Mrs. Thatcher's February Visit

We need to sort out the details of Mrs. Thatcher's February 20 visit to Washington.

She wants to address a joint session of Congress before coming to the White House to meet with the President. Steps are underway to arrange for her to address Congress. Speaker O'Neill's office has indicated that Congress will likely agree and that Mrs. Thatcher could probably address Congress at 11:00 a.m. on February 20.

This will require some modifications in our normal meeting times. Furthermore, Mrs. Thatcher always asks for at least a brief private meeting with the President (see Wright's letter). George Shultz had previously spoken to Mrs. Thatcher about a "seminar" type discussion. This is more or less what we did at Camp David.

Against this background, we propose the following White House schedule for February 20:

Prebrief 11:30 a.m. - 12 noon Private meeting in Oval 12 noon - 12:15 p.m. Office Working luncheon 12:15 p.m. - 1:15 p.m. Seminar in Cabinet Room

1:15 p.m. - 2:30 p.m. Departure statements 2:30 p.m. - 2:40 p.m.

1985 marks the 200th anniversary of the establishment of US-UK diplomatic relations. We plan to include a reference to this in the President's departure remarks. Ambassador Wright also wishes to host a dinner in the President's and Mrs. Thatcher's honor marking the bicentennial anniversary. In view of the President's close personal relationship with Mrs. Thatcher, this sounds like the sort of event that the President would like to attend.

Please let me know your reaction to our schedule suggestion including the possibility of the President attending Ambassador Wright's dinner.

I was very sorry to read that you had had to go into hospital. Rotten luck! It goes to show what a dangerous business the Opera Follies is! I do hope you are recovering well, and that you will have a chance to take life a little easier in the weeks ahead, now that all your Inauguration efforts have paid off so well.

I have one bit of business which I venture to raise with you despite your illness, because it concerns my Prime Minister. You will remember that, during the fun and games at the Follies, we discussed the possibility that the President and Mrs Reagan might feel able to attend the dinner which I shall be giving on 20 February during Mrs Thatcher's visit. I explained that the evening would have a rather special character, since it would celebrate not only the present close ties between our two countries but also the 200th anniversary of John Adams' mission to the Court of George III, which not only marked reconciliation after the traumas of the Independence War but also constituted the establishment of diplomatic relations between the independent United States and the old country.

You told me that the possibility of the President and Mrs Reagan attending this rather special occasion was not to be excluded. Bud McFarlane, and the State Department, are already aware of my plan; and my people will now be pursuing it with yours. Meanwhile I should be immensely grateful if you could get me an answer fairly soon. The point is that, if the President and First Lady were to grace the dinner with their presence, they would, of course, be guests of honour with the Prime Minister; and, subject, of course, to any considerations of security, I should wish to state that fact on the invitations.

If you or she have any views on the list I should of course be happy to have them. I aim to get the invitations out by the end of next week, ie by I February.
