable birthday.")

As to his philosophy in matching wine with food, he says a complementary balance is "manifested by good acidity that keeps the wine alive with a dish, fruit that doesn't overwhelm but rounds the dish, and a finish that lingers."

Although White House aides have left the wine selection solely to Berkeley, without imposing any restrictions or guidelines, he quickly has emerged as a cellar diplomat, keeping politics, history and cultural heritage as much in mind as the ingredients of entrees and sauces.

For the state dinner for Prime Minister Suzuki, for example, Berkeley chose the 1979 Freestone Chardonnay to be served with a halibut dish. The halibut was rich, and

Contrary to the widespread consumer notion that cost accurately reflects quality, Berkeley says his selections are unaffected by pricing. For the state dinner for West German Chancellor Schmidt last week, Berkeley selected an unreleased 1980 Heidsieck by Bavaria Winery & Vineyards of Windsor, Sonoma County, a new and unusual California wine consisting of 70 percent Gewurztraminer, 22 percent Johannisberg Riesling and 8 percent Scheurebe. Although the wine is to retail for only \$5 a bottle when it is

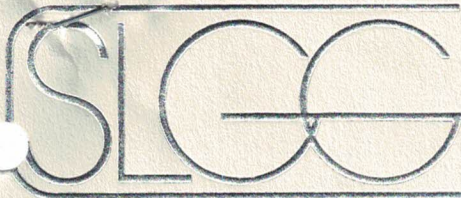




